idea of you changing and walking around the store would give an indication that you aren't going to pay for it. That would be considered a shoplift based on the store policy."

For stores that employ loss prevention officials, Panico said store policy can make the process of catching a shoplifter complex.

"Any time you hear a story where loss prevention gets involved, then you have to consider legally where does loss prevention stand in this," he said. "Legally, what can they do and what can they not do? There is no such thing as citizen's arrest in West Virginia. So how can a citizen grab another citizen and bring them to the back room? Because in our eyes, that would constitute a battery. So, we could arrest the loss prevention officer."

"There's a problem because a lot of these people aren't trained. They get this gung-ho attitude that they are police, and the only thing that really stops the person, the shoplifter, from pressing the charges is that they are afraid because they are shoplifting. You've got a legal ground to file charges against them, too."

Panico said many stores have adopted a hands-off policy, where they use a threat of trespassing as a cross-over method by approaching the person and asking him or her to leave.

"They will approach the person and say, 'Hey, we think you are stealing, you should leave the store.' If you don't leave, then we cross it over to trespassing and now we have a legal reason to be there," he said. "So, it's all based on the idea that they think something is going on. They have a person that's doing it, and they want us there to monitor the situation."

[suspect] will run. People will run as soon as they are confronted. At the same time, that's pretty much a stop-end deal there. They are running; obviously, they committed a crime. We track them down, we get them and we arrest them."

Granville Police Lt. Brian Hill said because Granville is mostly a business district, shoplifting is a large problem for the force. He said stores with trained loss prevention officials help the officers by detaining the suspect before they arrive.

"After we arrive, we talk to whoever has detained them," he said. "Normally, we obtain a statement from them. It doesn't have to be written at that time, but eventually we obtain a written statement. Then we either watch the video or we have them tell us verbally that they watched them do this. They selected the item, concealed it, passed the last point of sale. Those are the main points for them, and I say, 'Ok, that's probable cause to make an arrest.'"

Hill said the next step would be to take the suspect to the city, where the suspect's fingerprints and criminal history will be run on the Live Scan and sent to the state and FBI.

"If they have any prior shoplifting arrests or convictions in the past seven years, those will count as enhanceable," he said. "If they have two prior convictions, it's now a felony because shoplifting is on third offense. ... First and second offense go to city court; third offense goes to magistrate court."

Hill said the suspect has 10 days to contact the court and choose a trial or plead guilty or no contest.

He said Granville offers those with no criminal history the opportunity to attend a deferment program.

"If they have an arrest 20 years ago, they can't do this," he said. "We work with Morgantown Area Youth Services Project (MASYP) to go into a deferment program, if they choose. They can just pay the fine if they want."

"If they choose to go into the deferment program, then we hold their case — it doesn't get sent away. They go through the program, pay the money, whatever it is and go to six classes. They get a certificate at the end of that program, they bring it back to our judge here. They have to pay the restitution for the store, but they don't have to pay the court costs or anything. It goes away. It's expunged."

Hall said minors caught shoplifting would not be arrested or detained.

"We call their parents on scene, regarding whoever we can get a hold of to come take possession of them," he said. "We get all their information and all the parents' information and come back here and type a juvenile referral, which goes to the probation office of the circuit court."

Panico said social media are becoming powerful tools for catching shoplifters who may have fled.

"One of the biggest tools we are using now is Facebook," he said. "We have a Facebook page now, and as soon as we get a picture, in the past three occasions — as soon as we put that picture on there, within an hour we have names, addresses, people that know them."

Panico said the Westover department tries to

settle at the lowest level.

"We're actually bringing them in ... and we will question them and say, 'Here's why you are here, here's what we got, here's what we've seen, now you tell us. And we are going to try to give you a fair option here.' If you want to pay the store, if you want to pay restitution, we are going to give you a ticket if we bring you in, but we are going to try to work something out with them."

Hall said he believes the stores in Granville have a good relationship with the police department and trust the officers to help with this issue.

"We try to hold quarterly meetings with the businesses and bring all of them in," he said. "We try to be as open and honest with them, and we want to hear what we can do for them, what they think we can do better for them, and we strive to do that."

Panico said the stores in Westover, including the Morgantown Mall, have a good relationship with the Westover Police Department.

Shoplifting "is a problem," he said. "It's an issue. I would say, especially when school starts, we are looking at two out of 10 calls. Sometimes, especially during weekends when there is a game, you are probably looking at four out of 10 calls deal with shoplifting."

"We have a real good rapport; we work well together. In all the stores we make contact at the mall, we've done pretty good."

Harry Grandon, general manager at the Morgantown Mall, said, "We work closely with the Westover Police Department on all matters related to shoplifting. The safety of our tenants, shoppers and [employees] is our number one priority. The Westover Police Department supports our ongoing efforts relating to safety."

compleish it.

The issue resurfaced at the end of January, when the city raised the idea of changing its charter in order to double the length of city council terms from two to four years and stagger the election so no more than four of seven seats are up at any given time.

The reasoning given for the prospective change is time — by the time a new council member is up to speed, he or she is months away from potentially being replaced and the process starting over.

If adopted, the change would be integrated following the next city election and would not affect the sitting council.

During those conversations, another familiar question was raised: If you're already looking at a possible charter change, why not also explore moving the election as well, particularly given the city's scant voter turnout in recent years?

The 2017 city election featured competitive races in all seven wards, and drew about 15 percent of the city's registered voters. The city paid \$25,417 to hold the election, or about \$9.33 for each of the 2,724 votes cast.

In her report following the election, City Clerk Linda Tucker repeated her belief that the city should hold its election with the county in order to save money and increase participation.

Tucker pointed to the 2016 primary, in which 38 percent of the county's registered voters participated. More than 55 percent of the county's registered voters cast ballots in the 2016 general election.

During the most recent regular session of city council, city administration presented five options to city council, asking which it would prefer to put before city voters for an up or down vote.

- Those options are:
- No change.
 - Keep the city election date, extend council terms to four years and stagger the terms.
 - Keep the city election date, extend council terms to four years and keep the terms concurrent.
 - Move the election to match the county, extend council terms to four years and stagger the terms.
 - Move the election to match the county, extend council terms to four years and keep the terms concurrent.

Council can change the city's charter through the normal ordinance process of two readings and a public hearing, but any objection would require the question be supported by a majority of voters as a ballot referendum in order to proceed.

City Attorney Ryan Simonton has said the city already planned to put any potential charter change before the voters.

While there was some discussion as to whether that charter referendum could be placed on November's ballot for the general election, Blaney said her understanding is that such a vote would have to be held as a city election.

"It could be that they would hold a special election, but it would need to be held by the municipality," Blaney said.

In the event the elections are merged, residents of the nine county voting precincts that make up Morgantown would receive ballots that included the seven council races.

"That's really the beauty of coming onto the county ballot. We've already done all the jurisdictional work. ... Plus, [Morgantown] votes at-large, which also makes it much easier. Every city resident votes for all seven races," Blaney said.

City council will discuss the issue during Tuesday's committee-of-the-whole meeting.

W.Va. history preserved

WVU Libraries establishes George Bird Evans Collection

He christened the Colonial cabin "Old Hemlock" in honor of the towering trees that grew, and are still growing, on its grounds.

Today, the calligraphy reach of those boughs branches against

the Preston County sky remind those familiar with his work of the brushstrokes in his signature illustrations.

If you're an aficionado of 1930s and 40s magazine art, you may already know of George Bird Evans.

He made his name in Man-

hattan with his illustrations and cover art for the top periodicals of the day, including a pre-Helen Gurley Brown Cosmopolitan — then a literary publication.

You also may know of him if you're an outdoors enthusiast who enjoys good hunting and good writing about that subject.

Evans' book, "The Upland Shooting Life," is still considered a classic among bird hunters.

Evans and his wife, Kay, left their Manhattan walkup in 1939 for life in the West Virginia hills.

Now, WVU Libraries is digitally showcasing those years in that little cabin on that big piece of land.

First, though, some broader history: The couple happily illustrated their Almost Heaven narrative in that 1782 dwelling of Old Hemlock on the Brandonville Pike, where they loved the land and each other, while living (nearly) off the grid.

They traveled back and forth

Just as various organizations provide CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) training, the WVU Medicine Jon Michael Moore Trauma Center (JMMTC) and the American College of Surgeons want people to learn how to Stop the Bleed in order to prevent death

from hemorrhage.

According to the American College of Surgeons, "The Stop the Bleed campaign was initiated by a federal interagency workgroup convened by The White House National Security Council Staff under former President Barack Obama. The purpose of the campaign is to build national resilience by better preparing the public to save lives by raising awareness of basic actions to stop life-threatening bleeding following everyday emergencies and man-made and natural disasters. Advances made by military medicine and research in hemorrhage control during the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq have informed the work of this initiative, which exemplifies

"Our goal at the JMMTC Stop the Bleed Program is to provide training for everyone in our community on what to do in an emergency bleeding situation in order to save a life," said Dr. Daniel Grabo, director of trauma education for the WVU Critical Care and Trauma Institute.

"Through our regional Stop the Bleed Initiative, we can better accomplish this goal by training medical personnel, emergency responders and law enforcement to become leaders in this noble endeavor."

Biking across the continent

FSU student cycling U.S. to honor mother

FAIRMONT — Jayce Riley fondly remembers how strict his mother would be with him when he was growing up, and how she would always get on him about little things. He credits his mother for shaping him into the person he is today.

"Those memories and those little things that she would get on me about made me who I am today, that's for sure," Riley said. "I could never thank her enough for getting on me and making sure that I was the best person that I could be."

Jayce's mother, Jamie, passed away in 2014, after a 13-year battle with multiple sclerosis, right before Jayce was set to begin his senior year of high school.

Riley, an exercise science student at Fairmont State, is planning to honor his mother this summer as he aspires to complete the journey of a lifetime: A bike ride across the entire continental United States with an organization called Bike the U.S. for MS.

The 3,785-mile trek will begin in Yorktown, Va., on June 1, and will last two full months before finishing in San Francisco, at the beginning of August.

"Biking is definitely not one of my hobbies, oddly enough," Riley said. "I've always wanted to do something to honor my mom, who passed away. And it seemed like a good idea after my cousin proposed it, and it also seemed like a crazy idea. But it's definitely something unique to honor someone really special."

Along the way, the cyclists will participate in community service projects during their rest days, doing things like painting, landscaping and helping those in need.

Riley's cousin, Kaylyn Messenger, completed the cross-country journey with Bike the U.S. for MS more than once. She first got involved the summer after Riley's mother, also her aunt, passed away, biking from Maine to Seattle.

"I wanted to ride in memory of her, and do my part in the fight against MS," Messenger said.

She enjoyed her experience so much that she participated as a "Route Leader" the next year, helping lead the biking groups across the country. Now, she works for the Bike the U.S. for MS organization full-time.

As part of Riley's journey, he and each of the other cyclists will have to fundraise at least \$3,785, which equates to \$1 per mile that he will be biking.

So far, he's raised more than \$1,300. Some of the money will go toward supplies and accommodations for the trek, but the rest of the funds will go toward MS treatment centers, MS research facilities, hospitals and rehabilitation centers.

Riley was young when his mother was first diagnosed with MS, only about 6 or 7 years old, so he doesn't remember too much about the early days when she first found out about her diagnosis.

from city to country starting at about the mid-1930s to get the place ready. It was a homecoming for both. George hailed from nearby Uniontown, Pa., and Kay was a Wheeling girl. They met in art school.

George sketched and painted for his paycheck, then went hunting the rest of the time.

Kay taught and wrote books, and together, they raised an accomplished breed of hunting dogs, the Old Hemlock Setter, still in demand in the 21st century for its pleasant disposition and prowess on the hunt.

WVU Libraries and its West Virginia and Regional History Center recently launched a digital collection of Evans' time here, which contains 65 years of his famously detailed hunting journals (you can find it at <http://gbe.lib.wvu.edu/>).

Each entry chronicles bird hunts, the weather and other particulars at Old Hemlock and its confines.

Interspersed among the writing are on-the-fly illustrations by Evans himself.

John Cuthbert, the center's director, is a long-time fan.

"George Bird Evans was one of the world's foremost authorities on upland bird shooting and fine bird dogs," Cuthbert said.

"His eloquence and philosophical bent earned him an avid following among hunting literature enthusiasts across the nation and beyond."

Of the land

Cuthbert worked closely with LeJay Graffious to compile the digital archive.

Graffious is the director of the Old Hemlock Foundation, which Evans

stipulated be formed with his estate following his death.

The foundation, besides serving as a storehouse of Evans' art and writing (their Old Hemlock cabin also was preserved as a museum and is now on the National Register of Historic Places), advocates historical awareness and the importance of conservation in a state that sometimes lacks in both camps.

"Well, this is George and Kay's legacy," Graffious said. He and his wife, Helen Ann, befriended the couple after they moved to West Virginia in the 1970s. Graffious was a teacher and Helen Ann was a nurse.

When they weren't working, they were at Old Hemlock.

To observe the couple there, he said, was to witness the daily creation of a poem and love song of place.

George and Kay never had children, but they had their dogs and each other. And, of course, their friends who looked out for them.

Kay never left Old Hemlock after George's death, in 1998. She lived to be 100 and joined him in

2007. Their ashes were spread on the place that was their daily muse.

"It's the mission of the foundation to preserve that legacy," Graffious said. "This digital collection is just one more way we're doing that."

The neighbor and the telephone

Oh — and in case you're wondering how a guy in the pre-digital age sent his magazine art from the mountains of Preston County to the art directors of Manhattan, here's how that worked:

Old Hemlock didn't have a telephone, which made sense, since it didn't have running water or electricity either, not at first.

The one neighbor on the Pike who did have a phone let him use it for toll-call brainstorming sessions with those art directors and editors for his assignments.

"George was Preston County's original telecommuter," Graffious said.

"It's because I love the work, I really do. I'm a true believer in what we're doing."

Recently, Gee sat down with The Dominion Post to discuss a host of topics from his first four years back at the university. He talked about students and faculty, Morgantown and the state, and his future as a Mountaineer.

That tenure resumed in March 2013, when Gee was selected as the newest WVU president, taking the reins from himself in a way, and calling his first university his last.

Gee served as WVU president from 1981-'85. He then left to lead other schools. But WVU also had a special draw and he would occasionally return.

In December 2013, Gee was named as temporary president at WVU, taking over for Jim Clements, who left for Clemson. The hire was only supposed to be for the immediate future, as Gee had other plans — he was going to teach at Harvard and was president emeritus at The Ohio State University.

In fact, the WVU Board of Governors, when searching for a temporary president, stated the "interim" president — it used that word; Gee hates it and refused to let others call him interim — would not be a candidate for the full-time position.

But by March, that thought changed, for Gee and the university. WVU officials asked him to stay on and he agreed. Now, 1,460 days later, Gee doesn't plan on leaving and sees a bright future for WVU.

"We continue to attract terrific students. I believe I can actually feel from the business community and the leadership of this state, through the governor's office and legislative leadership, people believe this university plays a significant role in their lives. I think our next three or four years are just going to be outstanding."

Then and now

It is not Gee's first time at WVU, as he served as president in the 1980s.

Returning to WVU was like learning to ride a bike again, Gee said. He knew about the state and its people, but he had to reinvent himself as the university had dramatically changed since his first stint.

"I must say, of the institutions I have served, none have come further in 35 years than has West Virginia University," Gee said.

Gee quickly points out some of the successes the university has seen in his four years. Those include a commitment to research, the 20 percent of the freshman class enrolled in the honors college, and a statewide report and collaboration to move West Virginia's economy forward.

Challenges remain the same and are shared across higher education, Gee said. There are always people who want more money, and resources to meet those demands are always limited.

"So we have to be very

creative and we need to continue to make the case to the state. The most important investment they can continue to make to the state is in the university and its capacity to create jobs and the opportunity to keep learning from people here."

A sense of purpose

Gee has become well-known for his interaction with students. Often he can be seen posing for a selfie or at a downtown club, celebrating a 21st birthday.

"I love these students, I really do. These here, they have a sense of purpose. They also do not have a sense of arrogance."

Gee said he couldn't feel more blessed to serve as a father — or grandfather, as one student called him — to the 33,000 students. But he also said one of the challenges is student culture.

Early in Gee's tenure, there were a few high-profile incidents involving student behavior, and Gee has focused on improving that atmosphere — often saying that students need to work hard and play hard. He said peer responsibility and treating students like adults with increased responsibility is an enormous aspect.

"If you treat students like kids, they are going to act like kids. If you treat students like adults with responsibilities, then they are going to rise to the occasion, and ours certainly have."

One area of focus for students and their parents has been the ever-increasing tuition. The increases have occurred each year of Gee's tenure.

Today, in-state undergraduate tuition runs about \$9,000 a year.

Gee said the issue with tuition becomes a balancing act of making sure students aren't priced out, along with the need to fund the university.

"Tuition is about as complex as you can possibly imagine. The tug is, don't raise it; the pull is, you diminish the quality of the institution. So it's that tug and pull that we have to constantly balance."

As the university has raised tuition, it has also increased financial aid and donation efforts to offset some of the costs, Gee said.

No. 1 role

Another big part of Gee's schedule is working with staff, faculty and other WVU employees.

"Our faculty are remarkably, remarkably able, and most important, they are committed to the institution. That institutional commitment isn't found in a lot of places.

"I've been president of institutions that are not nearly as good as they think they are. I'm president of an institution that is much better than sometimes it gives itself credit. Sometimes I've seen that in our faculty and others. It's what I call negative elitism."

Part of WVU's longstanding challenge has been retaining talented faculty and staff and not losing them to private industries or other schools. Gee said he doesn't want

to be the farm club — a baseball reference where minor leagues are referred to as farm clubs that provide talent to the big leagues — for other institutions. Instead, he wants to poach from them.

The university recruited heavily and in some medical positions landed some of the best in their particular fields, Gee said.

There have also been efforts to keep faculty members at WVU.

"The No. 1 role for a university president is to recruit faculty every day. We want their options to be limited so they stay here with us."

Making the case

Gee embarked on improving WVU's relationship with the rest of the state and spends the summer traveling to each of the 55 counties.

The tour, Gee said, allows him to understand how the university can affect the quality of life in West Virginia. It's also a chance to show off WVU and explain why the university is an investment.

"In the end, if we hide our light under a bushel, if we are arrogant enough to say, 'Why don't people to understand what we are doing?' we will never be successful."

The relationship with the state doesn't end with the tour. It includes making the case to state leaders that the university is an investment, an investment that drives the economy for the state, and that effort takes on increased importance as state appropriations shrink.

"We need to continue to make the case to the state that the most important investment they can continue to make, [the most important investment] to the state is in this university and its capacity to create jobs and opportunity."

Gee also works locally with the city and county on various issues. Gee talked about the importance of regionalism and working with other states. He also talked about Morgantown, WVU's home.

Gee said he knows the Morgantown infrastructure can't handle more WVU students and that is why the university is looking to its other campuses for growth.

A helping hand

Gee talked about the pillars of the university. Its faculty, staff and how each is needed in the overall picture. He discussed how the university's perception of itself has changed internally and externally over the years.

"I think that we have moved from being an institution that has been fairly insecure about itself to an institution that views itself as leading what I would call the land grant revolution. We are about community-building, we are about being a helping hand, not an ivory tower. And we're about making sure the future of this state is tied to the future of this university in very compatible ways."

Gee, even at 71, is still full of energy and excitement for WVU and its future.

He hopes those who come to Morgantown early in their lives return later when they are ready to give back. It's an area that offers medical service, arts and sports all under one old gold and blue roof.

"Wouldn't it be great to be a place where people come, they go to school, they go off and do their work. Then toward the end of their career they say, 'I want to return to Morgantown and I want to be part of that community?' What a wonderful circle of life."

"Kinda like you?"

Gee only lets off a wily smile, perhaps realizing he just described himself to a T.

After 35 years outside its borders, he again found his home among the hills. "I'm living proof of that."

"From my memory, she always had MS," he said.

But, as is the case with any degenerative illness, it became tougher on his mother, and on him and his family, as the disease progressed.

"It was hard for me to see, especially those last few years," Riley said. "It was problem after problem, struggle after struggle just to do basic things, as most people with MS find themselves unable to do simple everyday tasks."

"They still want to be

themselves, they want to be independent, and that's really hard when they have a disease like MS. It basically makes them unable to do these things. I know she was very devastated when she wasn't able to walk, as most people obviously would be. But, she still wanted to have some independence, and it was really hard for her when she realized that it would be almost impossible, and I feel like that's what most people (who have MS) hate the most."

Ultimately, the memory of his mother will fuel his motivation as he undertakes this journey.

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Graham’s admirers line N.C. roads on route of motorcade

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Well-wishers lined freeway overpasses and small-town streets to honor the late Rev. Billy Graham as his motorcade crossed his beloved home state of North Carolina for four hours on Saturday from his mountain chapel to namesake library in the state’s largest city.

Adults and children stood behind wooden barricades and yellow tape, police officers saluted, and admirers captured the moment on cellphones along the route. Fire trucks parked on overpasses along Interstate 40.

Pallbearers, followed by family members, carried the coffin into the Billy Graham Library, in Charlotte, which will serve as a backdrop for the evangelist’s funeral.

Franklin Graham said he was fulfilling a promise to take his father’s body to Charlotte. He said he was overwhelmed by the “outpouring of love we are seeing as we travel.”

The motorcade for “America’s Pastor,” which began at the training center operated by Graham’s evangelistic association in Asheville, was a chance for residents in some of the evangelist’s favorite places to pay tribute. Graham often shopped or caught trains in Black Mountain. He made his home in the nearby community of Montreat.

“He has never really reveled in all of the celebrity. It’s come with the territory,” said Joe

Tyson, a family friend who runs a furniture store in Black Mountain, where he watched the procession. “But they’ve managed to live a very normal life for such famous people. And I think he’d be very proud that his neighbors turned out and quietly celebrated his reward and his passage into heaven.”

Graham, who died Wednesday at his home in North Carolina’s mountains, at age 99, reached hundreds of millions of listeners around the world with his rallies and his pioneering use of television.

A viewing will be held at the Billy Graham Library in Charlotte on Monday and Tuesday. Graham will also lie in honor in the U.S. Capitol Rotunda on Wednesday and Thursday, the first time a private citizen has been accorded such recognition since civil rights hero Rosa Parks, in 2005.

The procession was part of more than a week of mourning that culminates with his burial Friday.

A man played bagpipes at a highway rest area near Marion, where an overpass was draped with flags from about 15 nations. In Black Mountain, a group sang “Amazing Grace.”

Motorists lined sidewalks and medians as the motorcade rolled through Charlotte and neared the Graham library, which was closed as mourners laid flowers and awaited arrival of the evangelist’s casket.

Graham will be laid to rest at the foot of a cross-shaped walkway at the library in Charlotte.

Her agent John Grant said Saturday that Chambers died of natural causes Wednesday evening.

“Over the years, Emma created a wealth of characters and an immense body of work. She brought laughter and joy to many, and will be greatly missed,” he said.

Chambers was well known in Britain for her role as Alice Tinker in the long-running “The Vicar of Dibley” comedy. Dawn French, who co-starred with Chambers in the popular show, told Britain’s Press Association she will miss Chambers very much. “Emma was a very bright spark and the most loyal and loving friend anyone could wish for,” French said.

Chambers also had a long career in a variety of television and film roles.

Emma Freud, the wife of “The Vicar Of Dibley” cre-

ator Richard Curtis, said on Twitter that Chambers was a “beautiful friend.”

“We’re very very sad. She was a great, great comedy performer, and a truly fine actress. And a tender, sweet, funny, unusual, loving human being,” Freud tweeted.

Actor Hugh Grant, part of the “Notting Hill” cast, called Chambers “a hilarious and very warm person and of course a brilliant actress.”

Chambers was born in Doncaster and trained at the Webber Douglas Academy of Dramatic Art.

‘Lost Tapes’ series examines Malcolm X in his words

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — Malcolm X was reviled and adored during his lifetime thanks to his views of black nationalism and “by any means necessary” approach to battle racial discrimination. Following his assassination, the civil rights advocate’s popularity was revived by hip-hop artists in the late 1980s and early ’90s, and his image began appearing on clothing, college dorm posters and eventually in a Spike Lee 1992 biopic.

Now a Smithsonian Channel documentary is examining the life of Malcolm X through rare footage from his speeches and media interviews to let the slain leader speak to a new generation using his

own words.

“The Lost Tapes: Malcolm X,” scheduled to premiere at 8 p.m. Monday, follows the advocate’s changing philosophy from a Nation of Islam black separatist to a figure seeking to build multiethnic coalitions during the tumultuous 1960s civil rights era. But it also contains never-before-seen footage of the outspoken advocate at rallies with Nation of Islam leader and eventually foe, Elijah Muhammad.

Like other pieces in “The Lost Tapes” series, which is in its second season, the documentary uses only images and video clips from the time period and doesn’t insert contemporary voices or scholars to interpret what the audi-

ence sees. Only sentences are added to images to give background information.

Malcolm X, who later changed his name to El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz following his pilgrimage in Mecca, came to national prominence in the late 1950s as the leader of the Nation of Islam’s Temple Number 7 in Harlem, N.Y.

He often was critical of civil rights leaders, like the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., for practicing nonviolent resistance to segregation and called them “traitors” and “chumps.” But he later broke with Elijah Muhammad over disagreements about speaking out on police violence, President John F. Kennedy’s assassination and news that Muhammad

had fathered children from teen followers.

Producer Tom Jennings put together the project with the idea of making viewers feel they were transported through a time machine to see events unfold as they happened.

“The audience is waiting for the narrator to show up and save them,” Jennings said. “But the footage tells the story alone. This forum is very rewarding.”

For example, “The Lost Tapes” shows footage from a July 1959 television documentary called “The Hate That Hate Produced,” which introduced Malcolm X and the Chicago-based Nation of Islam to a wider audience.

City seeks election feedback

Weighs changes to schedule and length of terms

KINGWOOD COUNCIL meets at 7 p.m. Tuesday at city hall.

KINGWOOD — Kingwood Council is considering moving

city elections to coincide with the state's and lengthening its terms to four years.

Council is asking anyone with an opinion on the matter to voice it at Tuesday's council meeting.

Council members, the mayor and recorder serve two years. The next city election is in 2019.

Mayor Jean Guillot said if the town holds its elections the same year as the state, it can save money.

It costs about \$6,500 for the city to pay poll workers, and print and publish the ballot. If the elections are held in conjunction with the county, it will cost about \$1,500,

because the town will reimburse the county half the cost of poll-workers in the city and pay its portion of publication fees.

Preston County uses electronic voting machines, so Kingwood's ballot would appear on the electronic ballot in precincts in city limits.

Bruceton Mills and Rowlesburg city offices are already voted on the same schedule as the state and will be on the primary ballot in May.

The mayor said the question of four-year versus two-year terms came up for a couple reasons.

"It takes you a while to figure out what's going on," Guillot said. "By the time you get comfortable, and you know what's going on, you're a year into your term."

In addition, state law does not permit councils to obligate future councils on money matters, such as buying a garbage truck.

"So if you have four years, you could do something and you have four years to spread your payments out, rather than two years," he said.

There would be further cost savings in running an election every four years, rather than two,

the mayor said.

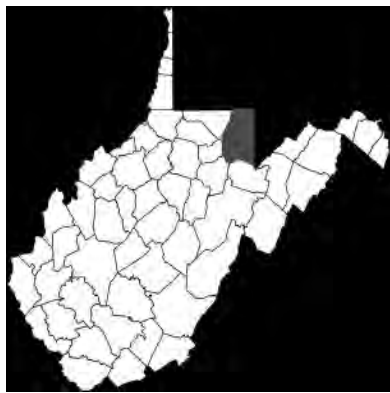
City attorney Sheila Williams said a change in city law is required to move elections or change term lengths.

Part of that would be that, when city elections are held next year, terms will be for three years. That would make the next city election coincide with state elections.

"The next decision is whether thereafter they want to be elected for two years or four years," Williams said.

Art of weaving stays alive in Preston

ARTHURDALE — The history of weaving dates back to the stone age, and it's being carried on in Preston County's New Deal community.

Weaving can be done by hand or by using machines, called looms.

AmeriCorps member Jane Gilchrist, who is teaching a class in weaving at Arthurdale Heritage, said she learned to weave when she was 12 years old.

Gilchrist said weaving is an important part of Arthurdale history. "I believe Eleanor Roosevelt would be smiling on us," she said. "Because she believed people should be self sufficient."

Gilchrist and her students are working to weave six rugs for the Arthurdale Museum House that will be opening for the first time this spring. "Once we finish this project, the students will be able to buy the material and weave rag rugs for themselves to take home," she said.

The museum house is one of the original 50 homes built under the Roosevelt administration's New Deal project.

"The houses had woven rugs and curtains," Gilchrist said. "We're weaving six rag rugs to replace the original rugs be-

cause people will be walking on them." She said replacing the rugs would preserve the original rugs and still represent the way the house would have been when it was new.

Gilchrist said the six rugs she and the students are making will be woven on a loom built in Arthurdale. "The loom was made by Alex Mayer. He was a woodworker who came from Scotts Run. His wife, Rosie, was a weaver," she said.

Pat Adams, who attends the weaving class, said she is weaving a shawl. "I call myself a beginner," she said. "I've made a few things in the past." She met Gilchrist while looking for a floor loom. "Jane helped me a lot with my decision of what loom to buy,"

Adams said.

Another student, Rita Mulkeen, said she hopes to become a weaver.

"While I was traveling, I saw a little loom in a craft store for \$35. I liked the wood it was made of, so I bought it. Later, I saw an Arthurdale Heritage ad about learning to weave." She welcomed the opportunity to both learn and help build the community.

Linda Flemmer said she is a beginning weaver. "I knew how to spin but not how to weave. Learning to weave is something different," she said.

In an email, Gilchrist said Arthurdale Heritage is beginning community outreach pro-

Honor soldiers wounded or dead in action

Preston becomes a Purple Heart County

KINGWOOD — Preston County Commissioners signed a proclamation last week, making this a Purple Heart County.

Dr. James L. McCormick, junior vice commander for the West Virginia chapter of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, spoke to the commission about the designation.

The Purple Heart is awarded to members of the military who are wounded in action or to their families, if the soldier does not survive the wound. The Military Order of the Purple Heart was created in 1932 "for the protection and mutual interest of all who have received the decoration."

Among the group's initiatives is a Purple Heart Trail Program, a symbolic trail through all 50 states that commemorates those who were awarded the medal. He recalled a New England town that named its streets in honor of service members.

It reminded him that "we have the freedom to drive around, the freedom to provide these wonderful things, and it's provided by people like that young man right there who gave every one of his tomorrows," said McCormick, who is the third generation of his family to be awarded the Purple Heart.

There is also a service component to the organization.

Many places, McCormick said, offer a parking space to be used only by Purple Heart recipients. In some instances, it is painted purple with white edges, much like the medal.

Preston commissioners evidenced a desire to designate a parking spot, and McCormick gave them a plaque to place at the spot. McCormick said he would like to return when the parking spot is dedicated.

"We were behind it when we saw the name," Commission President Craig Jennings said. The parking spot can also serve as a teaching experience when children ask about it, he noted.

trained 162 people on the Stop the Bleed initiative. In addition, the center also held train-the-trainer days, which resulted in 147 new Stop the Bleed instructors, who can now go out and train others.

Center staff members have provided and will continue to provide courses to law enforcement, sororities and fraternities at WVU, businesses and other groups interested in complet-

ing the training.

"We'd like to place a hemorrhage control kit everywhere there is an AED (automated external defibrillator)," said Dr. Jennifer Knight Davis, medical director of the Jon Michael Moore Trauma Center, said.

"No one — child or adult — should die from hemorrhage before he or she gets to the hospital, if it can be prevented. As the trauma center of the state's only academic medical center, it is our job to teach others how to control preventable bleeding."

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Damascus suburb airstrikes kill scores; U.N. votes for cease-fire

BEIRUT — A new wave of airstrikes and shelling on eastern suburbs of the Syrian capital Damascus left at least 22 people dead and dozens wounded Saturday, raising the death toll of a week of bombing in the area to 500.

Meanwhile, the U.N. Security Council unanimously approved a resolution demanding a 30-day cease-fire across Syria.

The weeklong bombardment overwhelmed rescuers and doctors at makeshift hospitals, many of which have also been bombed. Activists say that terrified residents have been hiding in underground shelters where dozens of people can be crammed into small places.

The latest wave of bombings came after the U.N. Security Council delayed a vote on a resolution demanding a 30-day humanitarian cease-fire for two days to try to get Russia on board.

Russia's U.N. ambassador, Vassily Nebenzia, had repeatedly called an imme-

diated cease-fire unrealistic.

In a bid to get Russian support, sponsors Kuwait and Sweden amended the draft resolution late Friday to drop a demand that the cease-fire take effect 72 hours after the resolution's adoption.

After two hours of additional negotiations on Saturday, the Security Council unanimously approved a resolution demanding a 30-day cease-fire across Syria "without delay" to deliver humanitarian aid to millions and evacuate the critically ill and wounded.

"The U.N. convoys and evacuation teams are ready to go," Sweden's U.N. Ambassador Olof Skoog told the council just before the vote.

After the vote, many council members urged stepped up efforts to ensure a cease-fire and get assistance to millions in need.

Russia has been a main backer of Syrian President Bashar Assad since the country's conflict began, seven years ago. In 2015, Moscow joined the war on

Assad's side, tipping the balance of power in his favor.

Syrian opposition activists say Russian warplanes are taking part in bombarding Damascus suburbs known as eastern Ghouta, where many people are hiding in underground shelters with little food and medical supplies amid a tight government siege.

"There is no electricity, no water, no flour, no bread and no baby formula," paramedic Siraj Mahmoud said in an audio message calling for a short break in airstrikes so residents can get food for their children. "There is nothing inside Ghouta."

Syrian opposition activists said that government forces used phosphorous bombs in their attacks on the suburbs, but the claims could not be independently confirmed.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said airstrikes that hit several suburbs left 22 people dead in different areas, including 10 in the suburb of Douma.

Colombia extradites drug suspect

BOGOTA, Colombia — A suspected drug chief known as the "Pablo Escobar of Ecuador" was extradited to the United States on Saturday, Colombia's chief prosecutor's office announced.

Washington Edison Prado tried unsuccessfully to prevent extradition by claiming membership in the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia — a status that would have made him eligible for a type of amnesty under a peace deal.

The prosecutor's office said in a statement that Prado was escorted by a detail of 50 commandos and agents of various police agencies as he was turned over to U.S. authorities.

4 arrested in case of missing Italians

MEXICO CITY — Four municipal police officers were arrested Saturday in the disappearance of three Italians last heard from more than three weeks ago in western Mexico. Authorities said the agents apparently handed the men over to a criminal gang.

Jalisco state Attorney General Raul Sanchez said at a news conference that the suspects, three men and a woman, all active-duty police officers in Tecalitlan, "confessed" to delivering the Italians to members of an organized crime group oper-

ating in the town.

"They were asked to hand them over," Sanchez said, adding that authorities were still investigating why.

Brazilian arms dealer arrested

RIO DE JANEIRO — Brazilian police said the man considered to be the country's largest arms dealer was arrested in the United States by Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents.

Inspector Fabricio Oliveira, of Rio de Janeiro's police department, said Frederik Barbieri was arrested Saturday, at his home in Florida. He did not know the specific location.

Oliveira said police seized 60 AK-47, AR-10 and G3 rifles Barbieri sent to Rio's international airport last May to supply drug traffickers operating in Rio de Janeiro slums.

Alexander's name pulled from airport

SKOPJE, Macedonia — Macedonia began the process of changing the name of its airport honoring the ancient warrior king Alexander the Great as a goodwill gesture to Greece.

Macedonia and Greece are working to resolve a 25-year dispute over the Macedonia name.

Greece argues that Macedonia's use of it when it gained independence, in 1991, implies territorial claims to its Macedonia province, where Alexander was born.

Necropolis discovered in Egypt

TUNA AL-GABAL, Egypt — Egypt's Antiquities Ministry announced on Saturday the discovery of an ancient necropolis near the Nile Valley city of Minya, south of Cairo.

It's the latest discovery in an area known to house ancient catacombs from the Pharaonic Late Period and the Ptolemaic dynasty.

The large cemetery is located north of the Tuna al-Gabal area, a vast archaeological site on the edge of the western desert.

It hosts a range of family tombs and graves.

"We will need at least five years to work on the necropolis," Antiquities Minister Khaled al-Anani said. "This is only the beginning of a new discovery."

Archaeologists started excavation work in the area late last year, on a quest to find the remainder of the cemetery of Upper Egypt's 15th nome, or territorial division, during ancient times. They found tombs belonging to priests of Thoth, the ancient god of the moon and wisdom.

One tomb includes more than 1,000 statues and four well preserved alabaster canopic jars inscribed with hieroglyphics and designed to hold the mummified internal organs of their owner, who was a high priest of the god Thoth.

The priest's mummy was also found decorated with blue and red beads and bronze gilded sheets.


Archaeologists also uncovered 40 sarcophagi believed to belong to the priest's family members, some bearing the names of their owners in hieroglyphics.

Another tomb includes several coffins, statues depicting ancient priests and other funerary artifacts.

Mostafa Waziri, head of the archaeological mission, said eight tombs have been uncovered so far.

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Calif. governor sets a high bar for vehicle emissions

SAN FRANCISCO — California was on track to meet Gov. Jerry Brown's initial goal for putting 1.5 million environmentally friendly vehicles on the road by 2025, a new report says, but then Brown upped the target. Today, the official state goal stands at 5 million "ze-



ro-emission" vehicles by 2030, and though Brown laid out funding mechanisms that would put \$2.5 billion toward promoting the spread of electric, hybrid and hydrogen vehicles through consumer rebates and development of charging stations and other infrastructure, significant hurdles remain.

The funding will depend on state budgets crafted after Brown leaves office, in January 2019, on the economy

remaining healthy enough to sustain the green-vehicle spending, and on the price and availability of cobalt and lithium for car batteries.

Other challenges confront the push for electric cars and other Earth-friendly vehicles, but a new report from San Francisco nonprofit Next 10 and research firm Beacon Economics reveals significant increases in the use of so-called zero-emission vehicles (hybrids use electricity

and petroleum fuels). As of October, more than 335,000 of the vehicles were sold in California, and sales leaped 29 percent from 2016 to 2017, the report said.

The Mercury News spoke with F. Noel Perry, founder of Next 10, about the future of green transportation in California. His comments were edited for length and clarity. And yes, Perry drives an electric car.

Q: Why are electric vehicles a focus for Next 10?

A: Transportation emissions in California for the last year that we have statistics for, which is 2015, actually went up by 2.7 percent, and within that sector the car emissions went up by 3.1 percent. As a state, we need to get those numbers going in the opposite direction.

Q: Why should someone go out and buy an electric car right now?

A: They can make a huge contribution to reducing carbon dioxide emissions

— that's the most important reason. There are advantages in terms of going into the carpool lane. Electric vehicles are becoming (price) competitive with internal combustion engines. In our report we looked at the life-cycle cost of ... electric cars, hybrid electric cars, gas-powered cars and we found that, for example, the Nissan Leaf and the Smart car are competitive right now, even without (government) incentives.

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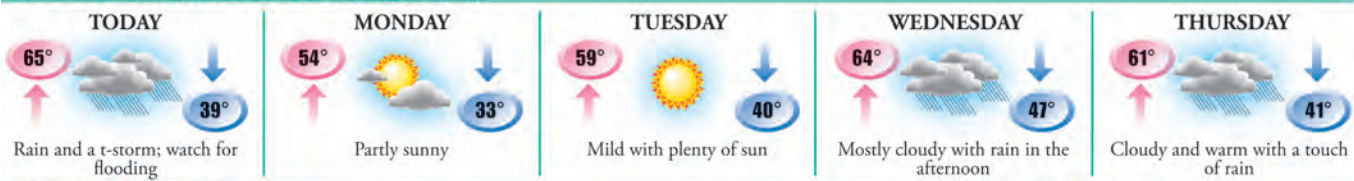

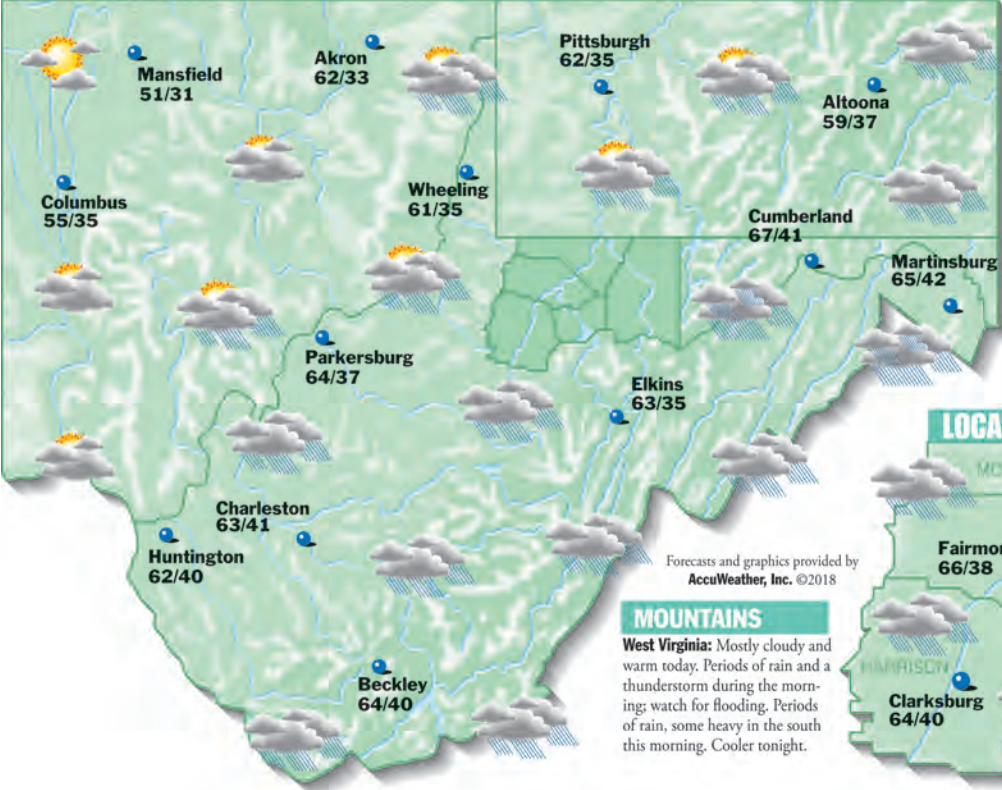

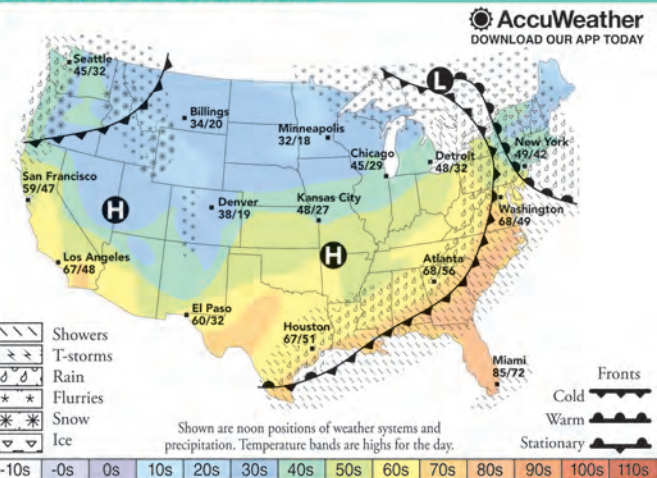

Also for the Hawks, Jace Stockett (106) and Ben Gribble (220) took fourth place, while Brise Bennett (132) took sixth.

It was strong showing for Gribble, being it was his first season as a wrestler: The UHS fullback in football split two matches Saturday to take fourth. He beat Payton Lunsford, of Hurricane, 4-3, but Dylan Park of Wheeling Park scored a 3-2 win in the consolation finals.

Gribble's other loss was 3-1 to Ripley's B.J. Haynes in the semifinals Friday night.

The constant juggling act of graduation within college sports hasn't been kind to the WVU football team the last few years.

Whenever the Mountaineers offense was expected to excel with eight or nine returning starters, the defense was depleted and had to replace eight or nine starters. The next season, the defense would return a bunch, but the offense needed to pick up the pieces.

The offense and defense couldn't make it work during the same season — until this year. WVU returns seven starters on offense and six on defense.

Each unit on defense loses a key component from last fall's team, but overall, there is plenty of experience and production back to make a run for a team with high expectations heading into Tuesday's beginning of spring practice.

Here is a, defensive position outlook for WVU heading into spring camp:

Defensive line

Adam Shuler II's announcement Wednesday that he was leaving the program was a big blow at defensive end for the Mountaineers. However, Ezekiel Rose stepped in and split time with Shuler and nearly overtook the starting job from him, anyway.

Rose will likely start at defensive end, while Reese Donahue returns opposite him. Sophomore Lamonte McDougle started the second half of the season as a freshman at defensive tackle and did not let go.

As for the backup roles, sophomores Darius Stills and Jeffery Pooler, and senior Jaleel Fields will add depth.

Linebacker

Replacing "Mike" LB Al-Rasheed Benton will not be easy because of his production on the field and lead-

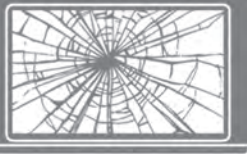

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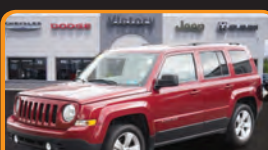
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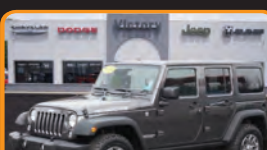
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Ridgeway powers Hawks past Knights

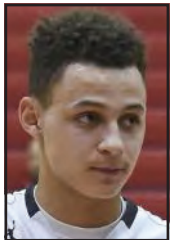
UHS BOYS 83 PRESTON 47

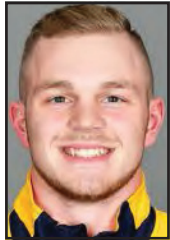

making threes, making hard cuts, and guarding their man intensely," said Trinity head coach John Fowkes. "It was the best four quarters we might have played all year."

The Warriors demolished the Titans in every facet of the game, strangling their opponents with full-court pressure from the opening whistle while demonstrating exceptional ball movement and transition offense.

"They played for each other. They shared the ball, they talked on defense, and they were swarming like angry yellow jackets in that press," Fowkes said. "At times, Gilmer couldn't get up the court. That's what we asked these guys to do, and they responded."

The aggressive style of play is made possible by the depth that the Warriors bring off the bench, as well as a willingness to play with passion from buzzer-to-buzzer and share minutes.

It's a philosophy that Fowkes preaches day in and day out, and has worked to instill in his athletes since day one of the season.

"What we talked about in the locker room, I told them I want them to play so hard, I have to scrape them off the floor and put someone else in," Fowkes said. "That's how hard we want them to play. Tonight we did that, and you saw what the result was."

Fowkes also noted the advantages that such depth and talent present for his squad.

"The depth at this little school is crazy. We feel like we have Class AAA depth. A lot of Class A schools, you

look and they go five or six deep," Fowkes said. "Gilmer played seven guys tonight, well, we played thirteen. And with the rotation, I had nine or ten guys in to begin with."

"It's a good problem to have; it makes for better practices as well. We know our kids are being challenged every day."

And, more importantly to Fowkes, it demonstrates the ability of his team to rise up in the face of adversity, and the desire to sacrifice personal glory for team success; in his mind, to key aspects to successful teams. "It's not a bunch of self-absorbed individuals. It's a great group of kids that love each other and want to win," he said.

The Warriors will advance to the Class A Sectional Semifinals, where they will host the winner of Doddridge County and South Harrison. The semifinal matchup is scheduled for a 7:00 p.m. tip-off Tuesday evening.

"It's just on to the next one. We're focused on what we have to do to get out of the sectionals," Fowkes said. "That's our goal right now, just to take it one game at a time."

No obvious name stands out to replace him, unless others are moved from outside to inside. Brendan Ferns is coming off a shoulder injury that ended his season after four games, and Adam Hensley, Zach Sandwisch and Logan Thimons don't have much experience. All should get a chance to prove themselves at Mike.

David Long, arguably the best defender the Mountaineers have, returns at "Will," unless it's decided he can move inside. Long had 76 tackles, including 16 1/2 for loss, after missing the first month of the season recovering from knee surgery.

At "Sam," Dylan Tonkery started for Long until he came back, but was too good to keep off the field, to he split time with Xavier Preston. Tonkery finished with 43 tackles and 6 1/2 for loss. Now a sophomore, he can settle into his new role.

Junior-college transfer Charlie Benton and early-enrollee Josh Chandler will have a chance to compete in spring.

Cornerback

For the third year in a row, WVU must replace both starting corners. Mike Daniels and Elijah Battle graduated after taking a majority of the reps.

Hakeem Bailey started a few games and should be the favorite to reclaim that spot. The other is a tossup between players without much, if any, experience — Keith Washington, Kevin Williams, Sean

Mahone, Jake Long and Fontez Davis will all battle it out this spring.

Kenny Robinson started as a freshman at cornerback but was moved to safety, where he thrived. He could get reps at cornerback to see if he could make the switch, though it would hurt depth at safety.

Safety

Kyzir White leaves a void at "spur," but the rest of the safeties are set in stone.

Robinson's move to free safety changed the entire complexion of the defense last season. If he stays there, Dravon Askew-Henry will have a camp to practice at bandit after being moved there mid-season.

Toyous Avery is a diamond in the rough, he can try to take the spur spot, as well as provide depth behind Askew-Henry, as bandit. The same goes for Derek Pitts and Jovanni Stewart, who played in depth roles last year.

Other names who could get into the mix at redshirt freshmen E.J. Brown and Exree Loe, and JUCO transfer Josh Norwood.

Punter

Billy Kinney has been WVU's punter the last two years, but was threatened by Jonn Young throughout last season.

Young has since transferred, so Kinney's job is safe during camp and it could be a time for him to set the bar.

Jags working on deal with Bortles

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Blake Bortles might not be the long-term answer in Jacksonville.

He is, however, the short-term starter.

The Jaguars signed Bortles to a three-year, \$54 million deal Saturday that will keep him under contract through the 2020 season. The deal includes \$26.5 million guaranteed.

"I definitely was looking forward to the opportunity of this happening, and knowing that it was done and now in the rear-view mirror, we can move on and get back to just worrying about football and not having to deal with

money and contracts and all that stuff," Bortles said during a conference call with reporters. "Either way, however this went, I don't think it would have had a ton of effect on how I feel. Thrilled to be able to stay here and playing Jacksonville and fired up to continue to work with the guys that are here."

The team announced the move one day after handing out two-year extensions to top executive Tom Coughlin, coach Doug Marrone and general manager Dave Caldwell.

Re-signing the 25-year-old Bortles is an indication how the front office and coaching staff feel about their current roster: They

want to keep as many pieces in place for another run at the Super Bowl.

The Jaguars (10-6) won the AFC South for the first time in team history and made the playoffs for the first time in a decade. They advanced to the AFC title game for the first time since 2000, losing to New England 24-20.

Bortles showed signs of progress in his fourth year despite playing 19 games with a partially torn ligament in his right wrist that required surgery last month. He completed a career-high 60 percent of his passes for 3,687 yards, with 21 touchdowns and 13 interceptions.

"Blake's growth and de-

velopment last season was a key to the success we had as a team," Coughlin said in a statement. "Blake has proven, with toughness and dependability, that he can be the leader this team needs going forward. Along with this contract come high expectations that he will continue to improve and help our team accomplish its ultimate goal."

He played in the first year of coordinator Nathaniel Hackett's system and with four rookies — including running back Leonard Fournette and left tackle Cam Robinson — on offense. He also lost top target Allen Robinson on the opening series of the season opener.

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IOC yet to decide on Russians

PYEONGCHANG, South Korea — The International Olympic Committee has left a decision whether to reinstate Russia to the Pyeongchang Olympics until the day of the closing ceremony.

The IOC must announce by Sunday if the Russian Olympic Committee will be readmitted to the Olympic family after being ousted because of a massive doping scandal. That would allow about 160 Russian athletes competing at the Pyeongchang Games to fly their own flag at the closing ceremony. They have been competing in South Korea under a neutral flag under the name “Olympic Athletes from Russia.”

After four hours of meetings Saturday, the IOC said it hadn’t yet reached a decision. And that left all options open.

The IOC could readmit the Russian team, continue the ban or hedge with what it has described as a “partial solution.”

“The deliberation will continue tomorrow and their decision has yet been taken,” IOC spokesman Mark Adams said.

Two strikes against readmission are positive doping tests by two Russian athletes at the games, including a curler who had to forfeit his bronze medal. That’s half of the four doping cases reported so far at this year’s Olympics.

The positive tests come after the IOC had said Russian athletes had been “rigorously tested” months before the games — and during them.

Almost three months ago, IOC President Thomas Bach and the dozen members of the IOC’s executive board acted alone to ban Russia. But Adams could not explain who would decide this time: the executive board, or the full membership meeting on Sunday.

Before the executive board meeting, Adams said the Russian scandal would be debated by the full membership on Sunday, “but whether there will be a vote or not, I’m not able to say.”

U.S. tops Sweden for curling gold

GANGNEUNG, South Korea — John Shuster’s last throw in the eighth end of the Olympic curling final clacked off one Swedish stone and knocked it into another, sending them both skittering out of scoring range.

Five yellow-handled American rocks were left behind.

The score, known as a five-ender, is so rare it has only been topped once before in the history of the men’s or women’s Olympic final. And it effectively clinched gold for Shuster’s erstwhile “rejects,” who rallied from the brink of pool play elimination to claim only the second curling medal ever for the United States.

“It’s hard to rationalize wanting to do it,” vice-skip Tyler George said after the Americans beat favored Sweden 10-7 in nine ends in the gold medal match on Saturday. “But then days like this happen.”

With the King of Sweden and Ivanka Trump looking on—and bolstered by social media messages from actor Mr. T, NFL

quarterback Aaron Rodgers and speedskater Dan Jansen — Shuster skipped the Americans from a 2-4 record at the start of pool play to five wins in a row, starting with a victory over three-time defending Olympic champion Canada.

No U.S. curling team, men or women, had ever

beaten Canada at the Winter Games.

Shuster’s team did it again in the semifinals.

That set up a gold medal match with Sweden, the world championship runner-up and top winner in pool play, including a 10-4 victory over the Americans on Feb. 16.

After three back-and-

forth ends in the final, the Swedes squandered a point in the fourth despite having the last-rock advantage known as the hammer. (The call was too close to be made with the naked eye; an umpire measured it with a gadget that goes to the millimeter.)

From there, Sweden was playing catch-up.

Tied 5-5 in the eighth, but with the Americans controlling the hammer, Sweden skip Niklas Edin failed on a double-takeout, clearing away just one of the two stones he was aiming for. That left Shuster with a relatively mundane shot for an almost unprecedented score. (Canada’s six-ender in the 2006 men’s final was the only other score of more than four in an Olympic gold medal match).

“During the entire end we could kind of feel it building. Their margin for error got really small,” Shuster said in the news conference with teammates team Tyler George, Matt Hamilton, John Landsteiner and alternate Joe Polo. “I can’t tell you how un-nervous I was sitting in the hack to throw it. Just let it go.”

The Americans played defense in the ninth end to avoid giving up a big score. Sweden scored two, but with the hammer going to the United States for the 10th, a victory was out of reach.

Without pros, Olympic hockey a tough sell

GANGNEUNG, South Korea — Olympic hockey has survived without the NHL, it just hasn’t thrived.

Empty seats in the stands and a lack of big names on the ice have left the men’s tournament struggling to generate much buzz, especially when compared to the thrilling best-on-best final in the women’s competition.

Rene Fasel, the head of the International Ice Hockey Federation, said Saturday he was “disappointed” the NHL didn’t come to the Pyeongchang Games and wants the pros back for 2022, but he played down the importance of their absence.

“You don’t need caviar every day. You can also live with leberkaese and weiswurst,” he said, referring to traditional German meatloaf and sausage.

Germany’s 4-3 semifinal

win over Canada showed how the non-NHL format can deliver surprise results, but also highlighted players who wouldn’t have come near an Olympic team in previous years. Canada’s goaltender for that game was Kevin Poulin, who spent part of last season in a semi-pro league in Quebec.

Germany coach Marco Sturm, who played 15 seasons in the NHL, wants the league back.

“All the NHL guys should be in the Olympics,” Sturm said Friday. “That’s just what the event is for and hopefully in the future they will be back on Olympic ice.”

Fasel portrayed Germany’s run to the gold-medal game as a commercial triumph for the IIHF, a way to finally crack a market dominated by soccer, all made possible by the NHL’s absence.

“Not having the NHL is

still a disappointment, but actually with the result yesterday ... in Germany nobody cares if the NHL is here or not,” he said.

Pyeongchang Olympic organizers say they have sold 80 percent of all available hockey tickets, but many matches have been far from 80 percent full.

Men’s games in Pyeongchang have averaged just under 4,600 spectators, but attendances have dropped as the tournament has gone on. Germany’s quarterfinal win over Sweden, an upset of the top-seeded team, was watched by only 2,029 people, according to the IIHF. That makes it the worst attended Olympic men’s game this century.

Only 2,265 watched Canada’s quarterfinal win over Finland, and 4,057 were in the 10,000-capacity Gangneung Hockey Center to see Germany defeat the Canadians — numbers

which would be disappointing even for the world championships, the annual event which is the IIHF’s other non-best-on-best tournament.

“We were disappointed about the quarterfinals for sure, but it’s a non-hockey country,” Fasel said. “I think the pricing was also relatively high for people.”

The IIHF said TV ratings are comparable to the 2014 Sochi Olympics, but he didn’t provide any data.

“We will not have the results during the tournament,” general secretary Horst Lichtner said Saturday, “but what we hear from the broadcasters is very positive. We do not expect big drops and big differences from Sochi.”

Fasel said organizers in Pyeongchang could have filled seats with Olympic volunteers and staff to increase the atmosphere at games, and said the IIHF is already planning to do that

for the 2022 Olympics in Beijing, another country where hockey is a marginal activity. The Chinese club playing in Russia’s Kontinental Hockey League — with the explicit aim of growing the game in China — has sometimes played for home crowds of a few hundred.

The IIHF wants to include the Chinese men’s and women’s national teams in the Olympic tournament in 2022 even though they are far below even the level of the two Korean teams which lost all their games in Pyeongchang.

The men’s team won the fifth tier of the world championships last year, beating the likes of North Korea and New Zealand in front of as few as 100 people. The women’s team has had a little more success and is ranked 19th in the world, between Italy and Kazakhstan.

Not developing new hunters will hurt the sport's future

OUR WHITE-TAILED DEER is the most important game species in West Virginia. In fact, it's the most important game animal in North America.

So, how are deer doing, and how is the hunting community doing relative to past years?

Each year the Quality Deer Management Association (QDMA) puts together their "Whitetail Report". It's a gold mine of information on deer and deer hunting, with data submitted by state wildlife agencies to the QDMA. The only negative is that it runs one year behind. In other words, the 2018 Report that just came out (you can download it free at qdma.com) summarizes the 2016 hunting season.

The total buck harvest for 2016 was 2,818,571, which was four percent higher than 2015. The top buck harvest state was Texas (399,487) and the lowest was Rhode Island (951).

Other states in the top five were Michigan with 196,233 bucks, Wisconsin (156,920), Pennsylvania (149,460), and Georgia (134,456).

The West Virginia harvest was 51,205 in 2016.

Nineteen of the 37 states where whitetails are hunted shot more bucks in 2016 than the previous five-year average. The West Virginia harvest was 23 percent lower than that of 2015. Nearby states were up and down.

Pennsylvania was up nine percent. Maryland was up two percent, while Virginia was down 13 percent, Ohio was down one

percent and Kentucky was down six percent.

If we look at the bucks harvested per square mile, Michigan was first at 3.5, Pennsylvania and South Carolina both were 3.3, Maryland was 3.1, and Wisconsin 2.9.

West Virginia was at 2.6, Virginia 2.3, Ohio 1.9, and Kentucky harvests 1.8 bucks per square mile.

The states with the greatest buck harvest increase for 2016 compared to the previous five-year average were Texas (28 percent increase), Vermont (23 percent increase), Delaware (18 percent), Pennsylvania (15 percent,) and New Jersey (14 percent).

Those with the greatest buck harvest decrease for 2016 compared to the previous five-year average were Florida (22 percent decrease), Mississippi (13 percent), West Virginia 12 percent, Virginia (9 percent) and South Carolina and South Dakota (8 percent).

One alarming statistic relates to the declining number of hunters everywhere. Since the big money maker for state wildlife agencies is the whitetail, any decrease in deer hunters means less revenue for not only deer management, but management of all species and law enforcement too.

In 2016, there were 11.5 million people 16 years of age and older that hunted. From 2011 to 2016 hunter numbers have dropped by 2.2 million. That's 16 percent and for a five-year period. That's huge.

For that same five-year period, hunters spending dropped by \$11 billion dollars. Whoa.

If we look at the number of deer hunters for 2017, we find that West Virginia had 239,563. Sounds

pretty good until you compare that to the percent change from 2007 and there is a 15 percent decrease. Virginia is down 16 percent, Maryland 12 percent, Pennsylvania five percent, Ohio, is up nine percent, and Kentucky is up 10 percent.

States with the highest increase in the last 10 years are Tennessee with 35 percent increase, Texas (28 percent), Georgia (21 percent), Idaho (17 percent) and Oklahoma (16 percent). Makes me wonder why the increase in those states. What are they doing that works? My guess is that you won't find one magic answer; it's a compilation of many different factors.

States with the largest decrease in deer hunters in the last 10 years are North Dakota down 30 percent, Vermont (20 percent), Colorado (17 percent), Virginia (16 percent) and West Virginia (15 percent).

You would think that a rural state like West Virginia would be a place where youngsters would gravitate to hunting, but apparently that isn't happening. The QDMA points out that hunters are the solution to this problem. Hunters need to support recruitment programs run by the state, and they need to recruit and mentor new hunters.

So far, not much has worked and I'm not sure that enough hunters will ever jump on board and recruit and mentor new hunters. Yes, I have a gloomy outlook on the future of hunting. When hunter numbers drop, who will pay the wildlife management bills?

West Virginia DNR

Monongahela River

The river is currently high and turbid. Fish the tailwater areas below the dams when flows start returning to normal because sauger and walleye can be frequently caught this time of year. Musky move into the tailwater areas below Morgantown Lock and Dam this time of year also and can be caught by shoreline anglers.

Cheat Lake

This time of year, boat anglers need to use the winter boat ramp located at the recreational park near the dam. However, due to heavy precipitation, the lake is high and turbid. The fishing pier below the dam is still closed for repairs.

Tygart Lake

Tygart Lake is nearly 30 feet above summer pool due to the large amount of precipitation over the last week. The Pleasant Creek boat ramp is closed due to high water. The state park



boat ramps are closed due to renovations.

Walleye move through the dam during every high discharge. The flow is currently 15,000 cfs, making the area unfishable. Once the flow is reduced, there should be loads of walleye in the tailwater. Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cubic feet per second). Call the Corps of Engineers telephone hotline at 304-265-5953 for the current lake level and tailwater conditions.

Summersville

The lake is at Winter pool. Smallmouth Bass have been caught from the surface to 25 feet deep.

Walleye, Yellow Perch, Rock Bass, and Bluegill have been caught in the 25-35 foot range. Reports of lots of fish being caught. Walleye regulation signs are posted around the lake, please take notice. Trout were stocked in the tailwaters October 16.

Sutton

Bass are being caught from the surface to 15 feet. Crappie and Bluegill fishing has picked up with cooler water temperatures, look for natural downed trees with the tree-top still present. Before heading to the lake please call Corps of Engineers at 304-765-2705.

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Report: Arizona’s Miller discusses payment on wiretap

Freshman star Deandre Ayton also named

Arizona’s Sean Miller did not coach against Oregon Saturday night, a day after ESPN reported through anonymous sources that he was heard on an FBI wiretap discussing a \$100,000 payment to current Wildcats freshman Deandre Ayton.

The school said Ayton will be eligible to play against the Ducks and associate head coach Lorenzo Romar will lead the No. 14 Wildcats. Arizona also will be without preseason All-American guard Allonzo Trier, who tested positive for the same banned substance that cost him 19 games last season. Trier and Ayton are Arizona’s top

two scorers.

“I believe it is in the best interest of our team that I not coach the game tonight,” Miller said in a statement. “I continue to fully support the University’s efforts to fully investigate this matter and am confident that I will be vindicated. For now, my thoughts are with our team. They are a great group of young men that will support each other and continue their pursuit of winning a Pac-12 championship.”

The school did not specify why Miller won’t coach against Oregon or if he will sit out any other games.

ESPN reported Friday night, citing sources familiar with government evidence, that Miller was heard on a wiretap discussing a \$100,000 payment to Ayton to sign with the school. ESPN did not say its reporter heard the audio directly.

Arizona was caught up in the first round of the corruption scandal in September.

Assistant coach Emanuel Richardson was among 10 people arrested as part of a federal probe alleging bribes and kickbacks were being used to influence star players’ choices of schools, shoe sponsors, agents and other services like tailors and financial managers. Payments of up to \$150,000, supplied by Adidas, were promised to at least three top high school recruits to attend two schools sponsored by the shoe company, according to federal prosecutors.

Richardson was arrested along with assistant coaches from Southern California, Auburn and Oklahoma State.

Shaquille O’Neal’s son, Shareef, announced Saturday on Twitter that he is opening up his recruit-

ment, citing the problems at Arizona. O’Neal is one of the nation’s top high school recruits and previously committed to Arizona.

“At this time I’m am opening up my recruitment due to the current events with the UofA Bball team,” O’Neal tweeted. “I would like to thank all the coaches for recruiting me. At the time my family and I think it’s in my best interest to look at other options to assure my play in the NCAA next year.”

Trier was declared ineligible this week after a trace amount of a banned substance was discovered during a drug test late last month. The school said it believes the substance Trier unknowingly ingested a year ago, and said the NCAA agreed. Trier did not play in Arizona’s 75-65 win over Oregon State on Thursday.

Go figure: Kansas wins 14th straight Big 12 title

LUBBOCK, Texas — Devonte Graham scored 26 points and No. 8 Kansas set an NCAA record with its 14th straight regular-season conference championship, clinching at least a tie for the Big 12 title with a 74-72 victory against sixth-ranked Texas Tech on Saturday.

Graham hit a tiebreaking jumper with 1:30 remaining to help Kansas (23-6, 12-4) to its fourth straight win and a two-game lead over the Red Raiders, who have lost three in a row for the first time this season. The Jayhawks never trailed.

All 14 of the titles have come under coach Bill Self, who finished second in his first season at KU. Four of the previous 13 championships were shared. UCLA won 13 straight Pac-10 titles from 1967-79.

(1) Virginia 66, Pitt 37

PITTSBURGH — No. 1 Virginia allowed just seven points in the first half and secured the regular-season Atlantic Coast Conference title outright with a win over Pittsburgh.

Freshman guard De’Andre Hunter came off the bench to lead the Cavaliers with 14 points in a game

that didn’t take big offensive efforts from Virginia’s regulars. Of the five starters, only guard Ty Jerome exceeded his season average with 13 points.

The game was never competitive, as Virginia started on an 8-0 run and Pitt didn’t make a field goal until Jared Wilson-Frame hit a 3-pointer at the midway point of the first half.

Virginia coach Tony Bennett rested most of his regulars in the second half. Reserve Nigel Johnson

added 12 points on 4-of-6 shooting.

Creighton 89 (3) Villanova 83

OMAHA, Neb. — Marcus Foster scored 28 points, Davion Mintz gave Creighton the lead for good early in overtime, and the Bluejays defeated the highest-ranked opponent in program history with an upset of No. 3 Villanova.

Creighton (20-9, 9-7 Big East), playing without injured starting forward Ron-

nie Harrell Jr., ended a three-game conference losing streak and won for the first time in nine games against Villanova since 2014.

(13) Wichita State 84 SMU 78

DALLAS — Markis McDuffie scored a season-high 26 points off the bench, including nine during the first four minutes of the second half, to lead No. 13 Wichita State to a win over SMU.

The Shockers (23-5, 13-3 American Athletic Conference) have won six straight games and are one-half game behind first-place Cincinnati. Wichita State will host Cincinnati on March 4 in the regular-season finale for both teams.

SMU (16-13, 6-10) lost for the sixth time in seven games since leading scorer Shake Milton (18 points per game) was sidelined with a hand injury.

Big 12 Texas 65 Oklahoma State 64

AUSTIN, Texas — Kerwin Roach II made a driving shot with 1.2 seconds left, giving Texas a victory over Oklahoma State and keeping the Longhorns’ hopes for an NCAA Tournament invitation alive.

Kendall Smith scored seven of the last nine points for Oklahoma State, includ-

ing a jump shot that gave the Cowboys a one-point lead with 22 seconds remaining.

Texas won despite playing the second half without center Mohamed Bamba, who has a left toe injury he suffered on Feb. 24 against Oklahoma.

Dylan Osetkowski led Texas (17-12, 7-9 Big 12) with 13 points and nine rebounds. Roach and Jacob Young scored 12 apiece.

TCU 82, Baylor 72

FORT WORTH, Texas — Alex Robinson scored 15 of his 22 points in the second half and TCU held off Baylor.

After the Bears pulled within three points at 68-65, Robinson banked in a shot and made two free throws in a 7-0 run as TCU (20-9, 8-8 Big 12 Conference) increased the lead to 10 with 1:07 left.

Desmond Bane had 16 points and eight rebounds for the Frogs. Vladimir Brodziansky added 15 points and Kouat Noi 11.

Jo Lual-Acuil Jr. led Baylor (17-12, 7-9) with 22 points, and Mark Vital had 10.

TCU held the Bears’ scoring leader, Manu Lecomte, to five points, 11 below his season average, on 1-of-10 shooting.

Brodziansky scored nine points in the first half, including five of six free

throws. Kenrich Williams didn’t score until the second half, but was a presence with seven rebounds, three assists and two blocks to go with four points.

Other Fairmont State 79 Shepherd 76

SHEPHERDSTOWN — Jason Jolly drained 12 three-pointers to lead Fairmont State to a come-from-behind victory over Shepherd, at the Butcher Center.

Jolly’s 12 three-pointers are the second-most in a single game in program history behind Chase Connor’s 13 three-pointers on Feb. 18, 2016, against West Virginia State. The junior is also closing in on the Fairmont State record for career 3-pointers, with 213. Thad McFadden holds the program record with 216 3-pointers from 2007-’09.

With the win, the Falcons have clinched the No. 3-seed in next week’s Mountain East Conference tournament with a 21-7 overall record and a 17-5 mark in MEC play. Fairmont State will open tournament play, at 2:15 p.m. Friday, against sixth-seeded Concord.

Jolly finished just four points shy of a career-high in the victory with 36 points to go with two assists. Jolly went 12-of-19 from behind the arc.

Lindell Wigginton scored 29 for Iowa State (13-15, 4-12), which was absent three starters and dressed only seven players. That was no match for West Virginia, hungry to avenge a 16-point loss in Ames, on Jan. 31.

Sagaba Konate had coach Bob Huggins boiling after forcing up a contested 19-footer but recovered with a big second half to finish with 14 points, nine rebounds and six blocks.

Daxter Miles scored 14, including 6-of-6 at the foul line as the Big 12’s top foul-shooting team sank 20-of-23.

Losers of four straight, the Cyclones weathered “Press” Virginia — committing only eight turnovers — but were outbounded 47-27.

The 6-foot-2 Carter grabbed seven boards, continuing to stuff the box score, as he’s done across four seasons and 136 games.

“He’s a tough, tough kid,” Iowa State coach Steve Prohm said. “I know Huggs hates to see him go, but the rest of us are probably happy.”

After Wigginton’s banked-in 3-pointer cut the margin to 60-49, Carter attacked for three lay-ups in the span of 37 seconds to

give WVU breathing room. “They were jogging back, and I saw a lot of heads turned, so I drove it as hard as I could,” Carter said.

Prom thought his short-handed team missed its comeback window when Carter started driving.

“I kept telling them, ‘Hey, they’ve been in this situation a couple times here and people have come back and got them.’ But we just couldn’t stop Carter putting pressure on us in the forecourt and it killed us,” Prohm said.

After Huggins called timeout midway through the first half and lit into his players for a sloppy start,

the Mountaineers responded with a 13-2 run to surge ahead, 28-21.

Though Iowa State temporarily rallied to tie it, WVU carried a 39-30 lead into the break thanks to Lamont West’s and-one lay-up with four seconds left.

Winless in nine road games this season, the Cyclones lacked the personnel to keep this one competitive late.

They were missing guard Donovan Jackson (15.9 points per game), who was excused to attend his father’s funeral. Knee injuries have recently sidelined forward Solomon Young (7.2 points, 5.9 rebounds) and Nick Weiler-

Babb (11.3 points, 6.8 assists) for the season.

Iowa State got 12 points from Terrence Lewis and 11 from Jeff Beverly. Cameron Lard grabbed 10 rebounds and Zoran Talley dished out nine assists, but a 15-1 deficit in bench scoring proved lethal.

Davenport also finished in double figures with 14 and 10 points. Freshman guard Ashley Jones added three assists, while King had a team-high seven rebounds.

WVU shot 40.3 percent from the field and 61.5 percent from 3-point range. The Mountaineers were outbounded by the Cowgirls, 40-31, as OSU (19-9, 14-3) used that advantage to score 15 second-chance points. Both teams put up 30 points in the paint.

Threes from Davenport helped WVU to a 10-6 lead midway through the first quarter. Davenport collect-

ed a steal and converted the layup down the other end to stretch the Mountaineer lead to seven, 16-9, with 90 seconds to play. Theresa Ekhehar added two more points in the paint before Ashley Jones hit a jumper in the closing seconds for a 20-11 WVU advantage at the end of the first.

Muldraw opened the scoring with a jumper in the second, then grabbed the steal before Pardee pushed the lead into double-digits with a fast-break layup at 26-16. Ray was fouled as made a three, and her 4-point play put WVU ahead by 13 at 33-20 with 5:37 to go in the second. Another trey from

Ray made it a 14-point lead at 36-22. However, a 10-1 run by the Cowgirls to close the half cut WVU’s lead to just five at 37-32 at the end of the second.

After an OSU triple opened the scoring in the third, Muldraw got the Mountaineers on the board with a 3-point play to put the lead back at five. OSU’s Loryn Goodwin hit the free-throw line, then added back-to-back layups with Pardee 3-pointer in between to tie the game 43-43 with 7:14 to go in the frame. Goodwin’s second layup started an 8-0 run by the Cowgirls as they took a 49-43 lead before Muldraw hit a jumper to

end the run. Pardee hit the free-throw line for a pair, but a late OSU triple had WVU trailing, 56-48 heading into the fourth.

Davenport had the steal and the fast-break layup to start the fourth, then hit the free-throw line for a pair. Back-to-back buckets from Muldraw cut the WVU deficit to six, 62-56, with 5:40 to go. After an OSU free throw, Muldraw drained a 3-pointer to cut the lead to four and added another layup off a pass from Ray to make it a two-point game with WVU trailing 63-61. Pardee hit a three as well, but the Cowgirls countered with a trio of triples for a 12-

point advantage with one minute remaining. Pardee picked up two points at the free-throw line, but the Mountaineers would take the loss, 79-69.

WVU wraps up its regular season, at 3 p.m. Monday, when the Mountaineers travel to third-ranked Baylor.

Rain will make Atlanta track a slippery ride

HAMPTON, Ga. — For NASCAR drivers, the 21-year-old track surface at Atlanta Motor Speedway feels like their favorite, old friend.

A slippery, thrill-packed friend.

"This place is awesome," Ryan Blaney said. "We're slipping and sliding."

The track is overdue for new asphalt, and drivers are renewing their annual plea to give the surface one more year. They love racing on the old 1.54-mile track, patches and all.

"Anytime you get a chance to run in Atlanta with the old track, sliding around, it's always fun," said Austin Dillon, who won last week's Daytona 500 and will start 25th in Sunday's rain-threatened Monster Energy Cup race.

ergy Cup race.

The first few laps in Friday's practice and qualifying let drivers know the Atlanta track is different.

"It's a bit of a surprise to

come here a year later and get reminded of how crazy this place is, how slick it is and how fast it is," said defending Cup champion Martin Truex. "Definitely a

cool place to come knock the rust off."

Kyle Bush, who on Friday won the pole, said it's especially crucial to start from the front in Atlanta.

"Qualifying up front at Atlanta is important," Busch said. "It's so hard on tires here, you don't want to roll back on tires and pass a lot of cars. ... Having to come from behind is harder to do than protect the position you already gained."

The 2017 race was expected to be the farewell for the old surface. Instead, the persistent lobbying effort by drivers helped convince NASCAR and Atlanta Motor Speedway officials to wait at least one more year.

"No decision yet," AMS president Ed Clark said. "We're going to get through the weekend and then look at it again."

Clark said input from drivers on the decision is welcome but not all-important.

The track was repaved for the last time in 1997. An announcement from AMS last year said the decision to delay installing a new surface was made "after an in-depth review and exhaustive consultations with NASCAR, Goodyear, race teams and drivers."

The threat of rain on Sunday led NASCAR on Saturday to move up the scheduled start by one hour, to 1:06 p.m. ET.

According to weather.com, there is an 80 percent chance of rain on Sunday. There is a 100 percent chance of rain on Monday, causing additional complications for NASCAR crews who move equipment to Las Vegas for next week's event.

The track's performance on a wet day could influence the decision to repave the surface before the 2019 race.

"I would say there is not a driver in the garage that

wants to pave this track or wants this track to get repaved," Truex said. "Unfortunately, we are going to find out on Sunday. I think the weather and the circumstances we will have to deal with this weekend are going to be what makes that decision for us."

Dillon aims to become the first driver since Matt Kenseth in 2009 to win the season's first two races.

Rookie Darrell "Bubba" Wallace Jr., who finished second last week, will become the first black driver at an Atlanta Cup race since Bill Lester finished 38th in 2006.

Truex will start 35th after his car didn't pass inspection before Friday's qualifying. Truex's car chief Blake Harris was suspended for the weekend. An additional penalty was a 30-minute practice hold on Saturday.

Woods shoots 69, List in lead

PALM BEACH GARDENS, Fla. — Tiger Woods broke 70 on the PGA Tour for the first time in nine rounds since his return from another back surgery. What mattered more to him was having a Sunday that might mean something at the Honda Classic.

American Luke List is the third-round leader, following a second consecutive 66 (4-under) that put him at 7-under for the tournament. He is one shot ahead of Justin Thomas and Webb Simpson and seven ahead of Woods.

Woods had great control in more strong wind Saturday at PGA National and got up-and-down for birdie on the final hole for a 1-under 69. That left him seven shots out of the lead with 10 players in front of him going into the final round.

"I've got a shot going into tomorrow," Woods said.

The scoring was better in the third round, typical after the cut has been made and in this case with fewer footprints on bare greens. Woods did his part by at least having chances. He putted for birdie on all but four holes, and only one of those birdie chances was longer than 25 feet.

He just didn't make many.

His only birdies were a 6-foot putt on No. 8, a 15-foot putt on the 13th and the tap-in on the par-5 18th. He also made a 20-foot par save on No. 12 after driving into a bunker and having to lay up well short of the green.

"I think this is probably the highest score I could have shot today," Woods said. "I really, really hit it good. I just didn't get anything to go in there for most

of the early part of the round. I gave myself plenty of looks. I just didn't make anything, and I finally made a nice par putt at 12 and made a nice one at 13. Somehow posted under par."

By the books, it was the first time in 917 days that he had a sub-70 round, dating to a 68 in the third round of the 2015 Wyndham Championship. In context, this was only his 12th round on the PGA Tour since then.

Woods had his second and third back surgeries after the Wyndham Championship. He made it through only one PGA Tour event in 2017 — Torrey Pines, where he missed the cut — before having fusion surgery on his lower back last April.

In the latest return, he tied for 23rd at Torrey Pines last month and missed the cut at Riviera last week.

Woods was slowed by double bogeys each of the opening two rounds at the Honda Classic — missing a 3-foot bogey putt on the par-5 third hole on Thursday and hitting into the water on the par-3 15th on Friday.

On Saturday, he dropped shots on both par 3s on the back nine by going over the green, leaving him tough pitches back over the bunker. Those two par 3s, Nos. 15 and 17, played as the second- and third-toughest holes at PGA National in the third round.

His goal Sunday was to post a round under par and see how the players ahead of him fare, especially around the closing holes.

"From what we've seen in the past, anything can happen these last four or five holes," he said. "I'll probably be about an hour or so ahead of the leaders and my responsibility tomorrow is going to go out there and put something in the red and post a number."

Kasatkina runs out of comebacks

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Top-seeded Elina Svitolina retained her Dubai Championships title on Saturday with a 6-4, 6-0 win over unseeded Daria Kasatkina, who was finally unable to make a comeback.

It was the 11th singles title for the 23-year-old Svitolina, who had won a tour-high five titles in 2017, and added Brisbane to that list earlier this year. The fourth-ranked Ukrainian improved to 14-2 for the year.

Kasatkina saved two match points to beat seventh-seeded Johanna Konta in the second round, and three against second-seeded Garbine Muguruza in the semifinals.

But Svitolina was too strong for her Russian opponent in the 70-minute match, including an on-the-run, backhand cross-court shot in the fourth game and a forehand down

the line in the seventh. "I am very pleased with the performance throughout the week," said Svitolina. "When I had to play well, I played well. I did good at important moments. I was serving good, returning well, getting lots of balls back ... Maybe not amazing tennis, but I was pretty solid. It was enough."

Svitolina became the third player in the history of the tournament to successfully defend her title after Justine Henin (2003 and 2004) and Venus Williams (2009 and 2010).

"It feels amazing to have my name with them," Svitolina said. "It really motivated me."

Svitolina made the all-important break in the fifth game of the first set,

and quickly asserted her dominance in the second by going 5-0 up with three breaks, the third coming at love. She then comfortably served out the match.

Coming into the match, Kasatkina had spent a total of 545 minutes on court — against 297 for Svitolina, who also benefited from a first-round bye. But the Russian refused to blame tiredness for her lackluster performance in the final.

"It just happened. It's okay. If you are a top player, you are getting byes, and you are going through the first round. It is what it is," said Kasatkina. "It was tough. I think Elina, she was the toughest opponent for this final."

Despite the loss, the 20-year-old Kasatkina's run in the tournament ensures she will move inside the top 20 when the rankings come out on Monday.

Svitolina had won both previous matchups with Kasatkina who was aiming for her second career singles title.

Delray Beach Open

DELRAY BEACH, Fla. — Germany's Peter Gojowczyk beat American Steve Johnson 7-6 (3), 6-3 on Saturday to reach the Delray Beach Open final.

Gojowczyk will play the winner of the second semifinal between Denis Shapovalov of Canada and American Francis Tiafoe.

The 64th-ranked Gojowczyk won his first career title as a qualifier at the Metz, France, tournament last year.

The first set stayed even until the tiebreaker when Gojowczyk served an ace on his first set point at 6-3.

Gojowczyk broke serve on a second break point in the eighth game of the second set when Johnson sailed a forehand long. The service break set up the German to serve for the match in the next game.

On Saturday morning, Tiafoe finished off Hyeon Chung of South Korea 5-7, 6-4, 6-4 in a rain-delayed quarterfinal.

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WVU students to intern at state Capitol

“I believe this opportunity will let me grow as a person and a West Virginian. I always enjoy meeting new people from new backgrounds and beliefs,” Long said. “Working in the Capitol gives me a chance to meet more of my fellow West Virginians and understand their concerns, hopes and struggles.”

Huffman, from Dunbar, aspires to use her background in marine science to work in science policy.

“I came into the public administration field interested to see how science and policy blend. Policy and research analysts play a huge role in bill drafting and

policy change,” Huffman said. “I see this program adding a functional piece to my professional development. I will have the knowledge to read and understand the research behind science-related policy.”

Christopher Plein, the Eberly Family Professor for Outstanding Public Service, is the WVU contact for Rollins-Burk interns.

As Herndon Fellows, Sam Ollis, Allie Hildebrand and Morgan Wilkes will assist a legislator from the State Senate or House of Delegates throughout the 2018 legislative session.

Ollis is a junior international studies major with a minor in law and legal studies from Parkersburg. He was a Frasure-Singleton intern in the 2017 legislative session.

“The value of the experience and knowledge I am receiving from this internship is immeasurable,” Ollis said. “The inside access to politicians and policy makers is critical to professional networking and genuine understanding of the leg-

islative process.”

Hildebrand is a senior communication studies major with minors in public relations and law and legal studies and is from Huntington. Hildebrand does not see herself running for public office in the future, but she does have an interest in working behind the scenes in government.

Google highlights professor’s virtual exhibit

A worldwide audience can view a WVU researcher’s work on Appalachia’s African American history on his virtual exhibit “Soldiers of the Coalfields: The Hidden Stories of Black Appalachians in WWI,” one of 100 stories highlighted by the Google Cultural Institute in celebration of Black History Month.

Joel Beeson, an associate professor at the WVU Reed College of Media, created the online gallery that chronicles the stories of African Americans who migrated to McDowell County in the early 1900s to work in the coal mines and then went on to serve in the U.S. military. The town of Kimball is home to one of the nation’s earliest World War I memorials honoring black soldiers.

Beeson’s project is featured on the Google Arts & Culture website alongside the National African American Museum of History and Culture, the National Archives, the Smithsonian Institution and the King Center.

“Being featured during Black History Month, along with major cultural institutions around the world, is so important to counter the stereotypes of ‘white Appalachia’ with rich and diverse histories of its people,” Beeson said. “This elevates those stories to international prominence.”

Beeson is an invited beta partner with the Google Cultural Institute and the College’s Media Innovation Center. He began his work on the African Americans in Appalachia project more than 10 years ago. Beeson led a class project to create a photo exhibit for the Kimball War Memorial that evolved into a cultural heritage project supported by the Congressional Black Caucus

Foundation. This work led to a collaboration with the United States World War I Centennial Commission, and eventually to the partnership with Google.

“Dr. Beeson has dedicated much of his career as a journalist and educator to giving voice to people typically left out of the national dialogue and the

historical record,” said College of Media Dean Maryanne Reed. “This partnership with Google gives him an opportunity to publish his work on a platform that has a global reach.”

Beeson is working on a commissioned virtual reality project for Google Expeditions, an app that allows teachers to take students on immersive, virtual journeys around the world. His project will take viewers on a tour of WWI-era United States through the eyes of the Chicago Defender, the nation’s most influential black weekly newspaper at that time. Students will follow the story of the 8th Infantry Regiment of the Illinois National Guard, the only entirely black military unit during the war.

Researcher one of 16 to get award

With age comes a higher prevalence of chronic illness, often resulting in the use of multiple prescription medications at a time.

A WVU researcher is examining the prevalence and hazards of potentially inappropriate medication prescribing among elderly cancer survivors.

Traci LeMasters, assistant professor in the School of Pharmacy, is a recipient of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy’s New Investigator Award, which grants funding to early-career faculty to jumpstart independent research programs. She is one of only 16 people nationwide to receive the award this year.

Her research will focus on how often elderly cancer survivors are prescribed potentially inappropriate medications, the likelihood that they will have an adverse drug event and their annual prescription drug expenditures. These outcomes will be compared between elderly individuals with and without a history of cancer to understand the impact of a cancer diagnosis on these outcomes.

“Older cancer survivors may have a greater number of chronic conditions compared to their peers who have never had cancer. They also take numerous prescription medications and see multiple doctors who prescribe those medications,” LeMasters said. “Subsequently, these patients may be at greater risk of being prescribed drugs that have the potential for harmful effects.”

More than 60 percent of the 15.5 million cancer survivors in the U.S. are over the age of 65, and many older cancer survivors’ prescription medications are paid for by Medicare, a government-funded health insurance program for individuals 65 years of age and older.

For that reason, School of Pharmacy Dean William Petros said LeMasters’ research could have an impact on the quality of life of millions of these patients as well as inform health care providers and Medicare policy.

“Recognizing inappropriate polypharmacy — the use of a large number of medications — is the first step toward prevention of its consequences,” said Petros. “Ideally, Dr. LeMasters’ findings will initiate a much-needed discussion among health care professionals in the U.S. and ultimately, will lead to effective solutions that could save lives.”

New Investigator Award winners will receive a grant of up to \$10,000. LeMasters will use the funds to acquire the necessary data to conduct the study and to support a graduate research assistant. Her research findings will be presented at the 2019 American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy meeting and subsequently published in a professional journal.

WVU School of Medicine resident studies recovery time

After having their tonsils removed, patients often can’t leave the hospital for six hours, even if they bounce back from surgery sooner. Hospital policy commonly mandates a six-hour recovery time. But research led by Habib Zalzal, a resident in the WVU School of Medicine, suggests that not all tonsillectomy patients have to wait that long.

The project earned him the G. Slaughter Fitz-Hugh Research Award for the southern region of the Triological Society, a national society for ear, nose and throat surgeons.

“Our nursing staff always felt that some children could be discharged way before the six-hour arbitrary, mandatory timeframe based on how the kids were doing,” said Hassan Ramadan, a member of Zalzal’s research team and chair of the Department of Otolaryngology, Head and Neck

Surgery. “After checking with half a dozen children’s hospitals in our region, none of them had any validated criteria.”

To fill this knowledge gap, Zalzal and his team established discharge criteria based on how well the patient could eat, how easily he or she could breathe, and how stable the patient’s pulse and blood pressure were. Then the team investigated whether discharging patients based on those criteria — and not on a universal timeframe — would shorten post-operative periods without jeopardizing patients’ recovery.

They found that no timeframe was required. More than 80 percent of patients could have been discharged earlier than four hours following surgery, and they were no more likely to have complications than patients forced to stay six hours.

“In some cases, we had patients who were eating lunch and

dinner, but they couldn’t leave because they had to wait six hours,” Zalzal said. “We say, if you have any questions, give us a call, but we’re not going to handcuff you to the bed.”

According to Zalzal, getting patients home faster shrinks the financial cost associated with monitoring them, reduces their risk of hospital-acquired infections and lightens the burden on healthcare staff who have to track their vital signs.

“Although all surgery has potential complications, this study demonstrated that registered nurses working in perianesthesia phase II recovery could safely determine discharge readiness using clinical indicators,” said Aletha Rowlands, a clinical associate professor in the WVU School of Nursing and member of the research team.

The team also included WVU Medicine nurses Raquel Evans,

Stacy Ross and Tracy Underwood as well as assistant professor of otolaryngology Chadi Makary at the WVU Robert C. Byrd Health Sciences Center’s Eastern Campus.

The findings may lead hospitals to take a more individualized approach to tonsillectomy recovery. Given that tonsillectomy is one of the most common surgeries children in the U.S. undergo, second only to getting ear tubes, such a change could have a broad impact.

The next steps, Zalzal explains, are to repeat the study without time requirements. “This study was restricted by a six-hour time-limit requirement, and our new study will eliminate any time requirements and use just the discharge readiness criteria for better patient-centered care,” he said. “Rather than fitting the patient to the surgery, we’re fitting the surgery to the patient.”

Judge dismisses coal exec’s lawsuit against HBO

A West Virginia judge tossed out a lawsuit filed by a coal magnate who was ridiculed on HBO’s show “Last Week Tonight” by host John Oliver.

Oliver targeted Murray Energy CEO Robert Murray during a segment last June that blasted his company and criticized the standards of the coal industry at large. In the segment, Oliver said that when a producer for his show

tried to get in touch with Murray Energy, it responded with a cease and desist letter from its legal team. The company has a long history of threatening litigation against its critics. “I know you’re probably going to sue me over this.

But, you know what? I stand by everything I said,” said Oliver, who called the CEO a “geriatric Dr. Evil.” Attorneys for HBO argued that Oliver’s comments were factual — sourced from court documents about Murray — or

obviously satirical, both of which are protected by the First Amendment. Judge Jeffrey Cramer, of West Virginia’s second judicial circuit, agreed. “I find the arguments set forth in the defendants’ motion to dismiss for failure to

state a claim and reply well-founded, appropriate in this matter and will grant the same,” Cramer wrote. “The court adopts, with little exception, defendants’ argument in support of their motion regarding all issues addressed in the same.”

Garrison Keillor downplays his relationship with accuser

MINNEAPOLIS — Garrison Keillor described several sexually suggestive emails he exchanged with a former researcher who accused him of sexual misconduct as “romantic writing” that never resulted in a physical relationship. The radio host also rejected the idea that because he was her boss — and the driving force of a hugely popular radio program — it could be sexual harassment.

The woman responded, via her attorney, that Keillor’s power over her job made her afraid to say no to him. In one of his first extended interviews since Minnesota Public Radio cut ties over the allegations against the former “A Prairie Home Companion” host, in November, Keillor said he never had a sexual relationship with the woman, a freelance contributor to the show at the time.

“No button was unbuttoned and no zipper was unzipped,” Keillor told The Associated Press. “I never kissed her. ... This was a flirtation between two writers that took place in writing.” Keillor also downplayed his power over the woman

by portraying himself as uninvolved in the mundane operations of the radio show he created nearly a half-century ago and built into a powerhouse that attracted millions of listeners nationwide each Saturday evening, spun off assorted businesses and tours and inspired a movie. “I was not really the boss around ‘Prairie Home Companion,’ ” Keillor said. “I was a writer sitting in a dim office at a typewriter, back in the old days.” He also said: “I had no control over her whatsoever. She worked at home.”

The woman said in an emailed response through her attorney that Keillor “had the power to provide or take away job assignments and opportunities. He also acknowledged several times that power imbalance between us, recognizing how his conduct could be offensive when it was coming from the person for whom I work.”

She also said she wasn’t interested in anything but a “collegial” relationship with Keillor.

“He was my mentor and employer,” she said. “As such, he had power over me. Every time I said ‘no’ or tried to avoid him I feared I was saying ‘no’ to my future.”

The Associated Press does not typically name alleged victims of sexual harassment unless they choose to go public.

Union supporters rally ahead of court ruling

NEW YORK — Supporters of organized labor rallied Saturday in New York City ahead of arguments in a Supreme Court case that could make it hard for unions to operate.

“This is the place, sisters and brothers, where we make a stand today,” said American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees president Lee Saunders, whose union is the defendant in the case before the court.

The Supreme Court on Monday will hear a challenge to an Illinois law that allows government employee unions such as AFSCME to collect fees from workers who choose not to join. The unions say the outcome could affect

more than 5 million government workers in 24 states and the District of Columbia.

The court split 4-4 the last time it considered the issue, in 2016. Justice Neil Gorsuch joined the court in April.

New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio and Gov. Andrew Cuomo, both Democrats, vowed to protect unions regardless of how the Supreme Court rules.

“We will not let our city or our country be taken over by the 1 percent,” de Blasio said. He said New York “is the biggest union town in America, and we are proud of that.”

Cuomo said workers “need the strength and solidarity of the labor movement more now than ever.”

2 carmakers recall roughly 110K vehicles

NEW YORK — Toyota and Hyundai recalled about a combined 110,000 trucks and sport utility vehicles, including the 2018 Toyota Tundra and Sequoia, and the 2018 Hyundai Santa Fe and Santa Fe Sport.

In its recall announced Saturday, Hyundai said some of Santa Fe vehicles are at risk for the steering wheel breaking away from the steering column. Roughly 43,900 vehicles are included in Hyundai’s recall.

Toyota recalled about 64,900 Tundras and Sequoias, saying these vehicles are at risk for having

their electronic stability control systems shutting down unexpectedly. Info: safecar.gov.

Student detained in blast at school

ORLANDO, Fla. — Authorities detained a 14-year-old boy and launched an arson investigation after an explosion led to an evacuation of a high school.

Orange County sheriff’s spokesman Jeff Williamson said officers received reports of a loud bang coming from the boys’ bathroom Saturday morning as Timber Creek High was hosting a debate competition.

After hearing the explosion and seeing smoke, staff members evacuated the Orlando school, sending students out to a field.

POOP-INSPIRED

Toy makers are going to the toilet for their latest creations. Mattel, a company best known for its clean-cut Barbie dolls, is set to release a game called Flushin' Frenzy that sends a brown plastic poop flying into the air. Rival Hasbro, whose water-squirting game Toilet Trouble was a hit last year, stuck with the potty humor this year and released Don't Step In It, a game where players are blindfolded and have to avoid stepping in poop that's molded out of a clay-like substance. Toy analysts and experts say the potty-related toys are hitting stores now because of the popularity of the poop emoji, which has also made it more acceptable for parents to buy poop toys for their kids.



WALK THIS WAY

The latest variation of an Uber ride will require a short walk. In eight U.S. cities, the ride-hailing company is rolling out a service called "Express Pool," which links riders in the same area who want to travel to similar destinations. Once linked, riders would need to walk a couple of blocks to be picked up at a common location. They also would be dropped off at a site that would be a short walk from their final destinations. Depending on time of day and metro area, Express Pool could cost up to 75 percent less than a regular Uber ride, or as little as half the cost of Uber's current shared-ride service called Pool, the company says. Pool, which will remain in use, doesn't require any walking.



A STYLISH MOVE

Walmart will launch an online home shopping experience in the coming weeks that will let shoppers discover items based on their style. The move is the first glimpse at the company's broader campaign to redesign its website with a focus on fashion and home furnishings. The overhauled website will debut later this year and will mirror how people shop for different items. This spring Walmart is rolling out a new Lord & Taylor-dedicated page as part of its partnership with the department store chain's parent company Hudson's Bay. Walmart's home shopping site will also include curated collections and nine shop-by-style options including modern, traditional and bohemian.

Down times for dividend stocks

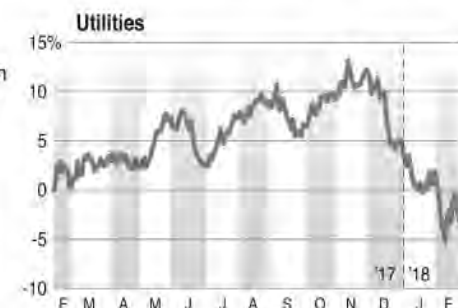
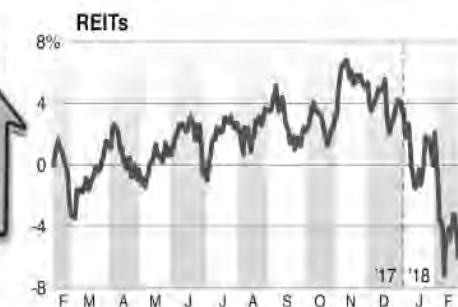
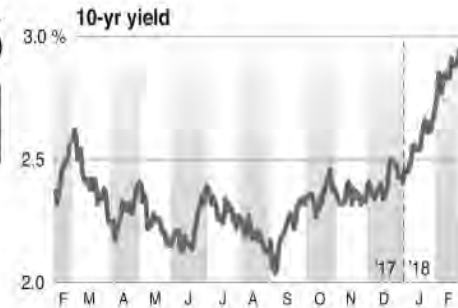
Investors are powering down on utilities and moving out of real estate companies. As bond yields keep climbing, it's taking a toll on stocks that pay high dividends.

Some traditionally low-risk, income-producing stocks have fallen out of favor as investors expect not just continued economic growth, but rising interest rates. When bond yields are extremely low, as they have been for several years, investors seeking income turn to these stocks as bond substitutes.

These days, bonds are rapidly becoming more appealing because their prices are down and their yields are way up. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note is the highest it's been in four years, having jumped to 2.95 percent Wednesday. That's up sharply from the 2.04 percent it traded at in September.

While the Standard & Poor's 500 index has risen slightly this year, real estate investment trusts are down almost 10 percent, while utilities are down nearly 8 percent.

Edison keeps the lights on

Shares of electric power company Edison International jumped Friday after its fourth-quarter results were stronger than analysts expected.

The parent of Southern California Edison rose 4 percent to \$62.17. The stock tumbled from around \$80 a share in November to a low of \$58 in mid-February as investors worried about the effects from a number of wildfires in Southern California. One December wildfire knocked out



power for a large number of Edison customers, and the company later said authorities were looking into the possibility that fires started at one of its facilities.

Investors were concerned the company might face big legal bills as a result.

On Friday Guggenheim Securities analyst Shahriar Pourreza upgraded Edison to "Buy" from "Neutral," noting that the company still has numerous problems, but investors were likely to be relieved it will continue to pay dividends to shareholders.

How to get a good deal when you hate to haggle

To use this approach, call the dealership and ask for the internet department. Or email the internet manager through the company's website. Often the response to a remote query is "Come on down! We'll take care of you!"

3 Shop your price Once you get a price from one dealership you can "shop" it by contacting other dealers for a quote. Tell the other dealers that you already have an offer in hand.

If you do go in, where salespeople will be putting on added pressure, don't be afraid to leave if you aren't happy with an offer.

Look at the current market value of the car you want to buy, which you can research on sites like Edmunds, Kelley Blue Book or TrueCar. Also, look for a car that will qualify for, such as customer financing. And find the trade-in value of your car, as well as estimated fees

2 Negotiate remotely You can do most everything outside of test driving the car, from home.

Before you agree to any deal, ask for a breakdown of fees to see the total, or the "out the door," price. In some cases, dealerships insert bogus charges or inflate the documentation fee to try to take back some profit they gave away. Once you know the total price, and if it still looks good, you can buy with the confidence of knowing that you're a savvy negotiator.

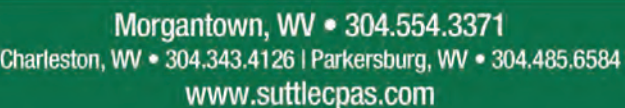

The recently passed tax reform bill, commonly referred to as the "Tax Cuts and Jobs Act" (TCJA), means substantial changes for individual taxpayers. A few are included below:

- Elimination of the AGI-based reduction of certain itemized deductions
- Elimination of the moving expense deduction (with an exception for members of the military in certain circumstances)
- Expansion of tax-free Section 529 plan distributions to include those used to pay qualifying elementary and secondary school expenses, up to \$10,000 per student per tax year — permanent
- AMT exemption increase, to \$109,400 for joint filers, \$70,300 for singles and heads of households, and \$54,700 for separate filers

Be aware that additional rules and limits apply. Also, there are many more changes in the TCJA that will impact individuals. If you have questions or would like to discuss how you might be affected, please contact us.



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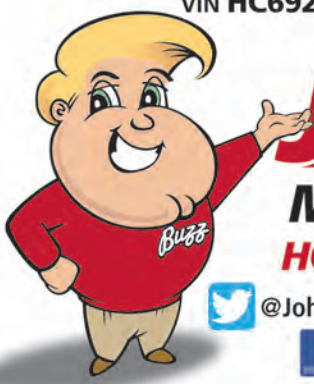

A gun in every class

Campus Self-Defense Act should extend to Capitol

No, the “Campus Self-Defense Act” does not extend to high school campuses. It applies only to college campuses, for now, but wait until next year.

HB 4298 at the moment is in the House Judiciary Committee, after emerging from the House Education Committee on Feb. 9.

The way things are going, we suspect it will move to the full House for a vote shortly. Bills must be out of a committee today.

What this bill does is rescind the authority of state-owned colleges to choose whether guns are allowed on their campuses.

Currently, colleges can choose to allow guns on campus or not. None allow it now, including WVU.

Incredibly, nearly a dozen states already allow for people carrying concealed weapons on college campuses.

We believed 4298 was a wrong-headed proposal the moment it was introduced and in light of every school shooting looks even worse.

Our reasons are simple and we like to think grounded in common sense. They include:

- Campus police forces are already armed and trained to respond to active shooters and other gun violence.

- On most campuses, municipal and county law enforcement agencies are always nearby.

- The ability to distinguish the good guy from the bad guy in a shooting would be dangerously blurred for officers.

- Allowing for guns in classrooms would more likely have a chilling effect rather than be comfort.

- Knowing when it is appropriate to draw a weapon or use it in such situations is rarely black and white.

- Currently, there is no requirements for permitting and training to carry a concealed weapon.

- Accidental discharges, misplaced or stolen firearms and potential false alarms could mean disaster.

- The firearm owner’s and the school’s liability are also concerns.

- And we thought lawmakers were interested in returning local control to schools. Maybe not.

Yes, it could happen here. It could happen on WVU’s campus and any other campus.

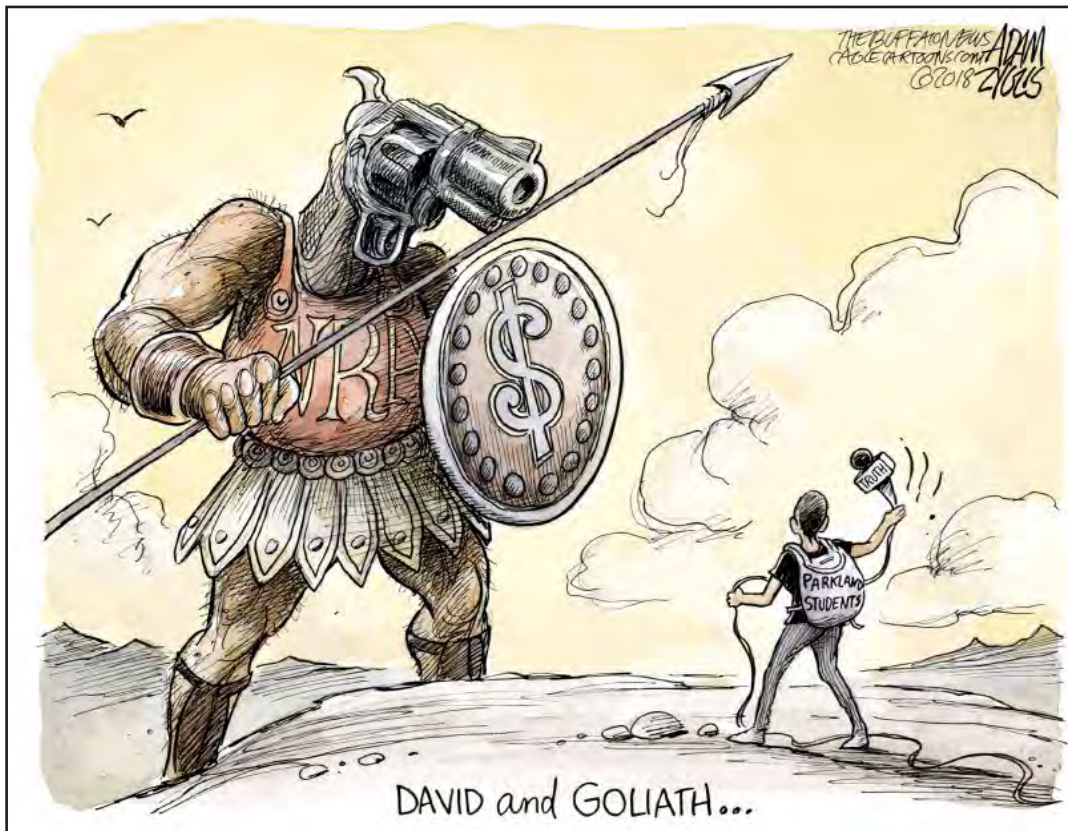
Not to mention, potentially every workplace and every public or private building people can access.

Some argue that the proliferation of firearms helps to curb gun violence. We think that allowing anyone to carry guns in public venues, including on campus, triggers it.

It’s uncanny that lawmakers want to expand where firearms are allowed, yet make no provision allowing for a Capitol-carry law.

As is, the public’s access to the Capitol, where metal detectors and armed guards are in place, is restricted.

Wouldn’t every visitor and every constituent carrying a firearm mean more security? And imagine the savings on all that unnecessary security.

Animal welfare groups helping cat population

Once upon a time, there was a neighborhood near Morgantown that was facing a difficult problem. This problem was not unique to this street, or this neighborhood, or even this town or state. Many neighborhoods have tackled this problem — in different ways, with different outcomes — and many efforts ended in the deaths of innocent victims. But this particular fairy tale does have a happy ending.

The problem began many years ago, probably starting when someone moved away and left a cat, or when outside cats were not spayed or neutered, or when the coward of the county found a convenient place to dump unwanted kittens. In this neighborhood, some individuals tried to help the home-

less cats by providing food and shelter, but no one had the resources or experience to stop the inevitable breeding. When 4-month-old kittens can have kittens, it doesn’t take long for a few cats to become many cats.

Slowly, the residents began losing patience. Food left unattended attracted unwanted wildlife and competition for mates resulted in very unpleasant behaviors by the cats.

Should the residents contact their city council or the County Commission? Could animal control help, even though there are no ordinances protecting cats? Surely there was a more humane solution than hiring a trapper and euthanizing them.

Enter a fairy godmother who reached out to a local spay/neuter group, who then contacted other animal

welfare groups to form a one-of-a-kind coalition. Everyone shared resources and combined forces to begin the time consuming, expensive and difficult job of TNR (trap, neuter and return).

This unique partnership included Appalachian Peace Paws, Mountaineers For Mutts, Mountaineer Spay Neuter Assistance Program (M-SNAP) and Wild and Wonderful Animal Rescue. Find all of these local groups on Facebook — they need your support to continue their community service.

Eleven cats have been fixed and three kittens have been placed in rescue. This population can now live happily ever after, being controlled through attrition — not killing.

Media must learn to cover mass shootings respectfully

LIKE MOST OF THE HELLSCAPES

we now wade through, endemic gun violence is a tragedy of our own making.

The Parkland story is like other stories: A 19-year-old gunman entered his former high school, this time in South Florida, and killed 17. Fourteen were students.

But this time, journalists became part of the story of our eminently preventable national nightmare when reporters from CNN, the Miami Herald, ABC and a local news station publicly messaged a high school student, Aidan Minoff, who was tweeting during the shooting. They asked him to follow them back; to direct-message them; for video permissions; even for a phone interview. Many read their requests as disgusting and desperate; of course, journalism is increasingly both. Decent jobs are hard to come by and harder to keep, clicks are king, and the 24-hour digital news cycle makes reporters run at a race clip.

Examples of “what not to do when reporting on tragedy” are legion; anyone who’s worked the crime beat will have stories to share. In

2015, I reported from a public vigil for a young man who died in a drive-by shooting. The vigil occurred less than 24 hours after he was killed. I watched as one reporter poked the dead man’s weeping friends during the ceremony. “I know just how you feel,” she announced. “Someone I knew died in 9-11.” The reporter was an older blond woman flown in from New York City, using a wildly different loss as a card to connect with Latino men in their mid-20s who lived in a California neighborhood where their friends were getting shot every other day.

If it’s clear how to be a jerk while reporting from a mass casualty, it is perhaps less clear how to report respectfully while still getting as much information as possible to the public. I called Andrew M. Seaman, the Society of Professional Journalists’ ethics committee chairman, and Bruce

Shapiro, executive director of the Dart Center for Journalism and Trauma, at Columbia University, for their advice on how tragedies should be covered. Here’s a quick guide:

Reporters should make sure survivors are and feel safe. If someone is tweeting out information and images from an active scene, the first and only obligation is to his or her safety. A direct message on Twitter can make a person’s phone chime. Reporters need to be aware that a shooter might use the sound of a ringing phone or a person’s voice to locate victims, as Anders Behring Breivik, the shooter in Norway, did when he shot 69 people at a summer camp.

Reporters should be empathetic. “Trauma is a profoundly isolating experience; it leaves people with an almost incommunicable sense of isolation,” Shapiro said. “One of our great capacities as reporters is to link survivors and the broader community again through the power of our stories. That’s actually a great privilege and it’s something that only journalism can do. The other side is that it’s also very easy to be exploitative or obtrusive.”

Reporters should do their research. “Reporters should

What liberals ignore about bearing arms

WHEN IT COMES TO GUNS, it often appears as though liberals and conservatives are speaking different languages. Liberals express their horror at each new mass shooting and demand government action, while conservatives call for “thoughts and prayers” and insist on respect for the Second Amendment.

The constitutional argument usually leaves liberals cold, but it would be more recognizable if they gave it more thought. There is in fact a symmetry between liberal and conservative approaches to the Constitution, which explains a lot about the intractable nature of the gun problem.

Both sides read the same Bill of Rights, of course, but they tend to emphasize different provisions. Liberals, for example, make a priority of the Fifth and Sixth Amendments, which guarantee accused suspects the right to remain silent and the appointment of counsel when facing prosecution.

Although these rights are well established by U.S. Supreme Court cases such as *Miranda v. Arizona* and *Gideon v. Wainwright*, they are still questioned by many conservatives who see them as just one more way of coddling criminals. Why should even terrorism suspects be read warnings before interrogation? And why should cash-strapped local governments have to spend millions of dollars providing lawyers for obviously guilty defendants? Worst of all, why should a criminal’s confession be thrown out simply because the arresting officer made a technical mistake?

Liberals, in contrast, believe that procedural due process protects the public from overreaching by the police. Without the *Miranda* and *Gideon* rules, innocent people might be convicted and ordinary citizens might find themselves arrested and locked up for no good reason. It is true that guilty defendants might sometimes be released, but, as liberals will explain, that is the price of freedom for everyone else.

Conservatives prioritize the Second Amendment, which, under the recent Supreme Court cases *District of Columbia v. Heller* and *McDonald v. Chicago*, guarantees the right to keep and bear firearms for personal protection. Under those decisions, every state allows “concealed carry” of handguns, and many allow “open carry” of assault rifles and other weapons.

This is baffling to liberals. Why would anyone need to own semi-automatic rifles? Every mass shooting brings calls from liberals for some form of gun control, followed by outrage and consternation when legislatures fail to act.

The response from conservatives, led by the National Rifle Association, is that gun ownership is a “fundamental right” that simply cannot be diminished by the government. They consequently object to even small measures because they see them as preliminary steps toward abrogating the Second Amendment itself.

You will seldom hear them say it, but conservatives apply the same logic as liberals when it comes to the consequences of protecting individual rights. As Bill O’Reilly once explained, mass shootings — in schools, churches, shopping malls and theaters — are just the price of freedom under the Second Amendment.

It may seem that liberals and conservatives do not understand each other when it comes to the Bill of Rights, with one side extending too much protection to criminals and the other tolerating too many guns. But in fact, they are engaging the same calculus of societal risk and constitutional reward. The constitutional visions mirror each other, but they are not equivalent. In the name of procedural fairness, liberals are willing to see suspects go free, although the number is quite small. For the sake of their own guns, conservatives are willing to abide the slaughter of innocents, and the death toll keeps rising.

He altered the image of what an evangelist is

BILLY GRAHAM, who died Wednesday, at 99, brought more people to Jesus than anyone since St. Paul trudged the Roman roads around the Mediterranean Sea in the first century.

However, as impressive as his accomplishments were in evangelizing around the world, he made an equally important contribution to those outside of his own conservative Protestant tradition, rooted historically in the rural South and the Midwestern heartland.

By reaching out to Catholics, Jews and those outside the Judeo-Christian tradition, Graham changed the image of what an evangelist is. His matinee-idol appearance, with his golden mane of hair, helped, of course, as did the fact that he preached with good grammar and only a faint trace of a Southern accent. Likewise the much-repeated story, perhaps apocryphal, of William Randolph Hearst's order to his media empire to "puff Graham" at the start of the young evangelist's seminal Los Angeles crusade.

But it was the content of his message outside of his crusades, and his optimistic mien, that rescued the marginalized view of what an evangelist is from the novel and movie "Elmer Gantry." Graham was the opposite of the sweaty, uneducated, money-grubbing, wom- anizing, tent-show revivalist created and immortalized by Sinclair Lewis and Burt Lancaster.

Graham's message did not rely on the notion of fire and brimstone, one that offered sinners theological "fire insurance" to keep them out of the depths of hell. Instead, he was spiritually aspirational, urging his listeners, viewers and readers to come to Jesus just as they were, to help them achieve salvation, but also to become better people in their lives after they were saved.

It is no surprise that Graham's rise coincided with the rise of the "New South," what has since become the suburban Sunbelt. Graham was raised outside Charlotte, N.C., a city that epitomized the emerging Sunbelt, where it seemed there were about as many banks as there were houses of worship.

Early in his evangelical career, Graham realized that for his brand of Christianity to be viable to a worldwide audience, it would have to break the shackles of racism that had chained the South for hundreds of years. To be sure, Graham did not participate in civil-rights marches, much less go to jail for his beliefs, but he made his views plain over time. This incremental approach, while not placing him in Christianity's prophetic minority, had the benefit of bringing many fellow white Southerners with him, demonstrating through his actions and implicit in his message, that things would have to change for those who wanted to think themselves Christians.

Graham and Nelson Mandela were born in the same year, and Graham corresponded with the South African leader for decades while he was in prison.

"Graham refused to preach in apartheid South Africa for 20 years until the government, in 1973, gave permission for a mixed-race gathering," according to Tami Hultman, co-founder of AllAfrica.com. "Before that, across the border in Victoria Falls in what was then Rhodesia, Graham declared the apartheid must end."

In the 1980s, when televangelism scandals rocked the nation, it was Billy Graham's unblemished reputation that kept many fundamentalist Christians from despair.

Graham was not without his faults, as he acknowledged. He grew too comfortable and too close to those in power, especially Richard Nixon. And his pricey wardrobe also drew criticism.

It is instructive, if not entirely fair, to compare Billy Graham to his son and chosen heir, Franklin. For all his considerable organizational gifts, Franklin's message from the pulpit has a darker hue than his father's. And, where the father did his best to reach out to non-Christians, the son has been quick to denounce Muslims and Hindus, referring to the latter as "pagans."

So, Christians and non-Christians alike can be grateful for Graham's life and work, to join with his family, friends, supporters and admirers by saying, "Well done, thy good and faithful servant."

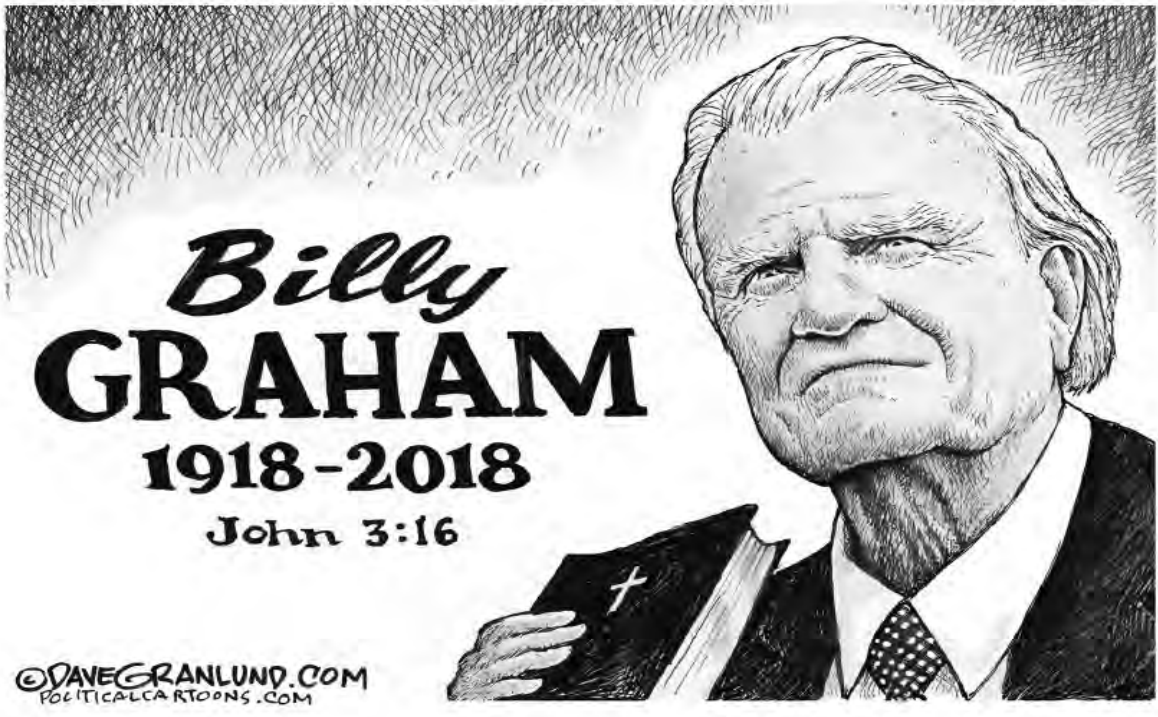

lobsters is cruel since the crustaceans can sense pain. Authorities recommend electrocution or sedating the lobster by dipping it into saltwater and then thrusting a knife into its brain.

Consider that abortion is legal in Switzerland and is covered by the country's mandatory health insurance. While their abortion rate is less than half that of the U.S., one in five women in Switzerland will have an abortion at some point in their lives.

2nd Amendment relates to role in armed forces

My impression is that most people believe that the Second Amendment goes something like, "The right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed." They would be half right.

The analog of these in current times would be the state National Guard units. One could say that a logical extension of that might be the federal armed forces.

This indicates that the right to keep and bear arms is related to membership in the armed forces or National Guard. One is left to wonder why those learned judges of the U.S. Supreme Court who claim strict adherence to the "original intent" of the framers of the Constitution (as did the late Justice Antonin Scalia) have moved so far away from this belief.

One can argue that we have moved too far away from this simplistic belief. be very cautious about putting out assertions coming only from a single text exchange or tweet. It's factually dangerous to put out inaccurate information in the middle of an active shooting scene and it lays down wrong myths that are very hard to break. "You don't want to be taken for a ride by someone who's not really there," he said. If reporters are on the scene or in the immediate aftermath, their job is to provide the most accurate version of events possible, not to get the most sensational footage or quotes. He points to Dave Cullen's book "Columbine," which highlights inaccurate early reporting on that tragedy, for instance, that the perpetrators were part of a "trench coat mafia."

Reporters should publicly acknowledge what they don't know. "The most important thing journalists should do during these events is take a breath," Seaman said. He suggests putting an editor's note on the story saying: "This story is unfolding. We're doing the best we can in terms of identifying what is and is not appropriate to share."

Reporters should speak to a range of survivors. "One of the things that happens a lot is that there turn out to be a few people who for whatever reason turn out to be good on TV; they're comfortable talking to press and have a clear set of views," Shapiro said. "When you find a good source, everyone moves toward them. That's a danger to be aware of."

Covering tragedies can be full of moral quandaries for even the most ethical journalists. Unlike social workers, EMTs and other helpers on the scene, the journalist's job is not to make the aftermath of a tragedy more bearable. But our first obligation is to not make it worse.

Data lacking to delegate medication in nursing homes

Proponents of HB 4199 claim allowing non-nurses to give nursing home patients medication, rather than a licensed nurse, will reduce medication errors and allow nurses to spend more time with their patients.

In reality, no one knows what the impact of this action will be in West Virginia.

Sadly, we could have known. Currently, there is a provision in law to try this study through a pilot program to understand its impact. This pilot study has been available for years — yet it has never been done.

The reasons why are unclear, but it would have provided insight on "medication delivery" to nursing home patients, their families, the nurses of West Virginia and legislators as to the safety of this proposal.

If it truly keeps patients safer

and allows nurses to spend more time caring for their patients, it is a shame not even 10 nursing homes would take advantage of that opportunity and participate in the pilot study.

More than 20 states allow a version of HB 4199; however, the bill proposed in West Virginia lacks many safety provisions that neighboring states of Maryland and Ohio passed into law. Virginia closely studied this issue in 2010 and, after analyzing the issue, its legislature decided not to pass a law allowing delegated medication. In fact, not even a pilot was permitted because of patient safety concerns in this vulnerable population.

The research on medication delegation is minimal and inconclusive. One study examined 23 states and found medication errors in-

creased. Another study compared eight states' safety outcomes and found medication error decreased. However, in that particular study, an increase was found of patients having incontinence, not being assisted with walking and going to the bathroom, and eating.

West Virginia nurses absolutely support workforce innovations. In fact, years ago, the West Virginia Nurses' Association helped pass a law to allow non-licensed personnel to administer medications in group homes, assisted living facilities and other settings. However, the care of those types of patients is very different. They do not require direct care of nurses like patients in nursing home settings.

The nursing profession is the most trusted profession because we are known as patient advocates. Our concern with HB 4199

is not about protecting our jobs. It is about patient advocacy. Every nurse at some point in his or her training has cared for patients in nursing homes. These patients are fragile, vulnerable and often have no family or loved ones available to care or protect them.

That is where nurses step in. West Virginia nurses believe delegating medication duties in nursing homes should be studied to keep our patients safe. At the very least, HB 4199 should include patient protections that our neighboring states mandate. Let's have some data before putting our most vulnerable at risk.

Oscars fashion through the years: The wonderful and the puzzling

NEW YORK — A radiant Grace Kelly glided from her seat, pulling up her long opera gloves, her little evening bag balanced on one arm, as she collected a best actress trophy for “The Country Girl” at the 1955 Academy Awards.

She kept her speech short and sweet: “The thrill of this moment keeps me from saying what I really feel. I can only say thank you with all my heart to all who made this possible for me. Thank you.”

It was a moment that might not have endured without the cool mint satin gown designed for her by Edith Head. At the time, Kelly was the screen’s most memorable blonde, radiating a sophisticated glamour pre-Princess of Monaco. Today, the thin-strapped gown is among the top fashion moments in the Oscars’ 90-year history.

It was also an inspiration for designers to come, said Hal Rubenstein, who wrote the book “100 Unforgettable Dresses.” The gently draped sheath with a near-bustle effect received a riff in soft pink by Ralph Lauren for Gwyneth Paltrow (albeit a little saggy up top) for the 1998 ceremony. Escada’s take in sherbet green was made for Kim Basinger’s Oscars turn the year before.

Kelly wore the gown two other times, at the film’s premiere before the Oscars and on the cover of Life magazine after. It offered a level of glamour that didn’t exist in 1929 at the very first Academy Awards, when best actress winner Janet Gaynor wore a simple skirt and sweater with a casual scarf draped cross her shoulders.

“Edith Head was a costume designer rather than a couturier. Worn with elbow length gloves and little other adornment, Grace Kelly set the bar for a new modern glamour and yet the color is deliciously unorthodox,” said Jo Ellison, fashion editor at the Financial Times and author of the book “Vogue: The Gown.”

The 1960s and ‘70s provided some fashion wow, of course, but red carpet frenzy reached stratospheric heights among designers in the 1980s, Rubenstein said.

“If it wasn’t for Armani, nobody would have cared,” he said. “He’s the one who discovered the PR quality in dressing people for the Oscars. He’s the one who latched on to Anjelica Huston and Jodie Foster and Michelle Pfeiffer.”

Among Ellison’s top Oscar moments: Lauren Hutton in 1980, in a shiny gold short playsuit by Zoran.

“Wearing gold to the Academy Awards is today

such a cliché. I hardly notice, but this gold lame stops me in my tracks every time — the glossiest, most glamorous and most glorious gold outfit to grace the red carpet ever,” she said.

Today, the Oscars is the most important carpet of the awards season, but those moments depend as much on the human inside the outfit.

Enter Lupita Nyong’o. It was her vibrant red Ralph Lauren gown with cape at the 2014 Golden Globes that launched her as a fashion It Girl in 2014, but it was her soft blue Cinderella Prada later that year, with its crystal sparkle in the pleats, low V neck and delicate headband that secured her spot, let alone on screen with “12 Years a Slave” and, now, “Black Panther.”

“She took it to the next level,” said Joyann King, editor of HarpersBazaar.com. “It was stunning and it really set her apart.”

Not everything Darling-side does turns to gold, and yet the stylistic quartet out of Massachusetts doesn’t sound like anybody else.

On its latest release, “Extralife,” the band continues down an utterly original path through an inconsistent 12-track set. The style is a melding of folk, chamber pop, baroque, progressive and indie rock that defies labeling. The lyrics sometimes veer into pretentiousness, more so than on the group’s breakthrough 2015 release, “Birds Say,” and some of the melodies are cloying.

But there also are moments of great majesty.

Some of the band’s influences lie near the surface. Its members surely played the Beach Boys’ “Pet Sounds” on repeat until they mastered the

four-part harmonies (they also might have absorbed some of the lyrical touches of that psychedelic era, the kind that sounded brilliant under the influence but later made no sense).

But the sound is rooted in harmony, and when Darlingside gets it right and leaves the search for deeper meaning aside, the effect can be sublime. This happens more than once on “Extralife,” especially on “Singularity” and “Hold Your Head Up High.”

On the latter, the band lays seamless harmonies over an urgently simple acoustic guitar. When horns join the chorus as the song builds to a crescendo, it echoes the gentle, unfettered encouragement of the lyrics in a manner that will find a home on many a no-depression playlist.

So yes, the album suffers from inconsistency. But when it reaches up and grabs you, it soars.

Wow, did they take me up on my offer. If you or your child is in any other school where asking questions about God is not a criminal offense, my offer to answer teenagers' questions is open to you and your school as well. Anyway, I received so many questions from the young theologians-in-training at Mercy that I will be plowing through them for a while.

Q: Hello Rabbi Gellman, I am a junior at Mercy High School and enjoy reading your articles. I have a couple of unrelated questions after reading your latest article. Something's not right here

EX-ETIQUETTE

Q: My boyfriend and I have been living together for two years. He has two children, ages 3 and 4 1/2. His ex will not allow the kids to come to our home. He must see them at her house. He's there all the time, morning and night, and sometimes he stays the night when she's out of town on business. I hate it (I've never even seen her) and I think it's crazy. My boyfriend sees nothing wrong with it. What do you think? What's good ex-etiquette?

A: From a parenting perspective, all things equal and above board, it's pretty crazy, but from a relationship perspective it's even crazier. I've been doing this for over 25 years and I have been accused of being cynical, but I see a huge red flag. Most people eventually want to settle in to a new life after a break-up, especially if they have someone new. After two years he's still going to her house to see the kids and he's there day and night? You've never even seen her? Are you sure they have broken up? Something's not right.

I suspect there's no court-ordered parenting plan because unless the kids are in danger at your home — and there's proof — I can't think of a court that would not support a parenting plan where the kids stay with dad in his own environment at least part of the time. It would be in the children's best interest that a parenting plan be put in place

that "normalizes" dad's time with the kids.

Break-ups are difficult to maneuver, both physically and emotionally. The kids were very young when your boyfriend and his ex split. The youngest was a year old and the oldest was 2 1/2. Anyone with children that age understands how difficult it is to get them accustomed to a new environment. It's right in the middle of that "separation anxiety" age when they are very clingy to their primary caregiver and there's lots of crying when someone leaves. I'm just guessing, but if there really was a break-up and the kids were reacting poorly to back and forth before you came into the picture — and the parents got along well — I'm not surprised the answer was, "Just come see them here." But, lots has happened since then. Time to heal, the kids have gotten older, dad has moved on, it's time to put a formal parenting plan in place.

If dad balks, that's another even bigger red flag. If he's all for it, support his rules (Ex-etiquette for Parents rule No. 4, Parents make the rules; bonusparents uphold them) and it's time to meet mom. That's good ex-etiquette.

Q: A few years ago, you wrote about the benefits of meditation for children. I honestly thought you were joking. But a counselor at my son's school just recommended it, saying it could help my son's severe anxiety. When I asked how to do it, he handed me a copy of your article. For the benefits of other readers, would you please review the benefits?

A: Thanks for your email. I've been meaning to restart my own meditation practice for a while, and you've just given me the extra motivation boost that I needed.

A lot of people (including me) are skeptical when they hear about the benefits of meditation. After all, we're told that when something sounds too good to be true, it usually is. However, in the case of meditation, many of the benefits have been scientifically proven. And it's not just people who've been doing it for 20 years who benefit. In many cases, you can see the results in as little as a week.

Over the course of thousands of studies, meditation has been shown to: Reduce anxiety, depression and feelings of stress; increase focus and reduce the symptoms of ADHD; increase immune system function and reduce inflammation; lower blood pressure and reduce the risk of heart attack and stroke; reduce the amount of sleep you need to feel rested; make

your brain bigger and increase your IQ; improve memory, recall and lower the risk of developing dementia; boost creativity; reduce the likelihood of becoming addicted to drugs or alcohol; improve your ability to cope with pain; prevent asthma and a variety of conditions caused by inflammation in the body; reduce loneliness and social isolation; and, overall, help you live a longer, healthier life. Pretty impressive, right?

As someone who's obsessed with research, I wanted to know exactly how something as simple as meditation could possibly produce some many positive outcomes. It turns out that meditating changes blood flow in the brain, increasing it in certain areas (such as the ones that govern memory and social function) and reducing it in others (such as the ones that regulate anxiety, stress and depression). It also changes blood flow in other parts of the body (hence heart- and stroke-related benefits). But at the end of the day, the how and why aren't important. What really counts is that in addition to the many documented benefits, there have been no documented risks. So why not give it a try?

How to spot signs of when a heart attack is most likely

YOUR RISK OF heart attack is based on many well-known factors — eating habits, obesity, smoking, diabetes, high cholesterol and family history.

But there are also lesser-known factors. Did you know that risk of heart attack is higher at certain times of day, certain times of year and in certain stressful situations?

Research has linked an uptick in heart attacks with heavy physical exertion, emotional upset and even high-intensity sporting events like World Cup soccer.

Heart attacks are also more common in the mornings, on Mondays, and on the Christmas and New Year's holidays — which are typically times of high stress.

"Certainly work-related stress and state of mind play a



role in heart disease," said Dr. Bradford Warden, executive director of the Mon Health Heart & Vascular Center and chief of cardiology. "The mind-body connection is formidable. How you handle pressure, negative emotions and stress is truly a matter of the heart."

Doctors have long known that heart attacks and cardiovascular-related deaths increase during the winter holidays, though factors other than stress may account for the increase. Changes in daily routines and eating and drinking habits

could play a role, as well as people who delay medical care for symptoms.

In terms of time of day, heart attacks, sudden cardiac death and strokes are more likely to occur in the morning.

A large international study in 2016 of more than 12,000 first-time heart attack patients found heavy physical exertion, anger and emotional upset doubled the risk of heart attack within an hour. Anger and heavy exertion at the same time tripled the risk.

Heart attacks happen when circulation to the heart is cut off or severely diminished because of a clot in an artery. Emergency treatment including angioplasty and clot-dissolving medication can reopen an artery. Heart cells can die or be damaged if the blockage is not

cleared in time.

About 790,000 people in the United States have heart attacks every year, according to the American Heart Association. The average age for a first heart attack is 65 years in men and 71.8 years in women.

Dr. Warden recommends these tips to help prevent heart attack:

- Manage stress
- Maintain a healthy blood pressure and healthy weight
- Exercise regularly
- Don't smoke

Dr. Warden also recommends that you follow up with your primary care doctor to evaluate risk factors.

When looking for a new home, be sure to consider pet's needs

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — All home-buyers have their must-have lists when looking for their perfect home, such as an open floor plan or a spacious master bathroom. But pet owners also need to consider their creatures' needs when looking for a house. Luckily, more and more builders are taking four-legged companions into account in new construction and neighborhoods.

When it comes to new-home options, choosing the right flooring can be the key to happy co-existence for you and your pet. Plush new carpeting may not only turn into a large scratching post for your cat, it can also trap hair, dander and fleas, and lead to allergies. Wood floors are often susceptible to scratches, and tile floors may be too slippery for older dogs. Older dogs might also have trouble navigating stairs. That might not be a

problem for those with small dogs that can easily be carried, but a larger dog might have to stay on one floor of a two-story house as it ages.

Dog walking is a great way to make friends in a new neighborhood, and many new communities are focusing on pedestrian-friendly streets. Look for areas that offer broad pedestrian pathways or trails for walking and running.

A backyard is a great place for pets to relax outdoors, but

when looking for a home, make sure that outdoor space is a safe environment. Although most fences won't keep cats contained, a solid 5- to 6-foot perimeter fence is necessary for dogs. If that is lacking, it's an additional expense that needs to be calculated into the cost of the home.

Finding a new pet-friendly home and neighborhood is becoming easier as builders recognize the importance of four-legged family members.

There are several ways to lift more carefully to avoid injury

Q: Can you offer any advice on how to not injure yourself while lifting? What kinds of injuries are most common due to lifting?

A: Lifting a heavy object improperly is a guaranteed way to put undue strain on your lower back and perhaps injure it. The older we grow, the more prone we are to back injury from lifting because of diminished flexibility. When lifting something heavy, let your legs do the work. Bend at the knees rather than at the waist and let your legs drive you and your burden up. Once up, carry the object at waist level and as close to the body as possible. If you need to turn with the object, once again, don't turn at the waist. Take little steps and use your feet to pivot.

Try to avoid lifting heavy weights when you're tired. You're more likely to move awkwardly if you are fatigued.

Also, know your limitations. Don't take on a weight that is simply beyond your ability to handle. Lifting heavy objects can also strain the shoulders. The rotator cuff is primarily made up of four muscles that help support and move the shoulder joint and these muscles can easily be injured.

Many simple sprain/strain injuries of the back result in muscle spasm and swelling. These are the tissues that are commonly too tight to begin with and are not ready to handle the load you are putting on them or the range of motion you

are asking them to give you when you have not stretched them in years. These injuries are handled well with some simple therapies, adjustments and muscle work like massage.

Sometimes, however, a person can injure ligaments around the spine to include discs. This problem will usually not resolve quickly and may produce pain that goes down the leg. If physical medicine can't help the problem, you may then need to see a neurosurgeon or undergo injection therapies. It is my biased opinion to try the conservative treatments offered by most chiropractors and physical therapists before undergoing the very expensive more conventional diagnostic tests and medical treatments. A good practitioner, be it a medical, chiropractic or physical therapy doctor, will know when you need to get an MRI and

have urgent invasive treatments. It is my humble opinion that most chiropractors happen to be the most qualified to properly diagnose and treat spine injuries when severe trauma is not a factor. They just typically see more of these injuries and by simple means of their daily routine are more apt to know what is wrong. For a DC (chiropractor), the spine is like teeth to a dentist.

If you experience back, shoulder or neck pain, whether it's from lifting or from some sort of repetitive stress, visit a chiropractor. Treatment by a doctor of chiropractic is a proven, effective way to ease the problem of lower back pain and joints.

Ford names Lincoln chief to replace N. American head

DETROIT — A veteran executive who led Ford’s Lincoln luxury brand will now head American operations, replacing an executive who was ousted this week over allegations of inappropriate behavior.

Kumar Galhotra, 52, will replace Raj Nair starting March 1, the company said Thursday. Ford Motor Co. said in a printed release that Galhotra will lead all aspects of the North American business, the company’s primary source of revenue and profits.

Galhotra has been with Ford for 29 years in a num-

ber of senior engineering and product strategy positions. He has led the Lincoln brand since 2014 and has also led the company’s marketing efforts since last year.

Ford announced Wednesday that Nair was leaving the company immediately. The automaker would not discuss the behavior that led to his ouster. Nair expressed regret in a company statement and declined comment when reached Wednesday by The Associated Press.

In South Korea’s Olympic hills, traces of the North abound

GOSEONG, South Korea — A former seaside villa for North Korea’s ruling Kim family. A captured North Korean spy submarine. A front-line observatory that allows curious visitors to peer at parts of a picturesque North Korean mountain across the heavily-mined Demilitarized Zone.

These are bitter reminders of the seven decades of the Korean division as they play out in South Korea’s Gangwon province, whose three towns, together, are hosting the ongoing Winter Olympics.

As the games turn into a place for a flurry of rare reconciliation steps by the two at-odds Koreas, many Olympic fans and others are visiting these North Korea-related sites to learn more about the rivals’ turbulent history.

A look at some of the most famous North Korea-themed attractions in Gangwon, the only Korean province divided along the world’s most heavily fortified border for decades.

Kim Il Sung’s villa

Only a few miles from the DMZ, this stone villa near South Korea’s scenic Hwajinpo Beach was once a holiday home for the late North Korea founder Kim Il Sung, the grandfather of current ruler Kim Jong Un.

Formerly called “Hwajinpo’s Castle,” it belonged to North Korean territory before the 1950-53 War, but it wound up in South Korea after a border was redrawn slightly after the war’s end.

A black-and-white photo displayed in the villa shows a childhood photo of Kim Jong Il, the late dictator father of Kim Jong Un, sitting on the stone steps. Then a 6-year-boy, Kim Jong Il was photographed with his younger sister Kim Kyong Hui, an unidentified Soviet playmate and two other North Korean friends.

South Korea had first let military generals use the villa as their vacation resorts, but turned it into a tourist site in 1999. Each day, it now normally draws about 5,000 visitors during

a summer season and 500 during a winter season. But the Olympics have temporarily boosted the number of daily visitors by a couple hundred, according to villa instructor Yeum Sang Bae.

“While looking at this villa, I thought about our wish for South-North unification and became a bit emotional,” said Keum Hyo-kil, a 77-year-old visiting this week with his family after watching an Olympic bobsled competition the previous day.

“I hope North Korea’s Kim Jong Un would completely give up his nukes on the occasion of this Pyeongchang Olympics,” he said.

Many visitors say South Korea should preserve this villa as a historical site for younger generations. But in the past, an anti-Pyongyang activists’ group threatened to blow up the villa, and others scratched out Kim Jong Il’s face from the photo fixed on the wall near the steps. The photo displayed this week showed no scratches.

In 2000, when then South Korean Culture Minister Park Jie-won visited North Korea, he handed Kim Jong Il an album of photos from the villa. Park, now an opposition politician, said Kim first pretended not to recognize his time in the villa but later reminisced about playing there as a child.

Kim Jong Il ruled North Korea for 17 years after Kim Il Sung died in 1994. He died in late 2011, handing over power to his third and youngest son, Kim Jong Un.

North Korean submarine

A North Korean submarine is on display at the seaside “Unification Park” in Gangneung, where the Olympics’ skating, hockey and curling events are held.

This 35-meter submarine ran aground in 1996 during a spying mission in the area. After determining their submarine’s damage was too serious to repair, its 26 crew abandoned the vessel and went into nearby rugged, heavily wooded mountains to find a land route back north.

But a taxi driver soon detected the stranded submarined and reported it to South Korean authorities, triggering a 49-day manhunt that included shootouts with fleeing North Korean soldiers. Eventually, 24 were either shot to death or found dead, one was captured and a 26th was unaccounted. The manhunt left 17 South Koreans dead.

Visitors are required to wear yellow safety helmets before entering the inside the cramped, low-ceilinged submarine. Those interviewed seemed mixed about the Olympic-inspired rapprochement mood between the Koreas.

“I hope we would get unified soon and live together with the same mind,” said Hong Sun Kee, a 47-year-old office worker who was mobilized in the 1996 manhunt as a reservist. “It’s too cramped inside the submarine. I don’t know how they stayed here.”

Yu Kyung Hee, a 47-year-old housewife, was a bit skeptical of the North’s recent

outreach and said she believed it was aimed at easing international sanctions. “I think North Korea agents could come here again aboard another submarine.”

Also at the park is a wooden motor boat that 11 North Koreans used to defect to South Korea by sea in 2009. A retired 3,471-ton South Korean warship is also on display.

The Olympics have brought an increase in the number of foreign visitors to the park, but there are fewer locals coming this month. That’s due mostly to a driving-restriction measure aimed at reducing traffic congestion during the games, according to park guide Kim Nam Hee.

Unification observatory

Located just south of the DMZ, it’s one of northernmost points in South Korea where civilians can travel to get a glimpse into North Korea.

Along a coastal highway leading up to this observatory, you can often see on your right side a long-line of

barbed wire fences aimed at preventing infiltrations by North Korean agents.

Parts of the North’s Diamond Mountain are seen from here, where the two Koreas once ran a joint tourism project during a past era of detente. The project stalled after a North Korean soldier fatally shot a South Korean tourist visiting the mountain resort in 2008.

While this observatory sits near the eastern portion of the 248-kilometer (154-mile)-long border, a more famous DMZ tourist attraction is on the western section and actually inside the DMZ.

The border village of Panmunjom was a place where North Korean troops sprayed fire at a colleague who was making a daring dash for freedom last year. The defecting soldier was hit five times but survived. He is now in South Korea.

At the eastern coastal observatory on Monday, many visitors were having their pictures taken with Diamond Mountain in the

background after they tied onto guard rails colorful ribbons with messages calling for inter-Korean peace, a successful Olympics and their families’ health.

“It’s sad because we cannot go to North Korea although it’s just right there,” said Ha Go Eun, an 18-year-old student who came to Gangwon with her friends to watch the Olympic Games.

“I wish South-North Korean relations would be a little better following these Olympics,” she said. “I really, really want to go and see the Diamond Mountain. It’s such a beautiful place.”

Nearby, a lone dancer staged a performance that symbolized a bird trapped in colorful ribbons and camouflage net.

“I’d like to express a bird who wants to fly wherever it wants without having any boundary,” said performer Doyu, 48. “Why can’t we walk to the Diamond Mountain? I feel like it would take less than five minutes by car to go there. Isn’t this situation ironic?”

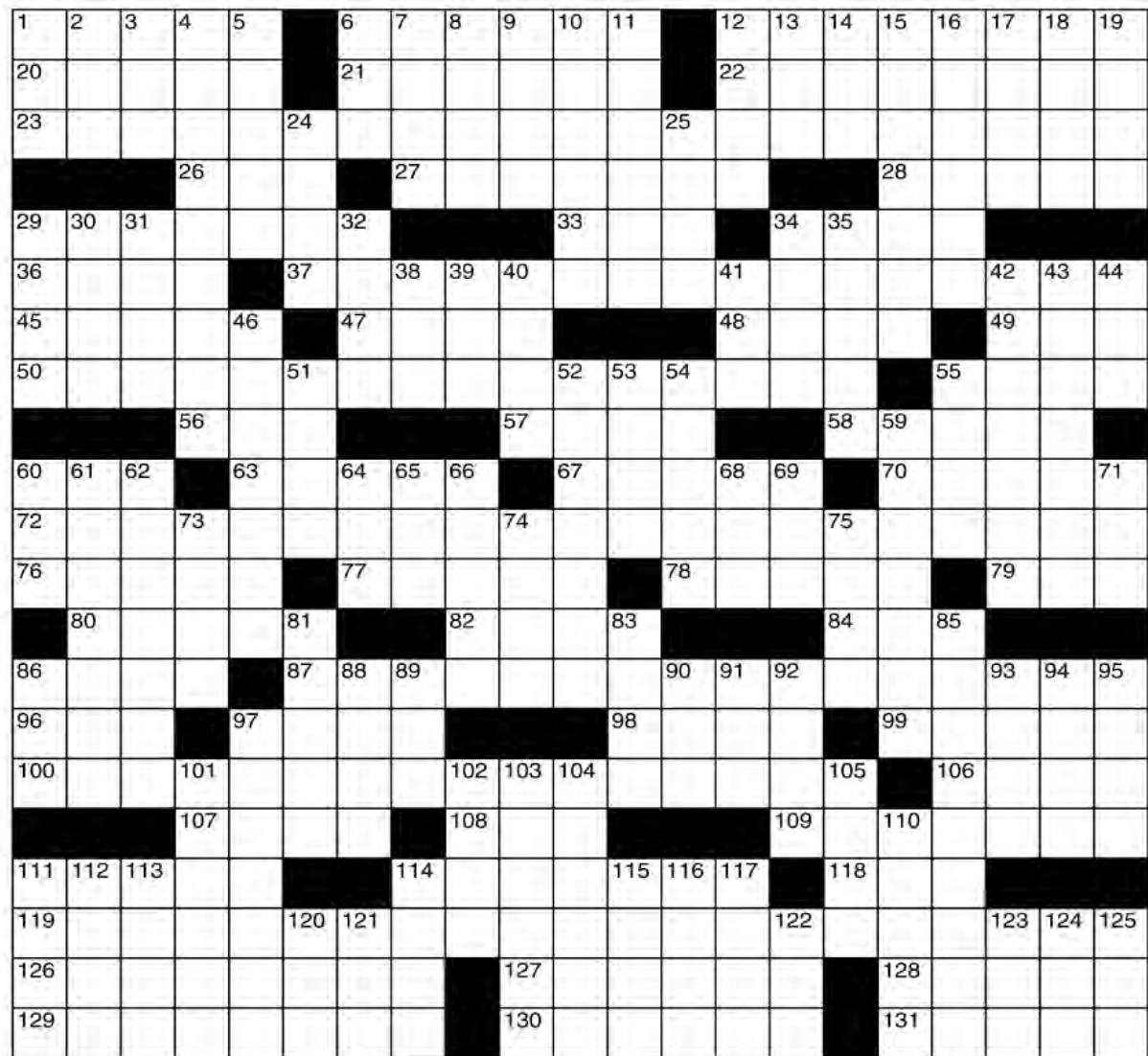

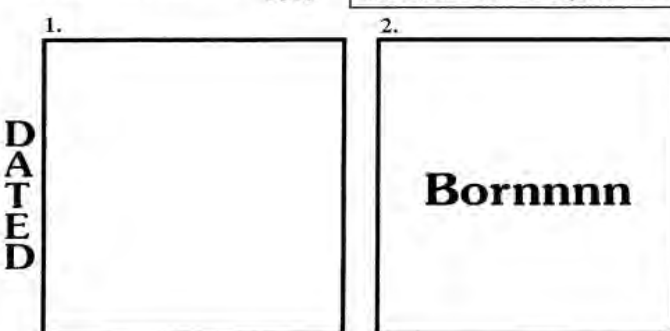

Balto Finishes Strong

On March 3, about 70 daring mushers, or sled dog racers, and about 1,000 dogs will meet in Anchorage, Alaska, for the official opening of the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race.

The Iditarod (eye-DIT-uh-rahd) is one of the most challenging races in the world. It starts in Anchorage and crosses more than 1,000 miles of Alaskan wilderness. It ends up in Nome.

This week, The Mini Page learns about a legendary sled dog who was the hero of a journey that inspired the Iditarod.

A race to save lives

In January 1925, a dangerous disease called **diphtheria** (dif-THIR-ee-uh) threatened the people of Nome. Dr. Curtis Welch treated children who had come down with the contagious disease, but as more kids got sick, he knew he would run out of medicine. Doctors in Anchorage had more doses of the medicine, but the two cities were hundreds of miles apart.

The medicine could be sent by airplane, but cold and windy weather made it too dangerous. The only other option was to send the needed medicine by dogsled.

Gov. Scott Bone decided a relay of dogsled teams would carry the medicine from Nenana, where railroad tracks met the sled trail to Nome, 674 miles away. The relay started on Jan. 27.

Balto gets his chance

During the race, mushers and dogs met dangerous challenges, including sea ice and snowdrifts that could lead them off the trail.



Mini Fact:

Gunnar Kaasen, shown with Balto, was an assistant to the fastest musher in Alaska, Leonhard Seppala.

When it was Gunnar Kaasen's turn, he chose his favorite husky, Balto, and put him at the front of his sled for the next-to-last leg of the relay. They set out on Feb. 1 into a blizzard, running toward a town called Port Safety, where the last musher was waiting.

However, the musher in Port Safety had received instructions to wait for better weather and was asleep when they arrived! So Kaasen made a quick decision: He would finish the last 20 miles of the journey, with Balto in the lead.

Thanks to Kaasen and Balto, the medicine arrived in Nome on Feb. 2, just 5 1/2 days after leaving Nenana. The previous record for the trip had been nine days.

A hero

The 1925 Serum Run was famous all over the country, and Balto became a national hero and symbol of the journey. In New York City's Central Park, a statue of him honors his service.

In 1973, Dorothy G. Page and Joe Redington Sr. started the Iditarod race. They wanted to celebrate the many things sled dogs have done for Alaskans. The sled dogs' life-saving trip was just one of the services such dogs have provided.

The Iditarod race

"Iditarod" is the name of a ghost town along the trails. Many experts believe it means "distant place."

The Iditarod begins in Anchorage with a ceremonial start. The race truly begins the next day from Willow.

The Iditarod Trail runs for about 1,049 miles. It varies year by year because obstacles may arise, forcing mushers to break new trail.

The race keeps going until the last team comes in. The fastest winning time was eight days, three hours, 40 minutes and 13 seconds, set in 2017. The last racers can take nearly three weeks to come in.

Mushers begin training dogs in August, with the dogs pulling four-wheelers. In the spring and early summer, when the snow thaws, the dogs get a vacation.

Teams must stop at **checkpoints** throughout the trail. These stopping points are often villages where mushers and their dogs might get a chance to eat and drink.

At each checkpoint, veterinarians look over the dogs. Mushers rub **salve**, or ointment, on a dog's paws. If a dog is injured or too tired, it might leave the race and be flown home from a checkpoint.

Oven-Baked Chicken Bites

How to stage home for cozy, minimalist look

WHILE DECLUTTERING BEFORE putting a home on the market will help sellers keep their homes cleaner and get a head start on packing, this practice also helps the product that's for sale shine through more clearly.

Staging was once mostly for vacant homes or high-priced listings. Now it's more widely used and can help increase the sales price and decrease the listing time for homes. Bear in mind that different generations have slightly different design tastes and tolerance for clutter or sparseness, as do buyers in different markets and price points.

Set the stage. It's called staging for a reason. The idea is to set the mood in the same way that a theatrical backdrop does. Think of how to use furnishings and accessories to tell a story about how a buyer may live there. You want the listing to look modern and gender-neutral to show a home's bones, not to remind buyers of a sterile environment. Add a few textured pillows, a rug and maybe a large piece of modern, colorful artwork to give the space warmth so it looks alive but isn't overwhelming or too personalized.

Declutter. This is still the number one rule for stagers. The key to the desired Zen feel is to pick interesting but fewer decorative items and keep upholstered pieces clean and lean. Not every wall space needs art and not every surface needs accessories. It can be difficult to decide what to keep, but one good rule is to retain only the accessories that play up architectural features and strengths of the home. Items that draw attention to built-in bookshelves or fireplace mantels are especially helpful.

Heed the size and shape of the room. You can use staging to highlight a room's distinct features. If it has volume due to high ceilings, use a few larger-scaled furnishings. If it's long and narrow, create two seating groups. Buyers can imagine a comfortable space where visitors can sit and converse intimately.

Retain functionality within today's style guidelines. Because space is highly valued, making the best use of all square footage remains a priority. Show this by following the principles of cozy minimalism throughout a home. For example, in a master bedroom where buyers are looking to gain a sleep sanctuary, whittle down the furnishings to only the essential items of a comfortable bed, nightstands and good lighting. The cozy factor can come in the form of blankets, pillows and a soft rug underfoot. To outfit a spare room or a large landing, you might stage a workspace with a clean, modern desk and comfy upholstered chair.

Remember inexpensive tweaks. Minor fixes can help what's already there stand out without cluttering the space. Replace fixtures with bulbs of the same wattage and color, and hang clothing on similar hangers for a more uniform feel. It gives buyers a good feeling as they walk through.

A failing septic system can cause big problems.

Sewage can leak into the yard through a failed drain field and be tracked into the house by pets. Household wastewater contains disease-causing bacteria and viruses. It also contains a high level of nitrogen and phosphorus and contaminates ground water.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) warns that contact with sewage can mean contact with harmful pathogens

If your system fails, and

sewage backs up into your home, the EPA recommends wearing protective clothing, including long rubber gloves and face splash shields, when you clean up.

All equipment, tools and clothing used during cleanup should be washed. Items or areas exposed to sewage should be disinfected with a mixture of 90 percent water and 10 percent household bleach, according to the EPA. The area should not be used until it has completely dried for at least 24 hours.

If sewage from your plumbing fixtures or onsite system backs up into your home, the EPA recommends you contact your local health department, regulatory agency or a septic system service provider for guidance.

Todd Powroznik, environmental health agent at the Monongalia County Health Department, said when his agency receives a call about a damaged septic system, agents go out to verify the problem. Once the investigation is complete, they talk to the homeowner about repairing the septic system.

"If the home owner can't af-

ford the repairs, we give them an application and information about a low-interest loan that's available to Mon County homeowners," Powroznik said.

He said the Waste Water Revolving Loan Fund, through the Water Systems Council, provides low-interest loans up to \$10,000 to repair or replace failing on-site sewage systems. Interest on the loans does not exceed 2 percent. Powroznik said the term of repayment is 15 years.

Powroznik said homeowners with the lowest income are considered the highest priority for the loan.

"We go by income and the number of people in the family. Our guidelines are similar to the federal government guidelines," he said. Powroznik said some homeowners pay as little as \$30 or \$40 per month.

"It's done so much for people who might not be able to afford to repair or replace their septic system," Powroznik said. "The loan process is not credit based, and as long as you own your property and meet the qualifications, you will qualify for the loan."

Preston County Health Department Director V.J. Davis said his department has access to a similar loan through the West Virginia Housing Development Fund. The fund, in partnership with the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), is called The On-Site Systems Loan Program. It is designed to help eligible households repair or replace on-site septic systems or connect to a public treatment system.

An agent from the Health Department has to send in paperwork and verify the septic system is failing and the homeowner has room to put a new system in, Davis said.

He said he has a family applying now for the loan. "There have been several applicants since the program was initiated."

Davis said applications for the program are available at the health department.

If an individual can not get approval for the \$10,000 loan through West Virginia Housing, the application is sent on to the DEP. If it is approved, the DEP guarantees the loan for the homeowner.

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Design Recipes: 10 ways to use more color in your space

Color can both attract and repel. It can also serve as a creative way to add energy and interest into your home. Afraid to use color? Well, you are not alone. There is a bit of an art to using color properly in a space, but the good news is,

it's OK to experiment. Here are Design Recipes' tips for using color:

1. Consider an accent wall. Paint is one of the least expensive ways to infuse color into your space.
2. Use toss pillows. Toss pillows not only help to add color to a space, but texture as well. Toss pillows are also portable de-

sign, allowing you to move color from room to room as you desire.

3. Purchase colorful accessories, such as table lamps. There are so many interesting ways to incorporate both an interesting color and design into a space, and lighting is one functional way.
4. Try greenery.

5. Be bold with bedding. Bedding, especially in a children's room, can add a dynamic element.
6. Use area rugs. Area rugs are an ideal way to incorporate color into a space. Many designers choose area rugs either first for color or graphic inspiration, or last to help tie a room together.

7. Use a technique called color mapping. Color mapping is a technique in which the same or similar color is repeated or "mapped" throughout a room.

9. Tell a story with color. Have a repeated color scheme throughout your home. The ideal color scheme consists of at least three colors.

Marks on antiques can be helpful — and confusing

MARKS ON ANTIQUES, especially silver or ceramics, can lead a collector to history and age. However, the mark's information can sometimes be confusing. A date may be the year the pottery business started. A name may be the name of the seller, not the maker. And sometimes, especially with Asian ceramics, recent copies are so accurate even the old mark is reproduced.

Wemyss Ware is the name used as a mark by Robert Heron & Son (later called Fife Pottery), who started making creamware in Scotland about 1820. They later used the Weymss mark.

During the mid-1800s, European artists were hired. The most famous was Karel Nekola, who stayed for 33 years. In the 1930s, Bovey Pottery, of Devon, England, bought the rights to make Wemyss Ware and hired Joseph Nekola, Karelson.

The pottery by Fife and Bovey is so similar, experts judge the maker by slight color differences. Joseph died in 1952, and very little Wemyss was made in the 1960s and 1970s. But in 1985, Griselda Hill pottery started making it, and now owns the Wemyss Ware trademark.

A ceramic pig that looks like Wemyss sold at a recent Humler and Nolan auction for \$472. It is marked "Plichta, London, England" and "Nekola Pinxt Plichta." Jan

Plichta was a pottery and glass wholesaler who worked in London and, by 1916, bought many things from Bovey Pottery. The Latin mark means "Nekola painted design [for] Plichta," evidence the pig was made before 1952. Very early flower-decorated pigs have auctioned for over \$30,000.

Q: I have an Elvis doll made by Hasbro in 1993. The box is labeled "Elvis Jailhouse Rock, 45 RPM." The doll has never been on display and the box has never even been opened. Can you tell me what is in the box and whether it has any value?

A: In the 1990s, Hasbro made three Elvis Presley dolls to honor the King of Rock 'n' Roll. Your doll's box includes a numbered 12-inch posable Elvis doll dressed in a red jacket with black trim, a white shirt, black pants and white shoes. He has a removable guitar to commemorate the photo shoot for his hit record "Jailhouse Rock." The doll is packaged with a doll stand that has an Elvis facsimile signature and a certificate of authenticity. The other

dolls in the series commemorate Elvis "Teen Idol" and the Elvis " '68 Special." Each doll's value today is \$30 to \$40. Sometimes Elvis memorabilia sells higher around Jan. 8 (his birthday) and Aug. 16 (his death).

Q: I just saw an old American Indian belt with silver ovals set with turquoise stones and some wire decorations. It is marked with a strange mark that looks like a wishbone surrounded by leaves and the word sterling. I tried to look it up, but had no luck. How can I tell how old it is?

A: Most early Indian jewelry is not marked. It often was made from reworked silver coins, a lower grade, so the word "sterling" did not appear. It was used on many pieces sold in stores by 1906. The silver ovals are called conches and they often were used to decorate leather belts. The old pieces, made before the 1970s, probably are made with stones from American mines, but cutters didn't like to make round or oval stones. So more recent jewelry often used turquoise imported from Persia or Italy. It takes an expert to tell what kind of turquoise was used and if the setting is made from coins or is sterling. It also takes an expert to recognize the quality of the work. Buy

from a recognized dealer in American Indian jewelry to be sure you are getting your money's worth.

Q: We have a framed poster from the movie "Mr. Holland's Opus." It's signed "Best Wishes, Richard Dreyfuss." We also have the movie script signed the same way and the music "An American Symphony," written by Michael Kamen and signed by him and Richard Dreyfuss. We're wondering what the value of this collection is and if we should add it to one of our insurance policies.

A: You can find out the value of your collection by contacting an auction

house that specializes in movie memorabilia. If the value is high, you will need to pay for a written proper legal appraisal in order to add it to your insurance policy. Condition, framing, and proof of authenticity are needed to determine price. The movie "Mr. Holland's Opus" is of moderate interest but your collection should sell for \$1,000 or more.

Airbnb unveils new category of rentals rated by inspectors

SAN FRANCISCO — Airbnb is dispatching inspectors to rate thousands of the properties listed on its home-rental service in an effort to reassure travelers they're booking nice places to stay.

The Plus program, unveiled Thursday, is aimed at winning over travelers who aren't sure they can trust the current rating system drawn from the opinions posted by past guests. The

misleading pictures drawn by Airbnb's rating system have become a big enough problem to spawn a website devoted to horror stories spanning from an overcrowded, dirty "hippy commune" in Pasadena, Calif., to a Paris vacation ruined in a moldy, bug-infested apartment.

Airbnb's internal surveys found nearly three-fourths of the travelers on its service are willing to pay more for inspector-certified properties.

Living in the Moment

Audi S5's Redesign Driven by Contemporary Looks, Cutting-Edge Technology

Timeless or trendy? That's the question I'm asking myself from behind the wheel of the Audi S5, a sleek sports coupe that's been totally redesigned for 2018.

On the one hand, this car is a monument to contemporary style, a rolling Museum of Modern Art. Its squinty LED headlights, neatly pressed body creases and acres of digital screens in the cabin make it a vehicle that's clearly designed for this fleeting moment in time.

That makes the case for the S5 being a trendy blip, a car that will look "so 2018" a couple of years from now when surely Audi will offer a new-and-improved version for people fortunate enough to upgrade their cars as readily as their wardrobes.

Today's Audis are nothing if not large, mobile fashion accessories.

Take another look, though, and it also makes the case that this is a vehicle for the ages.

It takes some cues from two-door cars that never seem to wither, like the long hood of the Jaguar E-Type or the muscular grace of a Mercedes

SL. It's lower, wider and cleaner now, all things that will help it turn heads when it crosses the Barrett-Jackson auction block in a few decades.

Aside from its design statement — this car's most noteworthy selling

point — there are two more reasons premium buyers should take a look at it: performance and technology.

While the basic A5 is no slouch with a turbocharged 2.0-liter, four-cylinder engine that makes 252 horsepower, the performance-boosted S5 convertible I tested is a different animal. It features a golden-throated V6 that routes 354 horsepower through an all-wheel-drive system that makes it stick to pavement like Super Glue.

The result is a car that can reach 60 mph from a standstill in just 4.4 seconds and turn corners with awe-inspiring speed. I wouldn't call it a track-day car, but you definitely need track access to explore its performance envelope.

It's also got a cabin that feels like it came from the future.

That real-life science-fiction feeling is reinforced with Audi's "virtual cockpit" display behind the steering wheel. This screen alone has tech specs that read like a high-end gaming system, including a quad-core NVIDIA processor

driving its foot-wide display that delivers gorgeous, vivid color and refreshes at 60 frames per second — twice the speed of regular televisions. It uses large images from Google Earth to enhance the navigation experience like no other car I've tested.

A full-color heads-up display, touchpad that can recognize your handwriting, excellent smartphone integration from Apple and Google, and breathtaking 755-watt Bang & Olufsen sound system round out the "impress your friends" list.

The streamlined design of the dash compliments all the technology nicely, essentially creating a movie set where all the digital action can take place on a stage of carefully positioned screens and knobs.

Aluminum and optional carbon trim in the S5 make it feel more futuristic than the warmer, more traditional A5's cabin.

Pricing, as you can probably guess on a German luxury car, isn't for penny pinchers. The A5 starts at \$42,800 for the base Premium

trim, \$45,800 for the mid-grade Premium Plus and \$50,400 for Prestige.

The powerful S5 coupe starts at \$54,600 before you add any options. The drop-top S5 cabriolet starts at \$62,300, and upgrades vaulted the price of my tester over the \$70,000 mark.

UNDER THE HOOD

Car mysteriously stalls and then starts 10 minutes later

Q: I have 2001 Ford Taurus with a 3.0 Liter V6 engine. This car will suddenly quit running when I'm driving it. Trying to start it is fruitless for about 10 minutes, and then it will start right up and run until it repeats this same failure, after I've driven it! I took it to my go-to shop. They couldn't find any trouble codes in this car's computer. They've had the car for four days, taken it for two test-drives, and the failure wouldn't repeat itself. Can you help me find the problem? Thank you for looking in to the above problem.

— John D.

A: This is a frustrating situation! Your Taurus is like

ly losing ignition spark, fuel injector drive (command signals) or fuel pressure. Unless you can establish a reliable pattern (happens after a certain number of minutes of driving, only after purchasing fuel, after a hot re-start, and so on) your technician may not be able to duplicate the fault and fix it without some possibly expensive guessing. I have diagnosed numerous cars and learned what it's like to walk home using this method as a tech.

If you don't mind rolling up your sleeves and spending a few bucks, you may be able to narrow the field quite a bit with your own testing during one of the episodes (only if safely off the road). An electronic ignition spark tester such as the OTC 6589 (resembles a spark plug with a huge gap and attached alligator clip, \$20) or Lisle 50850 (adjustable gap spark tester; set it to about 1/2 inch, \$8) hooked to one of the spark plug wire ends and clipped to engine metal, can confirm a spark malfunction as the engine is cranked by a helper during an episode. Only a robust ignition system will jump these tools. They'll work as described on most gasoline powered ve-

hicles, including newer ones (wrap a coil-on-plug coil in foil, touching metal, as the tool is used, to look for insulation leaks — spark won't jump the tool's gap).

Another handy tool is a noid light set such as the Alltrade 940580 (\$21), or similar, which contains a half-dozen assorted lights that can be gently attached to the end of an unplugged fuel injector connector. If the light flashes as the engine is cranked, injector drive is occurring. These won't work on newer direct injection systems.

Finally, a fuel pressure gauge such as the OTC 5630 (\$33) which fits most 15-year-oldish Ford and GM vehicles, could point out a loss of fuel pressure. Read the directions

and safety info before using! Wear eye protection!

Your Taurus employs a waste spark ignition system with three ignition coils, so a faulty coil or ignition control module is unlikely to make it quit (it has three separate coil drivers). I'm thinking you may have a flaky crankshaft position sensor, which would take out both spark and injector drive until it wakes up again. An easy way to check is to look for a tachometer reading while cranking (about 250 rpm. If the tach reads zero, the CKP sensor may be the culprit.

An inexpensive OBD-II scan tool such as the Autel AL519 (a real sweetheart for the \$66 price) could also be

used to read cranking rpm, in addition to a host of other purposes such as check engine light issues, misfires, and emissions test readiness. I found these tools on Amazon, at the indicated prices. When one looks at the inconvenience of taking a vehicle in repeatedly for an intermittent issue, and the potential for well-meaning but possibly futile labor and parts replacement, spending money on tools could be a bargain. The scan tool could also make you popular in your neighborhood!

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Balancing debt crisis and income

I received a call the other day from a company saying it could negotiate the balance on my credit cards to a lesser amount. The caller also said they could get me a zero-percent interest rate until the debts were paid off, then the accounts would be closed. I'm kind of starting over again financially, because I sold a company I had run for almost 15 years, then got into real estate and lost almost everything. I'm making just enough to squeeze by, and my credit card debt totals \$40,000. Would this be a good idea?

Dear Bill,
No, this is not a good idea. You're looking at two major problems with a company such as this one. One, they will absolutely destroy whatever credit you may have. Their plan is to take your cash, and spend some time beating down the credit card companies until they agree to accept a lesser amount. Then, they use your cash to settle loans you will have — by that time — defaulted on. This will put you in a situation very similar to if you had filed Chapter 13 bankruptcy. Stay away from these people.

You have an income crisis, in addition to a debt crisis, at this point. For starters, I want you to start living on a tight, written, monthly budget. I'm talking rice and beans, no vacations, and no eating out until you pay off this debt. Where your income is concerned, maybe you should consider getting back into the kind of business you ran previously for a while. Look for a managerial or supervisory position in that area, at least until you're able to get back on your feet and save some cash.

Finally, cut up the credit cards, close the accounts, and put as much money as you can spare toward paying off that debt using the debt snowball system. Never go back into debt again!

My husband and I are in our 40s. We have no children, and we bring home \$95,000 a year combined. We're also debt-free except for our home. We owe just \$10,000 on the house, and can take care of that in a few months. Would it be OK to rearrange the Baby Steps a bit, and pay off our home before getting serious about saving for retirement?

Dear Nan,
I don't usually give folks any wiggle room when it comes to sticking to the proper order of the Baby Steps. But if you're that close to being completely debt-free, I don't see anything wrong with paying off the house first.

Most people I talk to still have anywhere from \$100,000 to \$300,000 left on their mortgages. This is a little bit different story, however, and you two are obviously managing your money well.

Knock out that mortgage, and start pouring at least 15 percent of your income into retirement. You're going to love the feeling — and the freedom — that comes with being completely debt-free!

Goodbye valet, hello, drop-off lane

Parking giant says Uber, Lyft cutting into business

SAN DIEGO — The parking giant Ace Parking said that Uber and Lyft are eating into the parking business — with as much as 50 percent less traffic at nightclubs and a 25 percent drop at restaurant valets.

A death knell for paid parking? No, Ace and others say they are going high-tech to survive.

For consumers, the bright side may be lower parking prices.

In downtown San Diego, this trend could color how much more parking is built, as the city updates its policy this year.

In a September email buried deep in an environmental report, Ace Parking CEO John Baumgardner laid out the ugly truth for the parking business.

At San Diego hotels serviced by Ace Parking, overnight parking declined 5 percent to 10 percent. At restaurant valet stands, business is down 25 percent.

And, most dramatically, nightclub valets are seeing a 50 percent drop-off.

Homegrown Ace Parking — now one of the largest parking companies in North America and also a fixture in San Diego's political and business scene — is feeling the impact from Uber and Lyft, the wildly popular ride-sharing services that allow people to leave their cars at home.

Industry experts say the nation's parking companies are responding to the loss of business by going high-tech, with programs that allow people to track open parking spots and pay from their computers and phones. They hope convenience will persuade people that parking is worth it, if it's easy and guaranteed.

For consumers, the bright side may be lower parking prices.

Maybe we don't need to build so much parking?

In downtown San Diego, city planners are looking at the decline as they update parking guidelines — which could lead to changes in how much future parking is built.

"Is this an existential threat to my business model? Or, is there a way to pivot and continue to provide a necessary service?" said Keith Jones, the third-generation managing partner of the Ace Parking empire, in a recent interview.

"I'm a firm believer that

the parking-transportation concept will still need experts who focus on it."

Ace certainly isn't alone.

In 2017, 68 percent of business travelers chose Uber or Lyft, while 25 percent chose rental cars. Only 7 percent hopped in taxis, according to Certify, which tracks business travel spending.

Uber was rated as the No. 1 most-expensed and best-loved of all brands last year, beating out Starbucks, Delta Airlines and Amazon.com, according to Certify.

At San Diego International, there's some evidence that parking is on the decline, though the numbers are murky because a Terminal 2 lot has been under construction.

Parking revenue has been flat while plane traffic is up 7 percent so far this fiscal year, said Rebecca Bloomfield, an airport spokeswoman.

It's a national trend

Parking expert Casey Wagner, who hosts a National Parking Association webinar on the rise of the shared economy, said the numbers point to Uber and Lyft taking a big bite out of the parking, car rental and taxi industries.

"We've seen that clearly in hotels, the travel industry, the impact on rental cars and taxis, short-term airport parking, restaurants and bars," said Wagner, chief operating officer of Walker Consultants in Houston.

As goes San Diego, so do other metropolitan areas, Jones said. Ace Parking saw similar declines at its 750 parking operations from Washington, D.C., to Portland, Ore.

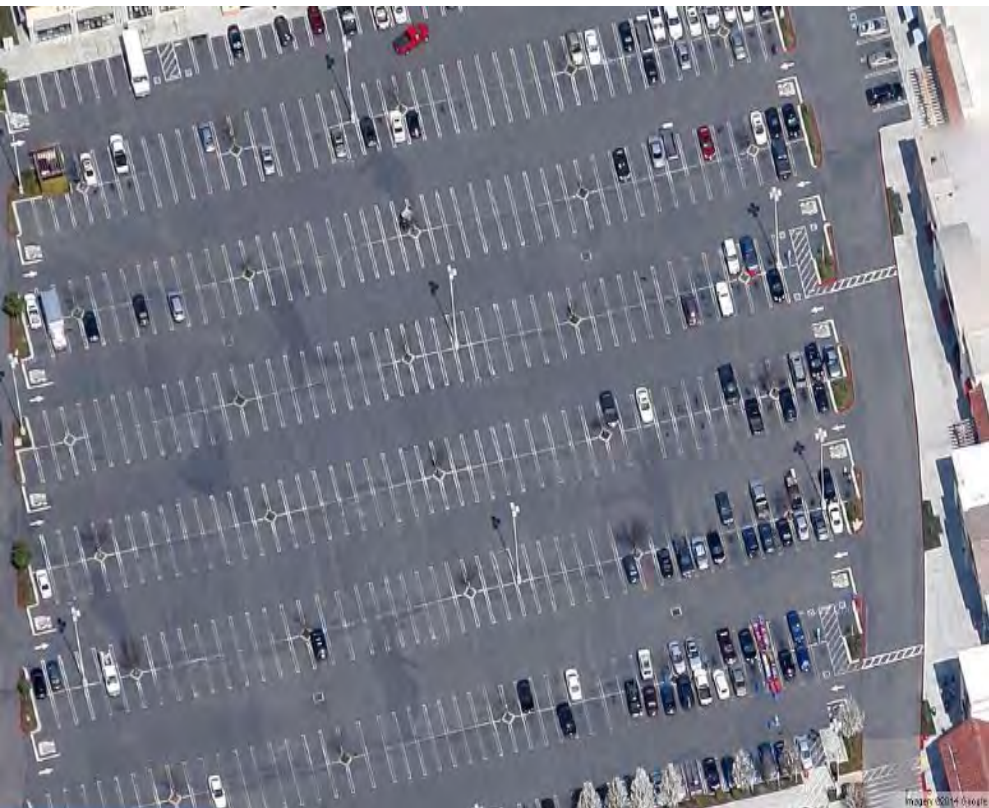
In the national picture, Jones said, the decline at hotels for overnight cars is more like 15 to 20 percent.

What's a parking company to do? Ace and other parking chains are fighting back with technology.

"They are looking to compete with the convenience factor — parking reservations, parking on demand, communicating with apps," said Wagner, the industry consultant.

"If I know that I have a space that's a block away, if I'm the designated driver, or I'm going to make several trips, that makes more sense for me than trying to organize two or three people to Uber or Lyft."

Technology may make



us like parking again

Here's how Ace Parking's leadership sees the future.

A parking website would show the consumer that there are 10 available stalls here, or 50 stalls there. It would also show the price. The consumer pays online and scans a cellphone when arriving at the garage.

"You're not just going to show up at the airport and go, 'I know there are a bunch of flights to San Francisco.' What I strongly believe is, we need the same mentality when it comes to parking," Jones said.

"So it's ingrained in your decision-making processes that, before you leave for your destination, that you are able to tie in" to a parking scenario.

Ace Parking is in the middle of trying to modernize its operations to make that happen, Jones said — though the effort can be complicated by the details of ownership. The bottom line is, who pays for the cost to upgrade the technology, the property owner or the operator?

"Out of the 750 properties we are involved with, almost every one is different, based on this owner, this institution, this municipality, the way they are structured and what they want," Jones said.

In San Diego, Ace has contracts to operate parking at many public properties, including Petco Park and San Diego International.

Competition = price cuts

But if parking is still more expensive than an Uber ride, consumers will likely vote with their wallets.

Jones and Wagner both predict that ride-share competition may push

down parking prices.

Parking companies "are looking at what the cost is to park, versus Uber," Wagner said. "They need to be aware of what's going to help them maintain their revenue stream."

What Ace and other parking companies can't compete on? How Uber and Lyft remove the temptation to drink and drive for some users.

In New York, for example, ride-sharing services are credited with reducing alcohol-related accidents by 25 to 35 percent. However, other studies questioned the correlation.

"Ace fully supports transportation options that help make our communities safer," Jones said. "If this is a competitive advantage for ride share, then I support it."

San Diego's downtown planning agency is eyeing

these parking trends, also.

Goodbye, garages

Civic San Diego is in the middle of updating downtown's five-year comprehensive parking plan. Changes could go to the city council this year.

Already, the city is experimenting with a designated pick-up, drop-off lane for ride-share cars on Fifth Avenue in the Gaslamp Quarter, after a study determined that a community valet wouldn't be successful.

Currently, developers are required to supply a certain amount of parking spaces in a new building.

"We are looking at whether those ratios should be lowered," said Brad Richter, a Civic San Diego vice president.

Ride-sharing is one factor, but the biggest point is that downtown is becoming more dense, which means people can walk to jobs and stores more easily without needing cars.

Something else under consideration: Should the city should fund any more public parking?

At two current public garages downtown, monthly customers are still going strong but special-event revenue has dropped off.

Two more public garages are planned at 7th and Market and underneath East Village Green park. Those seem to pencil out based on analyses in the past few years, Richter said, but officials will be taking a hard look at demand for future projects.

"Given the increased popularity of the ride-share services, do you need to provide as many public garages?" Richter said, outlining the debate. "You don't want to over build."

Stores making push in scan-and-go tech

Big grocers hoping more customers enjoy new mobile shopping experience

NEW YORK — Shoppers at self-checkout lanes scanning all their groceries after they're done shopping? Old school. More stores are letting customer tally their choices with a phone app or store device as they roam the aisles.

For customers, scanning as they go can be faster and make it simpler to keep track of spending. For stores, the big expansion of this technology coming this year costs less than installing more self-checkouts.

Like many changes in retail, the expansion of scan-and-go comes from retailers trying to make store shopping more convenient and hang on to customers used to Amazon, which just opened a cashier-less store in Seattle. And like other automation technologies, it shifts more of the work to shoppers while freeing up employees for higher-value tasks.

The convenience of scanning while she shops

is what Kari Malinak likes. She just started using the technology at a Walmart in Fort Worth, Texas.

"I'm a persnickety shopper," Malinak said. "I can't stand it when they bag my produce. It gets all bruised. I like to have control. And I like the quick and easy aspect." She said she also likes the idea of having a running total of spending as she shops.

The technology, while slightly different from chain to chain, allows shoppers at stores like Kroger and B.J.'s Wholesale Club to scan UPC codes on items as they shop. It can be used for lots of products beyond just groceries, and people change their minds about something, they can delete items and change quantities before they check out.

Some stores allow payment directly from the phone, with a greeter then checking over the digital receipt, while others require shoppers to go to a self-checkout lane or a kiosk to finalize their purchases.

A push is coming this year from big chains: Kroger Co., the nation's largest traditional grocery chain, is adding the scan-and-go technology to 400 stores. Walmart is testing the service in 120 stores, while its Sam's Club stores, which number around 600, have it. B.J.'s Wholesale Club has launched the service in a handful of stores and plans to add it to 100 clubs this year.

One reason is that stores are investing less in their self-checkout lanes and opting for scan-and-go technology that's less expensive because it doesn't need as much special hardware — just an app or the scanners, said Jason Goldberg, senior vice president of commerce and content practice at consulting group SapientRazorfish.

But while some customers feel comfortable scanning while shopping, plenty of others don't.

"It's a huge barrier for most retailers to get a consumer to download their app," Goldberg said. He said stores also need to work on letting shoppers pay with their phones, so customers

don't have to go to a kiosk to finalize their purchases.

Most executives wouldn't say what percent of their transactions come from the service. But Dusty Lutz, of retail technology company NCR Corp., which works with major grocery clients, says scan-and-go mobile shopping accounts for 5 to 15 percent of customer transactions, based on an analysis of 40 retailers.

Walmart — which tested scan-and-go in a few stores in 2013 but ended the trial because shoppers found the technology too clunky — said the improved service is now the most preferred checkout method among those who tested it. Sam's Club said 80 percent of its members who use it use it again within 90 days and its scan-and-go transactions doubled this year.

Still, not everything can be scanned. At BJ's clubs, jewelry and gift cards can't be scanned but can be purchased at a pay station. Stores also have to be careful about theft. At Walmart, there's an honor code when shoppers scan the barcode on the pro-

duce and enter in the weight. But some purchases are randomly checked on their way through the express lane.

And the technology the big chains are using isn't as effortless as the sensors and automatic payment at Amazon's cashier-less stores. There, shoppers enter by scanning their phones. The store technology itself keeps track of what they pick up and charges them after they leave. It uses computer vision, machine learning algorithms and sensors to analyze what people are grabbing.

Amazon's store isn't without employees — there are workers making food, stocking shelves and helping customers. And grocery executives say the scan-and-go services won't eliminate cashier jobs — rather, some cashiers will move to other parts of the store.

And for shoppers who find it most convenient to go the traditional route with a cashier scanning their purchases? "Our goal is to provide members with a variety of options so they can check out however they prefer," said Carrie McKnight, a Sam's Club spokeswoman.

BBQ pitmaster sisters: ‘Come out of the kitchen, go to the backyard’

KANSAS CITY, Kan. — Jones Bar-B-Q is run out of a tiny former taco stand in Kansas City.

But owners and sisters Mary Jones Mosley and Deborah Jones are drawing national media outlets to their doorstep.

The latest to come calling is the Lifetime network, which is featuring the sisters in an online campaign called “Her America: 50 women, 50 States,” which launched Feb. 12.

Mary, 57, is a fan of the television network so when she answered the first phone call from a Lifetime producer telling her she wanted to feature her and Deborah, 60, in the campaign, Mary thought it was a prank.

“I told the lady to give me a phone number where I could actually call the Lifetime station back” Mary said as she served customers recently inside the to-go eatery. “Sure enough, she gave me a number, and she emailed us with the Lifetime logos and the whole nine yards.”

Deborah chimes in, “But they kept calling back

and talking, and I said, ‘Shorty (her nickname for Mary), I don’t think this is a joke.’ Then they sent the paperwork for us to sign and send back, then when the crew showed up, I said, ‘This is for real, Shorty.’”

The network created the campaign following the 2016 presidential election, “when America seemed more fractured than ever ... to capture the truth about women’s lives in America, bringing them closer together and amplifying the voices that go unheard and unrecognized,” said a press release promoting the campaign.

Mary and Deborah have been working as professional pitmasters and owners of Jones Bar-B-Q for more than three decades. The latest incarnation, in the one-time taco stand, is near Wild Woody’s Happy Foods West at 6706 Kaw Drive.

A story about the sisters was featured in an August 2016 story in The Kansas City Star. Just a few months ago, in October, Jeremy Hobson, co-host of NPR’s “Here and Now,” featured them on a radio segment called “What Makes Good Kansas City Barbecue.”

For the Lifetime campaign, photographer Nina

Robinson spent four days with the sisters, from the time they got up at 4 a.m. to start smoking meat to 4 p.m. when they closed shop.

“We were interested in finding women who oversee a traditional BBQ operation — from the recipe to tending the fire,” Lea Goldman, editor in chief at Lifetime, wrote in an email. “This role is very male-dominated, and we discovered there were very few women like the Jones sisters in America. Once we got in touch with them, they had an incredible spark and passion for their work. The relationship between them, their collaboration and commitment to their family’s tradition really drew us in.”

Goldman went on to describe the project as a sprawling endeavor and a year of old-fashioned gumshoe reporting and scouting.

“And the women we selected are nuanced and complicated,” she wrote. “She is many things — mother, friend, sister, lover, patriot, opinionated, rebel, free spirit, artist, traditionalist. Good luck putting her in any one box. And in these challenging times, when there seems to be far more shouting than listen-

ing, ‘Her America’ demands that we all just stop, even for a moment, and just hear each other out.”

The sisters are surprised that people find them to be such a novelty.

“It may be a man’s field but me and my sister, we don’t feel threatened,” Mary said. “We didn’t look at it as a man’s thing or a competition, because our dad really taught us from when we were small how to do things. He was really just trying to get us prepared for life. He just wanted us to deal with things. If your tire gets flat, don’t just stand there. Get the tools out and fix it.”

“He wanted us not to be dependent on a man,” Deborah chimes in. “On nobody! He always said don’t get dependent on anybody. You better know how to take care of yourself just in case.”

The sisters wish more women would get into barbecuing.

“Come out of the kitchen, go to the backyard,” Deborah said. “Your husband is standing at the grill; tell him to move over, you got this. Catch the heat. Catch the heat, you know? Just like we do it in the kitchen, we can do it just as good in the backyard.”

Woman who handles scheduling slates herself to donate kidney to co-worker

CHESTERTON, Ind. — Jason Reyes will never forget the last time he ate shrimp, he said.

It was a few weeks ago, following a Dec. 27 kidney transplant, when he ordered some shrimp with cocktail sauce and experienced some significant stomach pain, he said. It was possibly worse pain than the surgery itself, and definitely more depressing, he said.

Doctors warned him he would discover very quickly that his diet was going to change whether he liked it or not.

But even if he never gets to eat another morsel of the foods he loves, it’s a trade he’s grateful to make.

Reyes, 35, of Hobart, was given a new lease on life, and from the most unexpected place: Heather Szymaszek, a Chesterton woman who handles scheduling at ArcelorMittal Indiana Harbor plant, where they both work.

Reyes’ health had been precarious since he was diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes 14 years ago, he said.

“I was diagnosed with it when I was 21, and the high blood pressure that comes with it was beating up on my kidneys. I didn’t want to face it, though, and I was in denial for a long time,” Reyes said. “Then eight years ago, things started getting really bad, so I had weight-loss surgery and

that slowed [the disease’s progression] for a while.”

The situation turned dire a year ago, however, during a California vacation. He started retaining fluid to the point where he could neither breathe nor walk without incredible difficulty, he said.

The subsequent meeting with his nephrologist upon his return confirmed the worst: Reyes would start dialysis immediately and be put on the donor list for a new kidney.

“My biggest fear was telling my family because they would be scared,” he said. “Not very many people knew I was sick, and I didn’t want them to worry. I went through the mix of emotions: Scared, and then I got mad about it. But I was always worried about other people — especially my son — that I didn’t have time to think about what it meant for me.”

He had plenty of time to think about things during the four hours and 15 minutes he spent hooked up to the dialysis machine three days a week.

Namely, how dialysis is a wretched experience.

Shortly after Reyes went on leave from the mill, Szymaszek was in a clerk’s office at work one day when she overheard a call between that person and Reyes. He called to let the company know he wouldn’t be coming back to work for a long while, if ever, because he’d gone into kidney failure.

Although Szymaszek didn’t know him well at the time, she was compelled to reach out, she said.

“I messaged him and said, ‘Well, I’m O-negative, so if you need something — like a kidney — let me know,’” she said.

The gesture stunned Reyes. With 100,000 people on the donor list, he was thrilled yet didn’t want to get his hopes up.

“When she messaged me, I never expected her to be like, ‘Here! Have my kidney!’ ” he said. “I never thought I would have the opportunity right away.”

In August, the two were working with the University of Illinois at Chicago Hospital, Reyes said.

Dr. Enrico Benedetti, the hospital’s attending transplant surgeon, said he and his team perform the surgeries using a robot. Doing so is less invasive and leaves patients — especially those with higher body-mass indexes such as Reyes — less prone to infection.

Meanwhile, a battery of tests for Szymaszek made sure she was in good health. At the end of it all, Szymaszek’s kidneys were more than viable for transplanting.

“When we got the date, I was like ‘We’re going to have surgery,’” she said. “But he has to go through dialysis, and I thought, ‘I have nothing to be nervous about.’”

The mother of twins said their delivery, “was a

lot tougher than what [the surgery] sounded like.”

Both surgeries went off without a hitch Dec. 27 — Szymaszek’s birthday — and now, nearly two months later, Reyes’s health has rebounded. Benedetti said that as long as Reyes is diligent with taking his anti-rejection medication and keeping up with his health, he’ll easily enjoy at least 10 years problem-free with Szymaszek’s kidney.

“Diabetic patients do worse on dialysis; the five-year survival rate is between 20 percent and 30 percent,” Benedetti said. “That same group of patients who have a live donor have a 90 percent chance of living five years and at least 70 percent for 10 years. But [transplant patients] are the essential agents of their own luck, so they must take the drugs that suppress the immune system so that the organ will be accepted, but not so much that they get sick.”

Perhaps the best part of the experience for both is that now the two are bonded by a deep, abiding friendship as well as a body part. There is one other side effect Reyes might have to get used to, though, according to Szymaszek: Basic Girl Syndrome.

“I told him if he starts craving Starbucks or worries about his butt looking too big in yoga pants, he’ll know it’s me,” she said.

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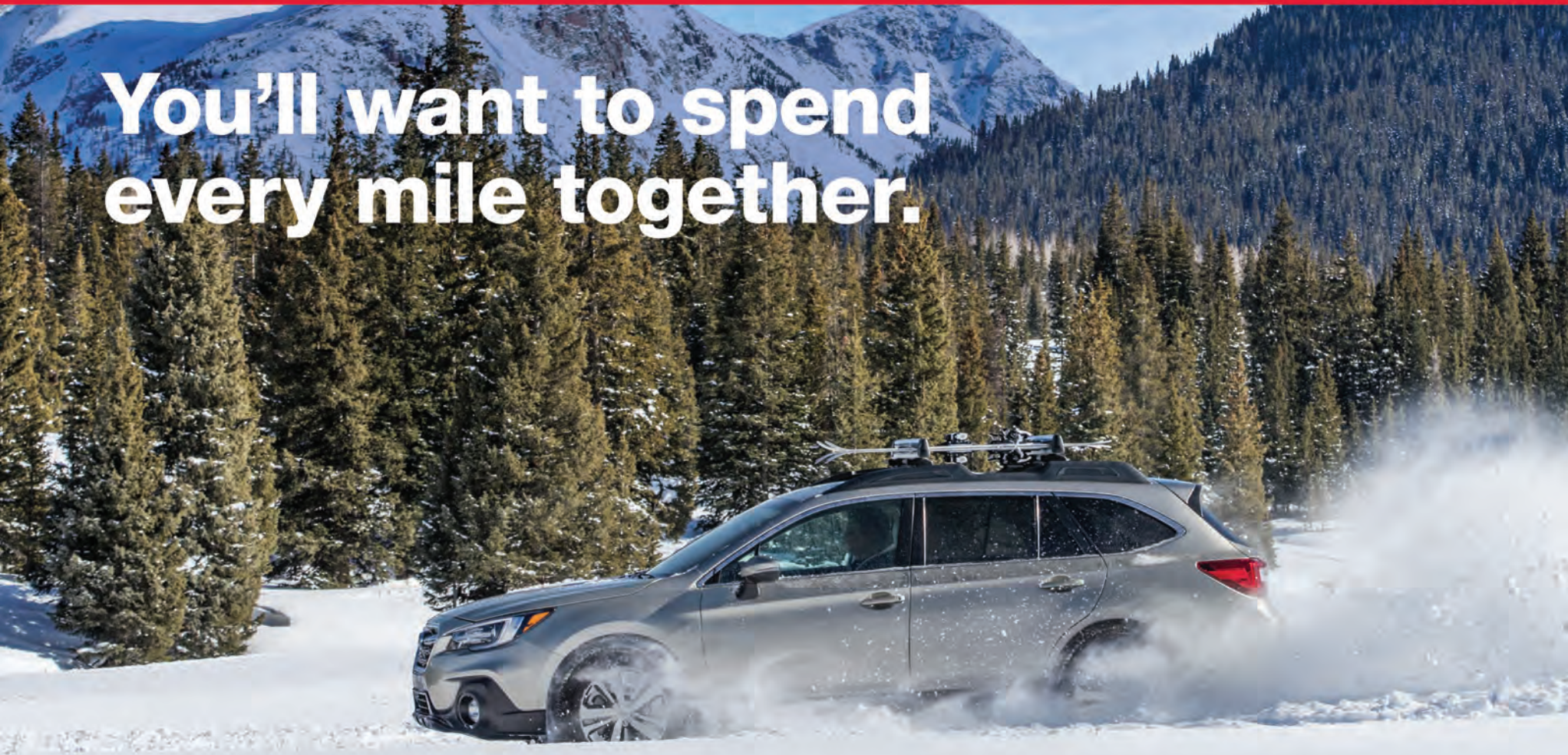

Done with desperation: Three moms are tired of being ‘Good Girls’

It’s hard to truly prepare for how challenging life can be. Sure, there are moments of pure joy, but the endless layering of responsibilities and bills makes it difficult to remain optimistic. It’s easy to fall behind, to become lost within a whirlwind of debt and to learn, in those moments, that those who you thought would be there for you are no longer around.

This is particularly true for women, who, despite the efforts of various feminist waves, still struggle with being perceived as “nice” while attempting to be strong-willed and self-reliant. Rather than continue to suffer these challenges, three mothers from various backgrounds are kicking hardship to the curb when “Good Girls” premieres Monday, Feb. 26, on NBC.

“Good Girls” centers around the lives of three suburban moms, each struggling to keep her family and finances afloat. Beth (Christina Hendricks, “Mad Men”) contends with an unfaithful husband, Dean (Matthew Lillard, “Twin Peaks”), who all too easily seems to misplace or misuse the family finances. Annie (Mae Whitman, “Parenthood”), Beth’s little sister, works way too hard for far too little at a supermarket, trying to provide for herself and her child. Ruby (Retta, “Parks and Recreation”), Beth’s life-long friend, knows exactly the kind of medical treatment her daughter needs, but the cost is seemingly insurmountable for her and her husband, Stan (Reno Wilson, “Mike & Molly”).

When it all becomes too much, these mommas and best friends devise a master plan: rob the local supermarket and walk away with \$30,000. Things go a little too easily, however, and the ladies wind up with a lot more dough than they’d anticipated, along with some new challenges.

Initially, the series seems a bit difficult to place. A first look makes it seem as though it will be a standard sitcom, but the depth to the show makes it more akin, perhaps, to a crime dramedy. The humor acts as a bit of relief from the difficulties these women are facing, challenges not simply bound to gender and relatable to a large segment of

North America’s working class. With sleek production and a plot built on action, emotion and a nice dash of sarcasm, “Good Girls” is as intriguing as it is inviting.

Despite being a broadly relatable show, the emphasis on females and the lives of women is clear and cannot be denied. Creator and screenwriter Jenna Bans, known for her work on both “Grey’s Anatomy” and “Scandal,” had a clear vision for “Good Girls.” While discussing the series during an NBC promo, Bans delved into the concept behind the show:

“What I really tried to get at with this script is the idea of female empowerment — the idea that you wake up, as a woman in your late 30s, early 40s, and go, ‘Oh my God, where did my power go?’ Whether it’s having a bunch of kids, or a husband that doesn’t really see you anymore, or these financial restrictions that these women are under.”



This desire to see real, complex relationships between women come to life on the small screen was a huge driving force for Bans. The fact that the relatability factor is so high, despite the fact that most women will never commit a robbery to resolve their own financial and marital woes, speaks to the care Bans has put into the development of “Good Girls.”

These sentiments are deeply reflective of modern times, as even the show’s title itself forces viewers to re-examine their notions of what it means to be “good girls.” Rather than shying away and committing to outdated stereotypes, women are increasingly opening up about the challenges and trauma they’ve faced, along with the need for more visible, empowered role models.

While discussing the series with NBC’s promotional team, Whitman explained “Good Girls” achieves this, as it is “a great show, with excellent women at the helm of it,” and it’s been a long time coming “for there to be way more shows with the females being the leads ... especially right now, with everything that’s going on.” For Whitman, there’s “never been a more important time for there to be strong, independent, quirky, interesting, different, real, full women, telling their stories and being heard.”

The potential for success with “Good Girls” is not merely in its historically relevant timing, but the fact that these women truly are reflective of the lives so many women lead daily. To have a series willing to encourage support and solidarity over catfights and jealousy is reflective of how broad-reaching social change can be. Women are standing up and demanding to be heard, just as Beth, Annie and Ruth are demanding to have control over their own lives, finances and families’ futures.

It seems unfortunate that femi-

nism has had to experience so many waves, yet so little erosion has occurred along the shoreline. Thankfully, the water may finally be carving out the stones of resistance, with more and more women taking the helm of productions on both the big and small screen. It’s important to remember,

however, that this series and other female-led productions aren’t looking for a takeover, rather simply desiring for acceptance and respect. Ambitious, engaging and humorous, “Good Girls” is on course to make quite the impact when the series premieres Monday, Feb. 26, on NBC.

The Leafs take on the Caps at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium

The Toronto Maple Leafs and Washington Capitals are set to face off in the 2018 NHL Stadium Series taking place at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in Annapolis, Md., on Saturday, March 3. Tune in to NBC to join 34,000 Maple Leafs and Capitals fans for the final outdoor game of the 2017-18 season.

This year's Stadium Series game signals the start of the NHL's new partnership with the U.S. military that plans to hold outdoor games at military service academies around the United States in coming years. The Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium is home to the Navy Midshipmen football team and hosts the Military Bowl every year.

After winning the Metropolitan Division and leading the league in points for the past two seasons, the Capitals are having yet another successful regular season under the leadership of flashy forward Alexander Ovechkin. Despite its success during the regular season, the team is marred by its lackluster performances in the playoffs. In the past eight seasons, the Capitals have been President's Trophy winners three times, but have not gotten past the second round of the Stanley Cup playoffs.

The Maple Leafs have continued to improve since the appointment of Mike Babcock as head coach in 2015. Last season, the Maple Leafs finished with 95 points (the most since their 2003-04 season) and qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 2013. They were defeated by the Capitals in the first round, but they showed plenty of promise going up against the league leaders by forcing the series to six games. The Maple Leafs will be the first Canadian team to participate in the Stadium Series since its inception in 2014, and will look to one-up the Capitals from last season's playoffs.

With just over a month remaining in the 2017-18 regular season, securing a playoff berth will be the top priority for the Maple Leafs and Capitals. As it stands, the three-game season series is tied between the two teams, setting up the Stadium Series as the deciding game. Tune in to NBC to find out who takes two important points in Annapolis, Md., on Saturday, March 3.

Joe Bastianich returns to ‘MasterChef Junior’

Kids aren’t generally known for their refined palates or willingness to explore their culinary options. Sure, there are exceptions out there, but the little ones I know all love their fish-shaped crackers, hotdogs and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches — with the crust cut off of the bread, of course.

Those exceptions, though, can really be something else, especially when they combine those refined tastes with the kitchen skills to back them up, as every season of “MasterChef Junior” reminds

us. A new season of the culinary competition premieres Friday, March 2, on Fox, with a fresh batch of exceptional youngsters eager to test their skills and their taste buds to the panel of three judges.

That’s right — three judges. Long-time fans of the show might remember that last season featured only two permanent members on the judging panel: chefs Gordon Ramsay (who’s been with the series since its inception) and Christina Tosi (who joined in season 4). A rotating slate of guests rounded out the judging trio, but this season features a return to three permanent judges — and the third one has a familiar face. Joe

Bastianich, who served alongside Ramsay in “MasterChef Junior’s” first three seasons, stages a return to the front of the kitchen for this year’s competition.

Far more than in its parent show “MasterChef,” “Junior” features all three judges toning down the toughness and cranking up the affection for the chefs-in-training competing for a big cash prize. Culinary mistakes are met with helpful advice, and even Ramsay’s infamous temper is somehow kept in check; he can even come across as a softie, if you can believe it!

The result is one of the most pleasant cooking competitions on television. Watching a kid sear a fillet or bake a soufflé with far more talent, skill and competence than most adult home cooks could ever pull off is a joy, and the series has left by the wayside the bickering and scheming that’s all too common in reality series starring adults.

And that’s really all “MasterChef Junior” is at its core: extremely talented kids showing off their technical skills while three helpful adults look on. The new season of “MasterChef Junior,” featuring the return of Joe Bastianich, premieres Friday, March 2, on Fox.

Book smart: Biblical comedy blends faith with funny

Book smart: Things have gotten biblical at CBS. The network’s long-anticipated sitcom based on a bestselling non-fiction book has been in the works since 2015, and “Living Biblically” finally premieres Monday, Feb. 26.

Jay R. Feguson (“Mad Men”) stars as Chip, a lapsed Catholic who suffers a one-two series of emotional punches after his best friend dies and his wife (Lindsey Kraft, “Grace and Frankie”) reveals that she’s pregnant. After taking a look at his life — and after his deceased friend’s mother reveals that she doesn’t believe her son made it into heaven — Chip decides that the best way to improve himself is to start following the rules found in the Bible as literally as he can.

The premise is lifted straight from the 2007 book “The Year of Living Biblically: One Man’s Humble Quest to Follow the Bible as Literally as Possible,” by magazine editor A.J. Jacobs. For the sitcom, which was called “By the Book” earlier in production, the writers and producers have attempted to craft a comedy that can poke fun at the idea of interpreting certain biblical rules literally (like, say, the stoning of adulterers) in our modern world, without ever making fun of Christians themselves or their beliefs.

To be sure, that’s a fine line to walk, but “Living Biblically” has a strong team behind it. “The Big Bang Theory” star Johnny Galecki serves as producer, while Camryn Manheim (“Ghost Whisperer”), Ian Gomez (“Cougar Town”), David Krumholtz (“Numb3rs”) and Carla Renata (“Hart of Dixie”) round out the show’s cast.

It’s a laugh-out-loud comedy with a biblical twist, and it premieres on CBS on Monday, Feb. 26.

Bad boys: The word “mafia” may conjure up images of Prohibition-era mobsters, or of “The Godfather” (1972) star Marlon

Brando making offers that can’t be refused, but it’s no secret that organized crime hasn’t gone away over the decades, as one British import makes all too clear.

“McMafia” aired earlier this year in the United Kingdom on BBC One, and on Monday, Feb. 26, it makes its way across the pond to premiere on AMC. The eight-part drama may be a work of fiction, but it’s inspired by Misha Glenny’s 2008 non-fiction book “McMafia: A Journey Through the Global Criminal Underworld,” which peels back the veil that usually keeps modern day organized crime hidden from sight.

James Norton (“Grantchester”) stars as Alex Godman, an accomplished businessman who’s successfully left the shadow of his Russian exile father. He’s spent his life avoiding his father’s criminal past, but when that ugly history rears up and refuses to let him get away so easily, he finds himself tempted by the lures of corruption.

Sound intriguing? British critics sure thought so, giving the series’ excellent reviews, and users of AMC’s Premiere service don’t even have to wait to watch the whole series, with all eight episodes available to subscribers once the series premiere has aired.

Of course, Norton isn’t the only star in this black-hearted

drama. Juliet Rylance (“American Gothic”) stars alongside him as his loving fiancée, Rebecca, while American actor David Strathairn (“The Blacklist”) plays powerful Israeli businessman Semiyon Kleiman.

The mafia certainly isn’t a thing of the past, and AMC’s “McMafia” isn’t afraid to take a look at its modern incarnations. The drama premieres Monday, Feb. 26.

Bergen’s back: First it was reboots and now it’s revivals of classic ‘90s TV shows. Fox was first up to the plate with the return of “The X-Files” in 2016, and in 2017, NBC brought back “Will & Grace.” ABC’s “Roseanne” returns March 27 more than 20 years after it went off the air, and now CBS is getting in on the revival action as well.

Thirteen new episodes of “Murphy Brown” have been green-lit for the 2018-19 TV season, bringing back one of the sharpest, smartest and most popular sitcoms from the 1990s.

Candice Bergen (“Boston Legal”) is lined up to return as the titular character, a role that she played for all 10 seasons of the show’s original run. The series was agenda setting at the time: Brown was a powerful single woman who anchored fictional newsmagazine series “FYI.” Bergen won an impressive five Emmys for her role before refusing future nominations so that other actresses could compete.

The media landscape has changed dramatically since “Murphy Brown” went dark in 1998, with concerns about fake news and questions of bias dominating the modern discourse. It’s exactly the sort of environment that’s perfect for a series that was never shy about courting controversy to come into.

The revivals just keep on coming, and “Murphy Brown” is just the latest one coming down the pike. Watch for the revived series starring Candice Bergen to premiere next TV season.

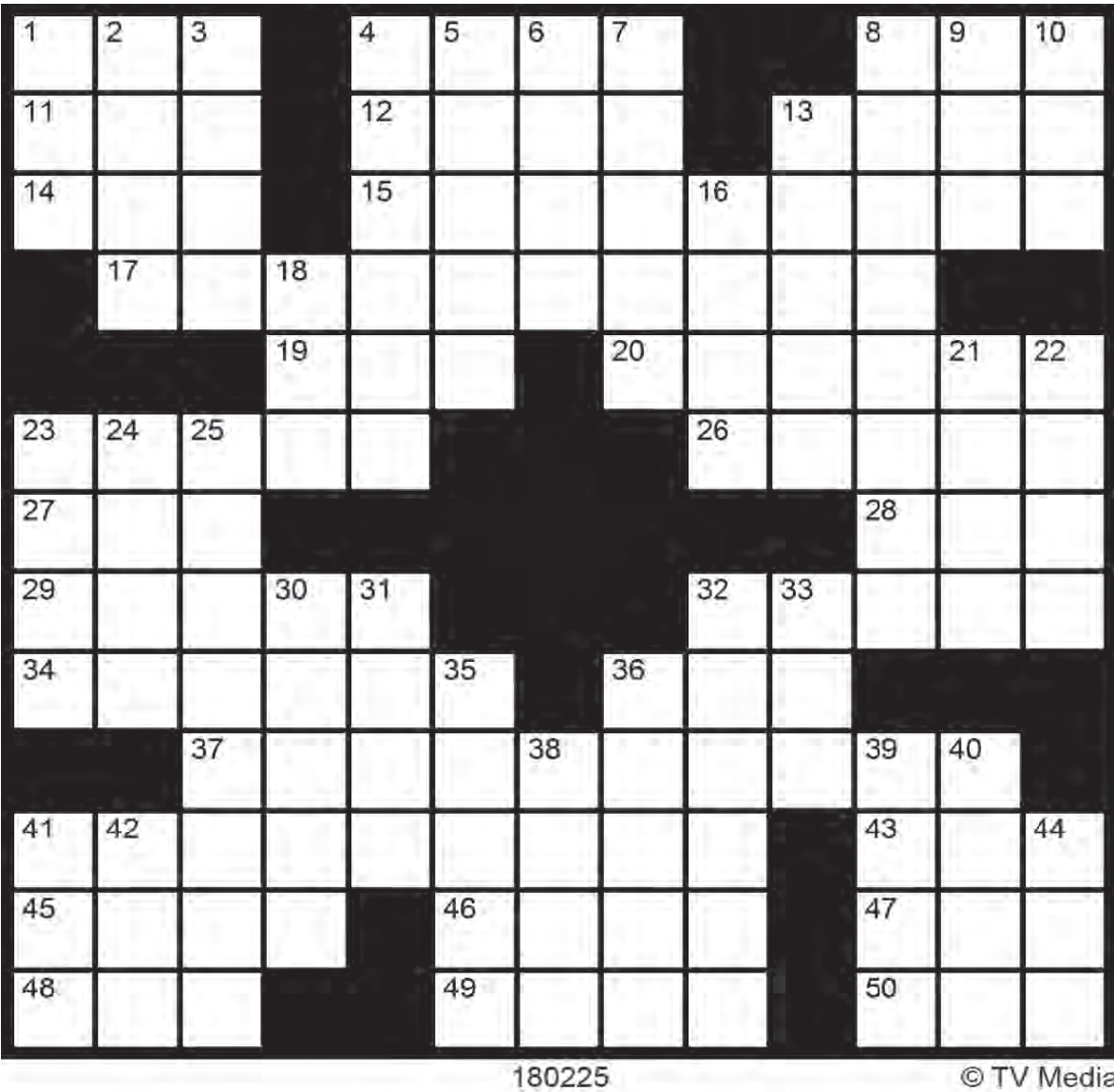

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Time is money, plan ahead

There is always something to plan for as we age. Despite our best intentions, most of us drop a ball or two along the way. In regard to our health, we are reminded to eat healthy foods, exercise regularly and get regular checkups. In regard to our finances, we are reminded to plan for our retirement, avoid debt and invest wisely. In addition to those goals, maintaining our estate plan is important for our physical and financial wellness.

Having an estate plan does not just mean having a last will and testament. While your will controls your affairs after you pass away, your powers of attorney protect your voice by directing the person you trust to maintain your physical and financial decisions during a possible future incapacity.

With updates to laws and the potential for litigation, it is more important than ever for your powers of attorney to have language in them commonly referred to as elder law provisions. With current tax laws, less than one percent of our estates will incur estate taxes upon our death, but most of us will incur health expenses prior to our death. To achieve the best outcome – plan in advance because if you run out of money, you run out of care options.

Estate planning has become an important issue as our state's population is growing older. Currently, 18.8 percent of West Virginia's population is over the age of 65 and by 2032, it is projected to increase by 29 percent (MedicaidAnnuity.com). The average cost of care of skilled care facilities in West Virginia is \$9,703 per month (MedicaidAnnuity.com). Many people mistakenly believe they can obtain more affordable care in the home, but professional home health care is usually even more expensive care than in a facility. The issue facing many of us is how to afford the care we need without losing our life savings.

I recently met a gentleman who did not plan in advance and he is well on his way to going broke. He has already spent \$800,000 of his \$1 million life savings in a skilled care facility over the past 3

years. But, if he had moved his money to an asset protection trust at least 5 years before he entered the facility, he could have saved the entire \$1 million. In fact, even if he had taken some asset protection steps upon entering the facility, he still could have saved about \$500,000. Unfortunately, at this late stage, he will be lucky to retain even \$100,000.

When considering planning options, most people consider costs, control and timing. Insurance products and trusts are two common strategies specifically designed for asset protection. Insurance products generally afford more care placement options and the ability to directly control your assets, but they are usually expensive and must be purchased while you are still relatively healthy. In contrast, a trust restricts the gifter's direct control over the trust assets (while permitting a trusted person to have that control) but is more economical than insurance options. Ideally, trusts are funded 5 years prior to a crisis.

An estate plan that includes asset protection strategies may be the key to avoid going broke during a long-term care health crisis. Regardless of whether or not you choose an asset protection strategy, be certain to understand your options for the best results and for your peace of mind.

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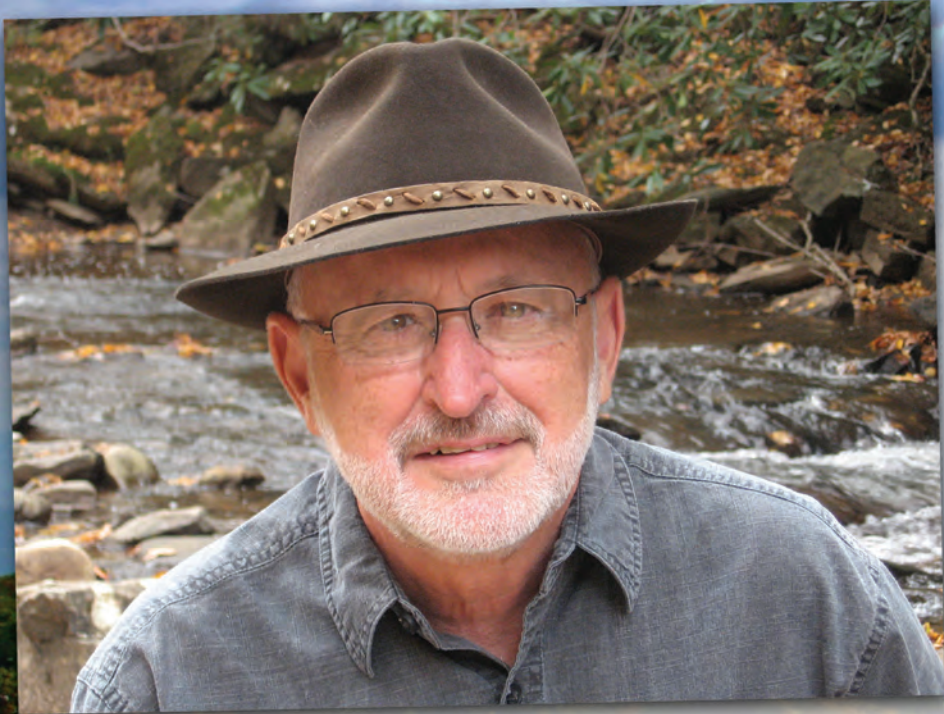
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Thomas H. Williams: “Writing is my hobby”

Williams is the author of two historical novels and a mystery novel, all of which are set in West Virginia.

Not only is he an author, Williams said he is also an avid reader who reads several books a week.

“I enjoy reading and I always thought I would like to try writing when

I retired,” he said. “You need a hobby.”

Williams said writing historical novels requires a lot of careful research. He said readers sometimes check what they are reading for accuracy. His novel *Greenbrier!: Valley of Hope*. Takes place in Greenbrier County, during the Civil War. It covers the topic of slavery, those for it and those against.

“The characters in my book *Into the Mountains* are riding horses between Rowlesburg and Kingwood. I had to look at my 1862 map to make sure there was a road there,” he said. “I’m not a historian so when I write about the Civil War it takes a lot of research, reading and time,” Williams added.

Williams, a former professor from West Virginia Wesleyan, and a former biology teacher said plant and animal life plays an important role in his novels.

“I try to emphasize the natural habitat; the birds and plants my characters see along the way,” he said. “The characters always listen for bird calls. One of the characters is a botanist so he’s always stopping to check out the botany.”

He said his book, *Backbone Mountain*, is a mystery novel that takes the characters from Laurel Mountain to Canaan Valley to Blackwater Falls and Dolly Sods.

He said he is working on a second (yet unnamed) mystery novel.



“I’m interested in the logging era in this area,” he said. “I have a rough idea about this. I want to see where this mystery takes me”

Williams said another novel he is considering writing hits closer to home.

“My father, my uncle and my two cousins formed a band in the early 1930s. They played on WMNM and KDKA radio stations. They traveled around Northern West Virginia for two years. There has to be a story in that.”

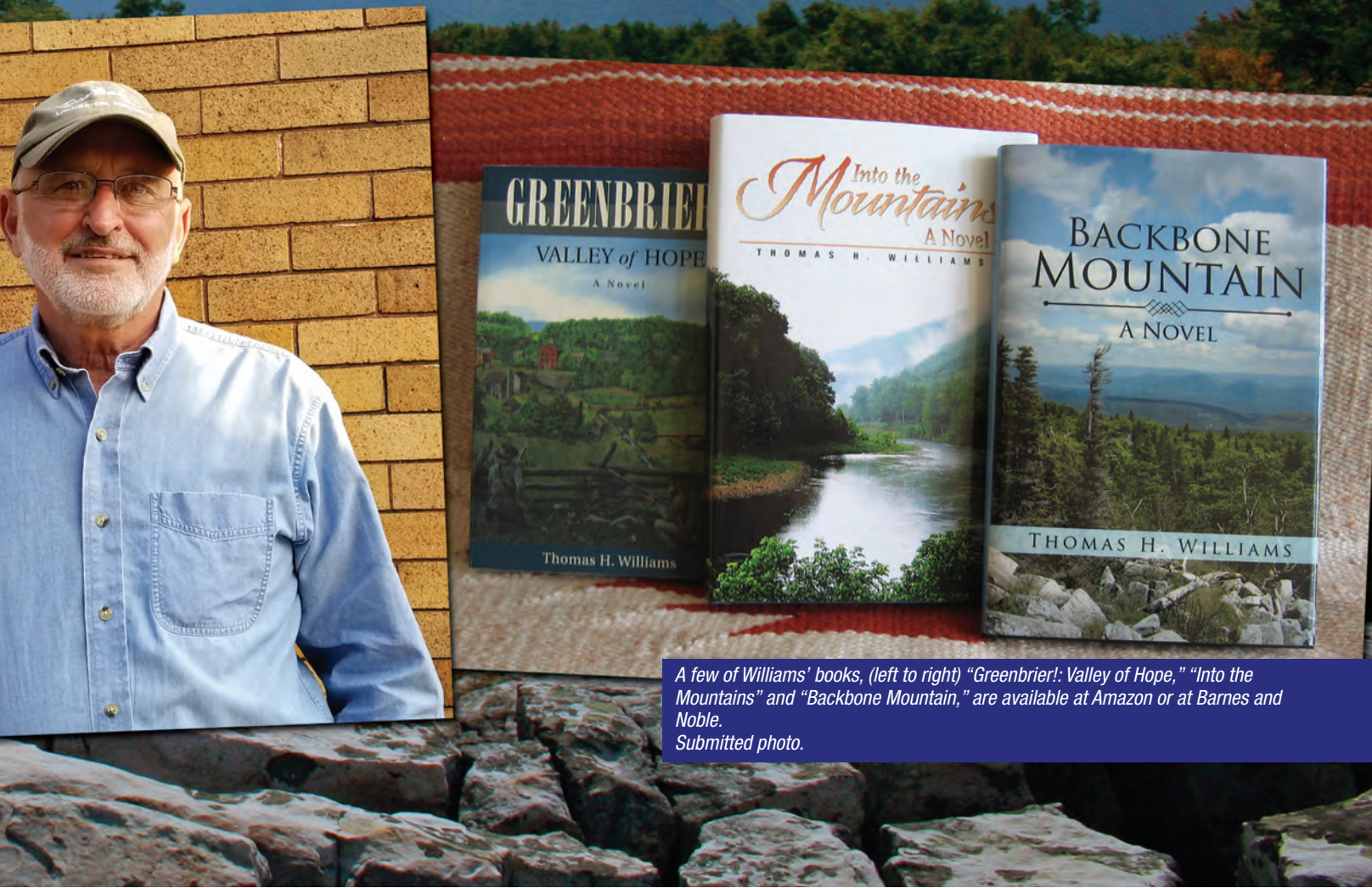
He said as a writer he composes his novels in his head while driving.

“I write out my characters first,” Williams said with a smile. “As to my current mystery novel, I already know how it ends.”

Calling all women: Be proactive and protect your health

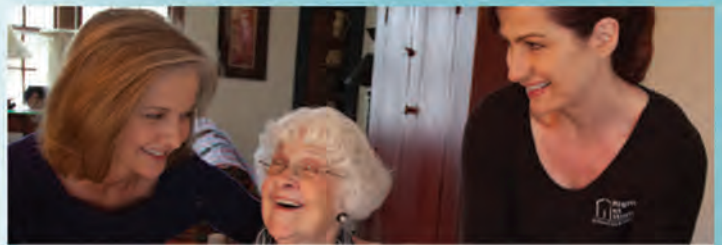

Back in the day, if a woman spoke of her personal health, she could end up in a mental asylum or subject to bloodletting by leeches. In the centuries long before employee wellness programs and biometric screenings, some diseases were blamed on night air and expressive emotions. And women who pursued an education were warned that intellectual aspirations damaged their reproductive health.

Women across the globe have progressed in moving their health to the forefront of everyday conversations and medical advancements. This betterment is evident in the celebrations of March as Women's History Month in the United States and March 8 as International Women's Day, yet countless females remain in the dark about their ongoing health and fitness. Many are at high risk for the top five health concerns of women, including heart disease and osteoporosis, but do not know it.

"Shortfalls still exist in women's health," said April Wintermoyer, owner/



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operator of Right at Home, Morgantown. "It is one of the reasons we stay watchful of the senior women we serve through our at-home caregiving. Older women face increased challenges to staying attentive to their medical conditions. These challenges can be everything from thinning skin to serious breathing problems. It is important for both aging women and men, with the help of their families and caregivers, to stay on the lookout to detect health issues early."

What steps can you, as a woman, take to bolster your own personal health?

Understand your own body. What makes you energetic or sluggish? What are your optimum hours of sleep? How much exercise is enough without causing muscle fatigue or strain? If you are in menopause, how is your body adjusting? The more you are a student of your own body, the more you'll be prepared if something seems off-kilter and you need to seek medical attention.

Educate yourself on health issues. With ever-expanding technology and instant access to information, women of all ages can stay up to date on pertinent health topics. Local physician offices and hospitals often host health programs and forums just for women. The federal government's Office of Women's Health — womenshealth.gov or 1-800-994-9662 — shares a wealth of facts about women's health and wellness. Healthfinder.gov is another national-level resource for organizations and services available to assist with a woman's well-being.

Know and act on your family health history. Did your grandfather have diabetes? Do your siblings have high blood pressure? Collecting an accurate health history on your family of origin can give your doctor a better picture of your current health and your risks for disease. Ask relatives from both your father's and mother's sides about any medical conditions they have or have had. Record the ages when these conditions first occurred.

Seek preventative health information. Stay current with your doctor on the screening tests for the following health conditions that often increase with age:

- High blood pressure — manual or digital blood pressure monitor
- Cholesterol — fasting lipoprotein panel
- Heart disease — blood pressure, cholesterol, body mass index and other cardiovascular tests
- Diabetes — fasting blood glucose level, or A1c test

- Breast cancer — clinical breast exam, mammogram
- Ovarian cancer — pap smear
- Skin cancer — annual skin test
- Osteoporosis — bone mineral density test
- Glaucoma — eye exam with dilation of pupils

And you can be grateful for all the ladies who lived before you and helped changed the tide on physical conditions being attributed to night air, expressive emotions and educational pursuits.

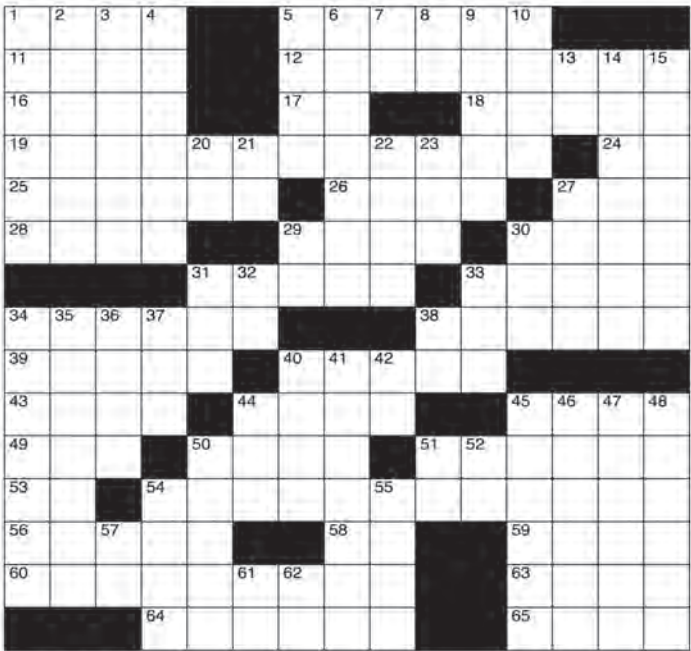

The secret to good balance: Know the 3 essential elements

Without having to think about it, your body does an astonishing balancing act every day. I am not just talking about your busy schedule! When we rise from a chair, climb stairs and walk outside on uneven terrain there is cooperation between the brain, nervous system, muscles and bones, which helps keep us from falling.

How does our balance system work?

1. Visual cues from our eyes tell us all sorts of information about our environment and where we are in space. Our eyes help us see and prepare for potential dangers and obstacles. This is why it can be difficult to keep your balance when it is dark around you.

2. The inner ear, sometimes referred to as the vestibular system, provides important information on the position of our head and its movement in space. This is how you know you are “tilting” sideways. (It can get overwhelmed, making you feel dizzy or nauseous – think roller coaster!)

3. Proprioception is a built-in mechanism that tells your nervous system where your arms and legs are positioned in space by sensing pressure changes in the joints. For example, if you close your eyes and then lift your

arm and wave it above your head, you know where your arm is because of this automatic feedback.

When all these systems are working together we can stay active and independent, preventing falls and improving our balance.

Don't be resigned to poor balance

Poor balance is NOT like wrinkles or gray hair. You don't have to be resigned to poorer balance as you age. You can take action to improve and maintain it.

Though there are often many factors involved with decreased balance as we age, it is a skill that many of us can keep during our adult life. A lot of this decline is simply due to our inactivity. This can be improved with training.

The best place to train your balance

You can do balance exercises almost anytime, anywhere and as often as you like, as long as you are in a safe environment. It is a good idea to have something sturdy, like a counter or sink, nearby to hold on to in case you become unsteady.

Balance exercises overlap with lower body strength exercises, which can also improve your balance. Do the strength exercises two or more days per week, but not on any two days in a row.

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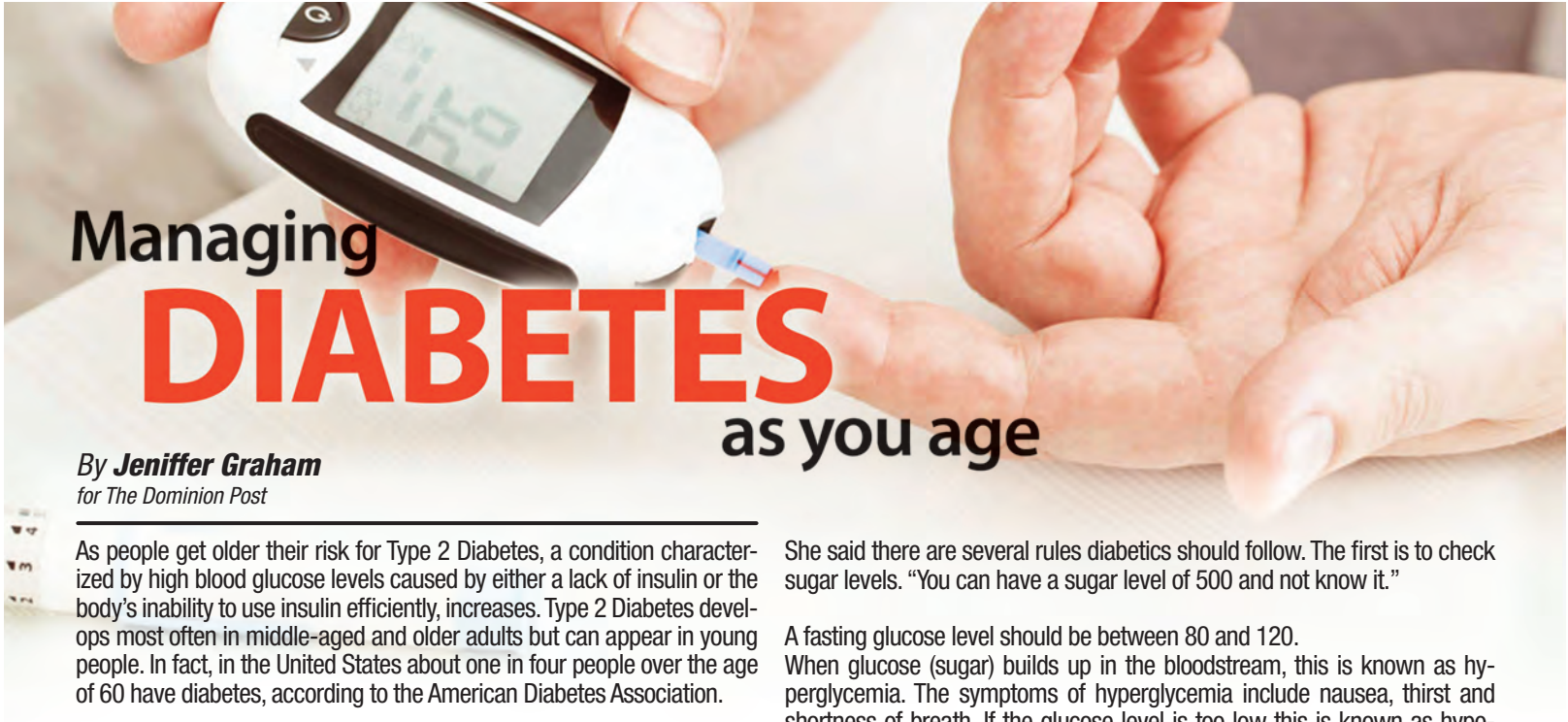
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Managing DIABETES as you age

As people get older their risk for Type 2 Diabetes, a condition characterized by high blood glucose levels caused by either a lack of insulin or the body's inability to use insulin efficiently, increases. Type 2 Diabetes develops most often in middle-aged and older adults but can appear in young people. In fact, in the United States about one in four people over the age of 60 have diabetes, according to the American Diabetes Association.

Kindra Barker, family nurse practitioner and certified diabetic educator, helps seniors and people of all ages cope with diabetes. In December, Barker hosted her first community support group meeting for diabetics at the Mon County Health Department.

"In December I went to one of the food pantries and they provided 15 meal kits for the people who attended the meeting," Barker said.

She said diet is an important part of controlling diabetes. At each meeting there is a diabetic friendly meal. Participants get to try foods they might not have tried before. After the meal, they are also provided with a recipe for the dishes, along with the carb counts.

Food is not the only thing provided at the meetings. There is also exercise. Barker said there are different exercises for different people. If someone is in a wheelchair or has other disabilities there are exercises they too can participate in.

"We usually have a power point program at each meeting," she said. "At our last meeting we had a nursing student who gave a talk about how diabetes affects kidneys."

She said there are several rules diabetics should follow. The first is to check sugar levels. "You can have a sugar level of 500 and not know it."

A fasting glucose level should be between 80 and 120. When glucose (sugar) builds up in the bloodstream, this is known as hyperglycemia. The symptoms of hyperglycemia include nausea, thirst and shortness of breath. If the glucose level is too low this is known as hypoglycemia. The symptoms of hypoglycemia include dizziness, shakiness and loss of consciousness. Both hyperglycemia and hypoglycemia can become life-threatening, according to the American Diabetes Association

Baker said keep checkup appointments. She recommends having kidney function, liver, blood pressure and A1C checked every three months. "Make sure these numbers are checked. Diabetes affects every organ in your body. Don't let it get out of control."

Barker also has a Friday morning clinic from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for those who need meds, labs or blood drawn. She said the clinic has been in operation for over a year and provides services for adults of every age.

"I have a lot of people who need to be able to get medication," Barker said. She said insurance doesn't always cover the medication an individual needs. "I work with them to make sure the medication they get meets their needs. A lot of patients really struggle taking meds," she said. "I had patients averaging sugar levels of 300 and 400 every day. We worked to do medicine adjustments based on Medicare and insurance. Some medicines are not covered. There is a lot of critical thinking involved in this," she said.

Baker said she has equipment at the support group to check sugar levels. And has some glucose meters she can give out to help people take control of their diabetes.

"Diabetes is harder on you as you age because your organs have aged, too," she said. "If your diabetes is not controlled and you are elderly there is less chance of your organs recovering from the damage diabetes causes."

Baker said a lot of people in their 70s have kidneys that do not filter as well as they once did. She said it's harder for the kidneys of a senior to recover from damage.

Baker said everyone is welcome at the support group. Interested individuals do not have to live in Mon County to participate. She said family and friends are also welcome. The support group meets the first Tuesday of every month at 5:30 p.m. on the lower level of the Mon Health Department.

The Health Department clinic, which is an outreach program from the WVU School of Nursing, is held every Friday from 9 a.m. to 1p.m. and accepts both Medicare and Medicaid. There is a sliding scale for those who do not have insurance.

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Senior Center Activities

Westside Senior Center

Westside Senior Center opened June 10, 2001, and is totally operated by volunteers. It is open from 9 a.m.-noon and 6-9 p.m. Monday through Friday at 500 Dupont Road, Westover. Members are knitting scarves for veterans and active-duty military as part of Operation Gratitude's "Scarves for The Troops." Anyone is welcome to bring knitting needles and join in the project. Food is collected every month for the Rock Forge Food Pantry. Evenings are full of things to do. Monday and Friday, bring a musical instrument and play with the group. Tuesdays and Thursdays, there is card playing, and Wednesday evening is for bingo. There is also a well-equipped exercise room that includes a pool table.

Assisted Living at Evergreen


Assisted Living at Evergreen is an alternative to nursing home care. A variety of specially developed leisure activities include outings to Oglebay, holiday dinners and parties, and weekly shopping trips. Housekeeping and personal laundry services are available. There are community areas, dining and family rooms, an activity center and a gazebo with fish pond for outdoor relaxing.

Respite Care Program

As of January 3rd, Respite Care Program went to three days a week, operating on from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at Suncrest United Methodist Church, 479 Van Voorhis Road, Morgantown. There are openings for all three days. This program is for the caregivers who need a break from their loved ones they are caring for. Bring your loved ones to church, and they will be care of them while you take care of other responsibilities. Two registered nurses are on duty and willing to answer any questions. There are also several volunteers helping with those in the program.

Monthly rates:
One day each week: \$120 per month
Two days each week: \$240 per month*
Three days each week: \$360 per month*
Payment at the beginning of each month is appreciated, but it can also be made in two payments. There are times when the program closes, including legal holidays, when the church building is closed, when there is a school closing, Easter week, Christmas week and New Year's week. The program will begin on time during two-hour school delays, unless weather or dangerous roads dictate otherwise.
